A. PEDLEY TOWN CENTER AREA PLAN

Staff Report presented by Jean Ward, Project Manager, Peter Vanderwal, Managing Principal with Sargent Town Planning, and Jason Pack, representing Fehr & Peers. Ms. Ward provided a review and recap of the previous study session that was held on March 2, 2023. She reported that tonight's study session will review community input including input from Study Session #1 and review and confirm refined concepts before starting the Draft Plan. Ms. Ward gave an overview of the "why" of the Plan which is to prepare for physical improvements to address the following goals: public safety, healthy living and walkability, economic development, quality of life, environmental sustainability, and identify community character. Ms. Ward outlined the purpose of the visioning and strategic plan, noting that this is a plan, not a project as it will direct how the area will be designed and developed in the future. Mr. Pack provided information on traffic impacts and concepts and projects which are already underway or planned, which

will mitigate traffic congestion. Mr. Vanderwal provided some of the refined concepts and ideas for the future of the Pedley Town Center.

A. PRESENTATION OF MEMORIAL PLAQUE IN HONOR OF DEPUTY SHERIFF ISAIAH CORDERO – PRESENTED BY SUPERVISOR KAREN SPIEGEL

Supervisor Karen Spiegel introduced Gilbert Cordero, the father of Deputy Sheriff Isaiah Cordero. She thanked Mr. Cordero for his son's sacrifice in the line of duty. In Deputy Cordero's honor, she unveiled a memorial wooden plaque to honor the memory of Deputy Cordero who was killed during a traffic stop in Jurupa Valley.

Mayor Chris Barajas encouraged residents to attend the Jurupa Valley Pro Rodeo as it should be a great community event.

- 2. Authorize the City Manager to record the Notice of Completion; and
- 3. Direct the City Engineer to release the Labor and Materials and Performance Bonds for the street improvements and the Monument Bond.

BACKGROUND

Tract Map 36391, also known as Riverbend development, was approved by City Council April 7, 2016. The subdivision is a 464 lot single family residential development located on approximately 211 acres. The owner dedicated to public use for street and public utility purposes streets designated as lettered lots on the map. Prior to recording the Final Map, Subdivision Agreements were executed and bonds were provided by the developer to secure required improvements.

ANALYSIS

The developer, Lennar Homes of California, Inc., completed construction of the required improvements for Tract 36391. Staff inspected the improvements for compliance with the approved plans, adopted conditions of approval, the City's Standard Plans and Specifications, and the Municipal Code. All improvements have been constructed and completed to the satisfaction of the City Engineer.

The streets now being accepted by this action are shown on the attached map. The developer provided street centerline ties and monument records. All monuments identified on the map are confirmed.

OTHER INFORMATION

Previous Actions:

 City Council meeting of April 7, 2016: City Council approved Final Tract Map 36391, subdivision agreements, and accepted offers of dedication and improvements bonds.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Public Works Department will maintain the public improvements on the streets dedicated to the City and accepted on the map for Tract 36391. Maintenance of the public streets is primarily funded with Gas Tax (revenue from State gas tax). Maintenance of the water and sewer line facilities are the responsibility of Jurupa Community Services District (JCSD) and the maintenance of the community trail is the responsibility of Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District. Right-of-way landscaping maintenance along landscaped areas within the development are funded by an HOA and landscaping maintenance along 68th Street, site lighting, operations, and the water quality basin maintenance will be funded by CFD 2015-001.

Based on the calculations attached to the Resolution (Exhibit A for 2023-24), the City is under the cap for FY 2022-23 by \$2,607,499.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

This resolution sets the FY 2023-24 Appropriations Limit at \$51,335,642.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING AN AMENDED APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2023-24 PURSUANT TO ARTICLE XIIIB OF THE CALIFORNIA CONSTITUTION

WHEREAS, in June of 1990, the voters of the State of California enacted Proposition 111, "The Traffic Congestion Relief and Spending Limitation Act of 1990; and

WHEREAS, this Act amended Article XIIIB of the Constitution of the State of California regarding spending limitations of cities; and

WHEREAS, Article XIIIB of the California Constitution provides that the total annual appropriations subject to limitation of each governmental entity, including this City, shall not exceed the appropriation limit of such entity of government for the prior year, adjusted for changes in the cost of living or personal income and population, except as otherwise provided for in said Article XIIIB and implementing State Statutes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said Article XIIIB of said California Constitution, and Section 7900 et seq. of the California Government Code, the City is required to set its appropriation limit for each fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Administrative Services of the City of Jurupa Valley has caused a technical review to be made of the documentation for the City's said appropriation limitation, and has caused the numbers upon which the City's appropriation limit is based to be researched and said limit to be calculated; and

WHEREAS, based on such calculations, as described in the attached documentation as Exhibit A, the Director of Administrative Services has determined the said appropriation limit and, pursuant to Section 7910 of the said California Government Code, has made available to the public the documentation used in the determination of said appropriation limit; and

WHEREAS, the City Council elects to utilize said calculations which are attached for reference.

Section I. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley, California, that said appropriation limit for Fiscal Year 2023-24 shall be adopted in the amount of **\$51,335,642** for said Fiscal Year.

Section 2. The City Clerk shall certify as to the adoption of this resolution.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY AND CIVICA LAW GROUP, APC, FOR ON-CALL

LEGAL SERVICES

RECOMMENDATION

1) That the City Council approve the First Amendment to the Agreement between the City of Jurupa Valley and Civica Law Group, APC (CIVICA) formerly known as Silver and Wright LLP for On-Call Legal Services and authorize the City Manager to execute the Agreement in substantially the form and format attached and as approved by the City Attorney.

BACKGROUND

Code Enforcement legal services are necessary to enforcing laws effectively, efficiently and fairly. RWG currently provides legal services for code enforcement related matters and has been successful at litigating cases and gaining compliance. While the Code Enforcement Division has been successful with RWG, the City still requires assistance from outside firms to manage unique situations and offer consulting services in specialized areas.

On February 12, 2021, RWG notified the City that it could not represent the City in a cross complaint case. This initiated the original agreement with CIVICA formerly known as Silver and Wright LLP to represent the City in the cross complaint and the code enforcement case. Staff selected CIVICA, since they are a qualified firm that specializes in code enforcement related matters with over 75 collective years of experience. The scope of work in the agreement was to represent the City in the cross complaint and represent the City in code enforcement cases. On March 10, 2021, the City Manager approved the agreement with CIVICA formerly known as Silver and Wright LLP to provide legal services. The cost of the agreement called for a not to exceed amount of \$25,000 per fiscal year.

ANALYSIS

CIVICA has largely been assisting City Code Enforcement staff with current on-going litigation on code enforcement cases. Due to the ongoing litigation and complexity of the code cases that CIVICA is working on, CIVICA has exhausted the original not to exceed amount of \$25,000 per fiscal year.

Staff is proposing the First Amendment to the Agreement to extend the spending limit. The proposed Amendment will increase CIVICA's Agreement to \$60,000 per fiscal year through the initial term of the Agreement. Funding for the Amendment is available in the current Fiscal Year 2022-23 budget. The majority of services are for ongoing litigation.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

If the First Amendment is approved, the not to exceed amount will be increased to \$60,000.00 per fiscal year throughout the initial term of the Agreement. The majority of services provided will continue to be for ongoing litigation for cases that CIVICA is currently working on. The cost incurred during litigation will then go through a cost recovery process by CIVICA by placement of lien or payment of fees once the case is resolved.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN CIVICA LAW GROUP, APC AND THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY FOR CODE ENFORCEMENT LEGAL SERVICES

1. PARTIES AND DATE.

This agreement ("Agreement") is entered into and made effective on March 1, 2023 by and between the CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY ("City"), and CIVICA LAW GROUP, APC, a California Professional Corporation engaged in the practice of law in the State of California ("Law Firm"). Law Firm and the City are sometimes individually referred to herein as "Party" and collectively as "Parties." In consideration of the mutual promises set forth herein, the parties agree to the terms of this Agreement as set forth herein.

2. RECITALS.

2.1 The City wishes to engage the services of Law Firm to provide special counsel code enforcement legal services as described in this Agreement. Law Firm wishes to provide all such services and has the necessary expertise and competency to provide such services.

3. TERMS.

- 3.1 <u>Scope of Services.</u> Law Firm shall provide legal advice, representation and assistance to the City regarding code enforcement related matters as assigned to Law Firm, including appeals and matters in defense of the City relating to code enforcement matters. Law Firm shall report on a regular basis to the City regarding matters assigned to Law Firm, and shall handle matters subject to the input, oversight and direction of City staff and City Council or designee.
- 3.2 Responsibilities of Attorneys and Client. The City hereby requests and consents to the transfer of all files to Law Firm for matters referred by City to Law Firm. Law Firm shall fully cooperate with the City and will keep the City and its staff informed of the status and progress of all pending matters and all legal matters of importance with which Law Firm is involved. Law Firm will manage and control the delivery of all legal services described hereunder in a professional, competent, and cost-effective manner. The City agrees to provide all information and documentation necessary for the attorneys at Law Firm to perform their obligations under this Agreement.

Partner Matthew Silver shall serve as the Law Firm contact and supervising counsel to the City. For the City, the Code Enforcement Supervisor, unless otherwise notified by the City, shall serve as primary contact.

- 3.3 <u>Compensation</u>. For all legal services provided in this Agreement, the City will compensate Law Firm at the blended rate of \$238 per hour for attorney representation and \$143 per hour for paralegals and law clerks, which rates shall increase by 3% rounded to the nearest dollar on January 1 of each year to offset rising costs.
 - 3.4 <u>Cost Reimbursement</u>. The City shall reimburse Law Firm for all out-of-pocket

expenses incurred by Law Firm in providing legal services under this Agreement, including charges for printing and copying expenses at \$.16 for black and white copies and \$.60 for color copies, postage, research, litigation costs, courier and messenger services and automobile mileage at the current IRS rate for travel on behalf of the City. Costs shall be subject to a ten percent administrative fee to offset third party administration and costs. However, no separate charge shall be made by Law Firm for secretarial or word processing services.

- 3.5 <u>Statements and Billing</u>. Law Firm shall submit monthly invoices to the City indicating attorney fees and costs incurred for the legal services provided under this Agreement. The monthly invoice shall describe the nature of the work performed, the attorney performing the work and the time spent for each task as well as the nature of any reimbursable expenses incurred. Upon the request of and as directed by the City, Law Firm shall generate separate invoices pertaining to specific accounts, matters and/or departments. The City shall process and cause such invoices to be paid promptly, typically within thirty (30) days of receipt. If no attorneys' fees or costs are incurred for a particular month, or if they are minimal, the statement may be held and combined with that for the following month.
- 3.6 <u>Prohibition Against Subcontracting or Assignment</u>. The experience, knowledge, capability, and reputation of the attorneys at Law Firm were a substantial inducement for the City to enter into this Agreement. Therefore, Law Firm shall not contract with any other person or entity to perform, in whole or in part, the legal services required under this Agreement without the written approval of the City. In addition, neither this Agreement, nor any interest herein, may be transferred, assigned, conveyed, hypothecated, or encumbered voluntarily, or by operation of law, whether for the benefit of creditors or otherwise, without the prior written approval of the City.
- 3.7 <u>Conflicts of Interest</u>. Law Firm shall comply with all applicable laws and professional rules and standards relating to any known conflict of interest involving the City and matters upon which Law Firm is providing legal services under this Agreement. Law Firm shall not reveal confidential information of the City except with the consent of the Board of Supervisors or as otherwise required by law. Law Firm shall notify the City of any conflict of interest related to matters upon which it is providing legal services under this Agreement upon discovery of any such conflicts. In the event that such conflict is not or cannot be waived or resolved City shall retain legal counsel and Law Firm shall assist and cooperate with legal counsel retained by the City on the matter for which the conflict arose.
- A. Law Firm represents that neither Law Firm for any of its attorneys or other persons employed by Law Firm have any material financial interest, direct or indirect, in any contract or decision made by or on behalf of City that may be affected by the services to be provided to City pursuant to this Agreement, other than a financial interest that is similar, in all material respects, to the interests of the general public.
- B. If Law Firm or an attorney or other person employed by Law Firm acquires such an interest while this Agreement remains in effect, Law Firm will immediately disclose such interest to the City, and the interested individual shall not participate in or influence the performance of the services to be provided to the City pursuant to this Agreement.
- C. In addition to the prescriptions regarding conflicts of interest imposed on attorneys by the California Business and Professions Code, and by Rule 3-310 of the California

Rules of Professional Conduct, Law Firm agrees that unless waived in writing by the City, neither Law Firm nor any attorney employed by Law Firm shall represent clients before any board, commission, committee or department of City or represent a client adverse to City for a period of one (1) year from the date of completion of the services to be provided to City pursuant to this Agreement or the early termination of the Agreement as provided for in Section 3.10.

- 3.8 Return of Files. At the conclusion of this Agreement, any original files transmitted to Law Firm by the City for the work performed under this Agreement for the City shall be made available to City. Law Firm will be entitled to make copies of the client files. At the conclusion of this Agreement, (whether or not City takes possession of the client files), Law Firm shall have no further responsibility with regard to such documents.
- Independent Contractor. No employment relationship is created by this Agreement. Law Firm shall perform all legal services required under this Agreement as an independent contractor of the City, except that at all times providing services under this Agreement, Law Firm's employees and agents shall be acting as public officials. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for purposes of any legal claims against Law Firm arising from its provision of services to the City, Law Firm shall be entitled to all defenses provided by law to City officials, attorneys and prosecutors, and to City's statutory duties to the office of city prosecutor/attorney pursuant to Government Code section 825 for providing a defense, hold harmless, and full indemnity to Law Firm for actions within the scope of its engagement hereunder and shall survive expiration of this Agreement. This shall not in any way create a duty for the City for actions or claims adjudged to be due to Law Firm's gross negligence.
- the Effective Date set forth in this Agreement and shall continue in full force and effect until terminated as provided herein. City or Law Firm may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without cause, on thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party. In the event of such termination, Law Firm shall comply with all provisions of the Rules of Professional Conduct for the termination of a client relationship and the City shall pay Law Firm professional fees and costs, in accordance with this Agreement, for all services provided and costs incurred through the date of termination of this Agreement. The City agrees to execute, upon request, a stipulation in such form as to permit Law Firm to withdraw as attorneys of record in any legal action then pending. Law Firm shall cooperate to transition representation to a new attorney or firm in an expedient manner and make available to the City, or to counsel designated by the City, all documents and records of the legal services provided to the City and shall assist to the fullest extent possible in the orderly transition of all pending matters to the City's new counsel. If City does not take possession of the client files within sixty (60) days of termination of this Agreement, City agrees that Law Firm may dispose of the client files without further notice.
- 3.11 <u>Arbitration</u>. In the event of any dispute between the parties, such dispute shall be submitted to binding arbitration to the maximum extent permitted by law. In the event the parties are unable to agree upon an arbitrator, an arbitrator shall be selected through the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator shall have the authority to set procedures and discover in the arbitration. In any such matter, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its reasonable costs and attorney's fees. This section shall survive the expiration of this Agreement.

3.12 <u>Insurance Coverage</u>.

- A. Coverage Levels. Law Firm shall maintain at all times during the term of this Agreement policies of insurance with at least the minimum coverage specified below:
- 1) General liability insurance with a combined single limit of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000).
 - 2) Workers' compensation coverage in compliance with California law.
- 3) Professional liability coverage with a minimum limit of liability of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) in the aggregate, providing coverage for damages or losses suffered by City as a result of grossly negligent errors or omissions by Law Firm that arises out of the professional services required by this Agreement. Such insurance may be subject to reasonable terms, limitations and conditions and a self-insured retention or deductible to be borne entirely by Law Firm which shall not exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) per claim.
 - B. Prerequisites. The public liability policy of insurance specified above shall:
- 1) Name the City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley, its officers, agents and employees as additional insureds.
- 2) Provide minimum thirty (30) days' notice of cancellation, said notice to be provided by insurer, except for non-payment of premium for which ten (10) days' notice shall be provided by insurer.
- 3) Be maintained in full force and effect throughout the term of this Agreement.

Be placed with insurance carriers authorized to transact business in California with an A.M. Best rating of no less than A-:VII or otherwise acceptable to City.

- 3.13 <u>Amendment; Modification</u>. This agreement may be modified through a written instrument signed by both parties or by an oral agreement to the extent it is carried out.
- 3.14 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire Agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior negotiations, understandings, or agreements.
- 3.15 <u>Time of Performance; Efficiency of Services; Cooperation</u>. The services of Law Firm shall be performed expeditiously in light of the purposes of this Agreement. Law Firm shall follow all procedures as established by the City consistent with its duties. Law Firm shall work cooperatively with appropriate City staff and keep them informed on all matters of importance as they arise.
- 3.16 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. In the performance of this Agreement, Law Firm shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religious creed, color, sex, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, marital status, age, sexual orientation, or medical condition.

- 3.17 <u>Waiver</u>. No delay or omission to exercise any right, power or remedy accruing to City under this Agreement shall impair any right, power or remedy of City, nor shall it be construed as a waiver of, or consent to, any breach or default. No waiver of any breach, any failure of a condition, or any right or remedy under this Agreement: (1) shall be deemed effective unless it is in writing and signed by City; (2) shall be deemed to be a waiver of, or consent to, any other breach, failure of a condition, or right or remedy; or (3) shall be deemed to constitute a continuing waiver unless the writing expressly so states.
- 3.18 <u>Governing Law and Interpretation.</u> This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California, without regard to conflict of law principles. The section captions and headings in this Agreement have been inserted for convenience only, and shall not be considered or referred to in resolving questions of interpretation or construction.
- 3.19 <u>Severability.</u> If any portion or all of this Agreement is held to be unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of that provision and the remainder of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 3.20 <u>Notices</u>. All notices permitted or required under this Agreement shall be given to the respective parties at the following address, or at such other address as the respective parties may provide in writing for this purpose:

Section 3.3 is here by amended in its entirety to read as follows: For all legal services provided in this Agreement, the City will compensate Law Firm at the blended rate of \$238 per hour for attorney representation and \$143 per hour for paralegals and law clerks, which rates shall increase by 3% rounded to the nearest dollar on July 1 of each year to offset rising costs. The attorney's fees to Law Firm under this Agreement shall not exceed \$60,000 per fiscal year on a net basis without approval of the City.
- 3.2 Continuing Effect of Agreement. Except as amended by this Amendment, all provisions of the Agreement on March 1, 2023 shall remain unchanged and in full force and effect. From and after the date of this Amendment, whenever the term "Agreement" appears in the Agreement, it shall mean the Agreement, as amended by this Amendment to the Agreement. Said Agreement is and remains an effective, valid and binding obligation.

AGREEMENT FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES WITH THE

COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the City Council approve the Agreement for Law Enforcement Services with the County of Riverside through the Sheriff's Department for a term of five (5) years, and authorize the Mayor to execute the agreement on behalf of the City.

BACKGROUND

Upon incorporation of the City in July of 2011, the City of Jurupa Valley entered into an agreement with the County of Riverside Sheriff's Department (Sheriff) to provide law enforcement services. Since incorporation, the City has maintained this agreement for contract law enforcement services and the current Agreement is set to expire on June 30, 2023.

ANALYSIS

Through this new Agreement the County agrees, through the Sheriff to provide municipal police protection within the corporate limits of the City of Jurupa Valley. It is understood that the Sheriff's Department will be the sole provider of general and specialized law enforcement services within the corporate limits of the City. The Sheriff's services will encompass duties and functions of the type falling under the jurisdiction of and customarily rendered by a police department of the City under state statutes. Such services will include the enforcement of State Criminal Codes and all pertinent City criminal codes and ordinances. Services will also include traffic enforcement and related services to the extent possible given the size of the force provided for in the Agreement. The County agrees to provide all investigative support necessary to complete criminal investigations.

Average Patrol Services

180 fully supported hours per day (Approximate equivalent of 35 Deputy Sheriff positions @1,884 annual productive hours per position).

Dedicated Positions

- Six (6) Deputy Sheriff (fully supported) positions Zone Policing Officers
- Three (3) Deputy Sheriff (fully supported) positions Traffic Enforcement Officers
- Five (5) Deputy Sheriff (fully supported) positions Motorcycle Enforcement Officers
- Two (2) Deputy Sheriff (fully supported) positions Community Oriented Policing
- Two (2) Deputy Sheriff (fully supported) positions Commercial Enforcement Officers
- Seven (7) Community Service Officer positions Traffic Enforcement/Patrol

This Agreement will be effective from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2028, unless terminated earlier as stated in Section 1. Term in the Agreement.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The contract cost for services for FY 2023-24 is \$23,749,457 and is included in the proposed 2023-24 Budget.

AGREEMENT FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

BETWEEN THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY

AND THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE

THIS AGREEMENT FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES ("Agreement") is made and entered into by and between the CITY OF JURUPA, a California General Law City, hereinafter "City," and the COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, a political subdivision of the State of California, on behalf of the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, hereinafter "County", sometimes collectively referred to herein as the "parties" and individually as a "party".

IT IS THEREFORE AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. TERM

- 1.1 <u>Effective Dates.</u> This Agreement shall be effective from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2028.
- 1.2 <u>Renewal.</u> In the event City desires to terminate this Agreement at the end of any current five (5) year period, the City Council, not later than twelve (12) months preceding the expiration date of the current term of this Agreement, shall notify the Sheriff and the Board of Supervisors that it wishes to terminate the same.
- 1.3 <u>Termination.</u> Notwithstanding the provisions of Paragraphs 1.1 and 1.2 herein, either party may terminate this Agreement upon notice in writing to the other party of not less than twelve (12) months prior to the effective termination date.

2. SCOPE OF SERVICE

2.1 <u>Services.</u> The County agrees, through Sheriff thereof, to provide municipal police protection within the corporate limits of City to the extent and in the manner hereinafter set forth. It is understood that the Sheriff's Department shall be the sole provider of general and specialized law enforcement services within the corporate limits of City. City shall not hire any other persons or company to provide general and specialized law enforcement services within the corporate limits of City. However, City is not precluded by any language in this section from hiring an unarmed code enforcement unit. The Sheriff's services shall encompass duties and functions of the type falling under the jurisdiction of and customarily rendered by a police department of the City under State statutes. Such services shall include the enforcement of State Criminal Codes and all pertinent City criminal codes and ordinances. Services shall also include traffic enforcement and related services to the extent possible given the size of the force provided for in this Agreement. County agrees to provide all investigative support necessary to complete criminal investigations conducted hereunder. However, all investigator overtime will be charged to City at the Board of Supervisors approved hourly overtime rate.

- 2.2 <u>California Identification System (CAL-ID) and Records Management System. (RMS)</u>
 City agrees as a condition of receiving services hereunder to participate in CAL-ID and RMS under the terms and conditions set forth in this Section and to pay for these services under separate billings.
 - 2.2A <u>Definitions</u>. For purposes of this Agreement the following are some of the more common definitions which shall apply, but shall not be limited by this reference:
 - a) Records Management System (RMS) Functions shall mean the software functions provided to City by County, which are supplied by the RMS. These functions shall include inquiry and case entry into the RMS, access to the Master Name Index, Warrant and Master Location Index and Jail Locator databases.
 - b) The California Law Enforcement Telecommunications System Access (CLETS) shall mean that access to the Department of Justice computers provided by County to City.
 - c) Work Station shall mean those County devices and software, which are used by City to access RMS functions and the CLETS.
 - d) LAWNET shall mean the County's law enforcement telecommunications network consisting of County provided data circuits, digital service units, routers, hubs and other County provided hardware and software that is used by City to connect work stations to RMS services as defined below.
 - e) County Services shall mean the collective hardware and software, work LAWNET, stations, RMS functions and CLETS.
 - 2.2B <u>Scope of RMS Services.</u> County agrees to provide to City full access to the RMS and CLETS systems. CLETS access will be provided within the scope of CLETS access rules and regulations as established by the California State Department of Justice.
 - 2.2C <u>Provision of RMS Supervision, Labor and Equipment.</u> Supervision over the provision of County Services, the standards of performance and other matters incident to the performance of such services, shall remain with County. Security of the host system and control of LAWNET shall remain with County. The County shall furnish all labor and equipment for the host system necessary to maintain the level of service rendered hereunder. In the event City chooses to provide PC-based equipment for services defined herein, the equipment must be configured in accordance with County specifications. Further, City shall not alter the configuration of any PC-based equipment used to provide services herein without the permission of Sheriff's Information Technology Officer.
 - 2.2D <u>Establishment of RMS Rates and Payment of Costs.</u> Establishment of RMS rates and payments for provided services shall be as specified in Sections 7.2 and 7.4 of this Agreement.

3. LEVEL OF SERVICE

- 3.1 <u>Level of Service Specified.</u> County shall provide all enforcement services at the level specified in Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 3.2 <u>Variation in Level of Service</u>. Variations in the level of service shall be made by amendment, as provided for in Section 11 of this Agreement, and under the following terms:

If City requests an increase in the level of service to be provided under this Agreement, County agrees to provide such increased level of service as soon as is practicable, consistent with the ability of the Sheriff to hire and train recruits.

If City elects to reduce the level of service provided herein by ten percent (10%) or greater, City must give notice in writing to County not less than twelve (12) calendar months prior to the effective date of such reduction. If City elects to reduce the level of service provided herein by less than ten percent (10%), County agrees to reduce the level of service accordingly as soon as it is practicable. The level of service, however, may not be reduced to below the minimum level, as determined by County, required to ensure public and officer safety.

4. CHIEF OF POLICE

The Sheriff will, to the extent practical, coordinate appointment of a Police Chief with City and consult with City on final selection for the position.

5. PROVISION OF SUPERVISION, LABOR, AND EQUIPMENT

- 5.1 <u>Supervision</u>. Supervision over the rendition of law enforcement services, the standards of performance, the discipline of officers, and other matters incident to the performance of such services and the control of personnel so employed, shall remain with County. The Sheriff or a designated representative will meet and confer with the City Manager or a designated representative on questions related to the provision of services.
- 5.2 <u>Labor and Equipment.</u> For the purpose of performing said services, County shall furnish and supply all labor, supervision, equipment, communication services, and supplies necessary to maintain the level of service to be rendered hereunder. Location of the above will not necessarily be within City limits. Notwithstanding anything herein contained, it is agreed that in all instances where specific equipment used solely to support specialized enforcement activities within the City not normally provided by the Sheriff is to be used, or where special supplies, stationery, notices, forms, and the like related to law enforcement are to be issued in the name of City, such equipment and materials shall be supplied by City at its own cost and expense. Any such special equipment or materials so purchased by City shall meet with the Sheriff's specifications shall remain within the City limits, and ownership title thereto shall remain with City.

However, under no circumstances shall City purchase or otherwise provide general patrol vehicles for services provided pursuant to this Agreement without permission of Sheriff. The County shall provide all marked general Patrol vehicles to City and shall charge City for their use on a per mile basis.

5.3 <u>City-Owned Motorcycles and Specialized Support Vehicles.</u> In the event City chooses to provide motorcycles or specialized support vehicles for use in providing services hereunder, the

motorcycles or specialized support vehicles shall meet minimum specifications furnished by County, shall be adequately equipped and ready for use, and shall be registered in the name of City. It is further understood that City is providing motorcycles or specialized support vehicles to Sheriff expressly for law enforcement services and shall only be operated by Sheriff's personnel, or persons authorized by the Sheriff.

City shall bear the cost of maintenance, fuel, licensing, and any and all expenses associated with use of the motorcycles and specialized support vehicles for the provision of services hereunder, which is inclusive of responsibility for any and all cost for physical damage to the City-owned motorcycles or specialized support vehicles. However, County shall be responsible for the cost of all third party liability caused by the operation of the City-owned motorcycles or specialized support vehicles, including the property damage caused by the negligence or wrongful acts of County officers and employees while operating City-owned motorcycles and specialized support vehicles. Motorcycles and specialized support vehicles shall be used only for city-approved functions.

5.4 <u>Vehicle Insurance.</u> City shall maintain insurance for any physical damage to the Cityowned vehicles in an amount equal to the replacement value of all vehicles provided to the County under this Agreement. Policy shall, by endorsement, name the County of Riverside, its Departments, Districts, Agencies and Special Districts, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents, or representatives as Additional Insureds. Such insurance may be provided through a program of self-insurance.

General Insurance Provisions - All lines:

- a. Any insurance carrier providing insurance coverage hereunder shall be admitted to the State of California and have an A.M. BEST rating of not less than an A: VIII (A: 8) unless such requirements are waived, in writing, by the County Risk Manager. If the County's Risk Manager waives a requirement for a particular insurer such waiver is only valid for that specific insurer and only for one policy term.
- b. The City shall cause their insurance carrier(s) to furnish the County of Riverside with 1) a properly executed original Certificate(s) of Insurance and certified original copies of Endorsements effecting coverage as required herein; or, 2) if requested to do so orally or in writing by the County Risk Manager, provide original certified copies of policies including all Endorsements and all attachments thereto, showing such insurance is in full force and effect. Further, said Certificate(s) and policies of insurance shall contain the covenant of the insurance carrier(s) that shall provide no less than thirty (30) days written notice be given to the County of Riverside prior to any material modification or cancellation of such insurance. In the event of a material modification or cancellation of coverage, this Agreement shall terminate forthwith, unless the County of Riverside receives, prior to such effective date, another properly executed original Certificate of Insurance and original copies of endorsements or certified original policies, including all endorsements and attachments thereto evidencing coverages and the insurance required herein are in full force and effect. Individual(s) authorized by the insurance carrier to do so on its behalf shall sign the original endorsements for each policy and the Certificate of Insurance. If County is utilizing City-owned vehicles, operations shall not commence until the County of Riverside has been furnished original Certificate (s) of Insurance and certified original copies of endorsements or policies of insurance including all endorsements and any and all other attachments as required in this Section.

c. It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto and the City's insurance company(s), that the Certificate(s) of Insurance and policies shall so covenant and shall be construed as primary insurance, and the County's insurance and/or deductibles and/or self-insured retentions or self-insured programs shall not be construed as contributory.

6. EMPLOYMENT STATUS OF PERSONNEL

- 6.1 <u>Employment Status.</u> Any persons employed by County for the performance of services and functions pursuant to this Agreement shall remain employees of County on special assignment to City for the purposes of this Agreement, and shall not be considered employees of City. No such County employee shall have any entitlement to compensation, workers' compensation coverage, pension, or civil service benefits from City.
- 6.2 <u>Labor Shortage</u>. In the event of a work slow-down, strike, or any other form of job action by those individuals assigned to City, County agrees to provide only that level of service which may be available through mutual aid, pursuant to Government Code Section 8615, et seq. City shall be billed only for the actual hours of service received.

7. COMPENSATION

- 7.1 Payment Basis. City shall reimburse County the cost of rendering services hereunder at rates established by the County Board of Supervisors, which rates shall include all items of cost and expense to the Sheriff for providing the services hereunder. Such cost of services shall be established by the County Board of Supervisors in the form of hourly rates for Sheriff's Department personnel, vehicle mileage rates, facility use rates, RMS transaction fees and CAL-ID fees. "Cost" as used herein shall not include items of expense attributable to services normally provided or available to all territory within the County as part of County's obligation to enforce State law. In addition to any other fees or costs set forth herein, County may impose on City, and City shall pay upon receipt of an invoice from County, a criminal justice administrative fee consistent with Government Code Section 29550 with respect to arrests made by County employees pursuant to this Agreement just as if such arrests had been made by City employees. Pursuant to Government Code Section 51350, County shall not charge City for services it would provide to any city in the County free of charge. These services, which are provided at the discretion of County, could typically include the services of the Sheriff's Special Investigations Bureau, Emergency Services Team and Aviation Unit.
- 7.2 Establishment of Costs. The rates to be charged City shall be adjusted periodically, but not more than once each fiscal year, to reflect any changes in the cost to County for providing services hereunder. City shall be notified of any change in the rates to be charged City prior to submittal of the proposed change to the County Board of Supervisors for adoption, and City shall be given the opportunity to review the proposed change with County personnel. City shall, thereafter, be notified of adoption by County of the rates to be charged City, and said new rates shall take effect on the same date as County incurs the associated costs. Should City, subsequent to a rate adjustment, choose not to appropriate or expend any additional monies needed to support the level of service theretofore supplied, County reserves the right to reduce the level of service in accordance with the amount City is willing to expend.

- 7.3 <u>Facility Rate Charges.</u> City shall reimburse County for the costs incurred by the Sheriff's Department at County-owned or leased facilities. Costs are prorated according to the facility's square footage occupied by a Sheriff's Department Bureau or Unit.
- 7.3A <u>Calculation of Facility Rates</u>. The total of the facility's cost components is divided by the appropriate variable number of positions (number of station funded, sworn department funded or total Department funded employees depending on the facility in question and the Department population served). This cost per funded position is then applied to the number of positions chargeable to the contract city to arrive at each contract city's share of the facility cost.

The County agrees that Facility Rate Station charges to City will not be increased due to the Sheriff's decision to move Contract or unincorporated County Patrol positions from the Station.

- 7.4 Payment of Costs. County, through the Sheriff's Department, shall provide to City within 30 days of the conclusion of each billing period, an itemized statement of the costs for services being charged for said billing period. Billing statements for RMS services will be provided quarterly for services being charged for said quarter. City shall remit payment to the invoicing department within 30 days after receipt of such statements. If such payment is not received by the County within thirty (30) days after presentation of billing, County may satisfy such indebtedness from any funds of the City on deposit with County as provided by law pursuant to Government Code Section 907.
- 7.5 <u>Field Training Costs.</u> Should City elect to add additional Deputy Sheriff positions to the level of service described herein, there will be an associated field training cost for each additional position. City will be billed, on a separate invoice, up to a maximum of sixteen (16) weeks of training on a one-time basis for each additional Deputy position. Said cost will be charged at the Unsupported Deputy hourly rate as approved by the County Board of Supervisors. Billing will be provided for field training costs in conjunction with the rate adjustment billing. Field training costs will not apply to supervisory or classified positions added to the level of service.
- 7.6 <u>Miscellaneous Costs.</u> There are a number of other service costs that City shall be responsible for paying as they are incurred. These costs are not included as the support or service and materials cost components in the fully supported Deputy hourly rate, nor any other such rates established by the County Board of Supervisors. These service costs may include, but are not limited to, charges from vendors for: crime scene clean-up, blood draws, rape exams, polygraph exams, specialized printing jobs exclusive to City and training for personnel requested by City for specialized law enforcement.

8. INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS

8.1 <u>Indemnification by City.</u> City shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives from any liability, claim, damage or action whatsoever, based or asserted upon any act or omission of City, its officers, employees, contractors, agents or representatives arising out of or in any way relating to this Agreement, including but not limited to property damage, bodily injury, or death. City shall defend, at its sole cost and expense, including but not limited to attorney fees, cost of investigation, defense and settlements or awards, the County, its Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives in any such action or claim. With respect to any action or claim subject to indemnification herein by

City, City shall, at its sole cost, have the right to use counsel of its own choice and shall have the right to adjust, settle, or compromise any such action or claim without the prior consent of County; provided, however, that any such adjustment, settlement or compromise in no manner whatsoever limits or circumscribes City's indemnification of County. City's obligations hereunder shall be satisfied when City has provided to County the appropriate form of dismissal (or similar document) relieving the County from any liability for the action or claim involved. Any insurance coverage shall in no way limit or circumscribe City's obligations to indemnify and hold harmless the County.

8.2 <u>Indemnification by County.</u> County shall indemnify and hold harmless the City, its Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments, their respective directors, officers, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives from any liability, claim, damage or action whatsoever, based or asserted upon any act or omission of County, its officers, employees, contractors, agents or representatives arising out of or in any way relating to this Agreement, including but not limited to property damage, bodily injury, or death. County shall defend, at its sole cost and expense, including but not limited to attorney fees, cost of investigation, defense and settlements or awards, the City, its Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments, their respective directors, officers, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives in any such action or claim. With respect to any action or claim subject to indemnification herein by County, County shall, at its sole cost, have the right to use counsel of its own choice and shall have the right to adjust, settle, or compromise any such action or claim without the prior consent of City; provided, however, that any such adjustment, settlement or compromise in no manner whatsoever limits or circumscribes County's indemnification of City. County's obligations hereunder shall be satisfied when County has provided to City the appropriate form of dismissal (or similar document) relieving the City from any liability for the action or claim involved. Any insurance coverage shall in no way limit or circumscribe County's obligations to indemnify and hold harmless the City.

9. ADMINISTRATION

The City Manager of City shall administer this Agreement on behalf of City, and the Sheriff shall administer this Agreement on behalf of County.

10. RECORDS

County shall maintain adequate records to discharge its responsibilities under this Agreement, and shall permit inspection of County's appropriate records that relate to City services under this Agreement, as allowed by law. County shall provide City access to appropriate records pertaining to City services for approval, funding or auditing services, upon reasonable notice. County shall maintain such records for periods of time as provided by law or records retention schedules duly adopted by the appropriate legislative body. Covenants under this Section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

11. ALTERATION OF TERMS

No addition to, or alteration of, the terms of this Agreement, whether by written or verbal understanding of the parties, their officers, agents, or employees, shall be valid unless made in the form of a written amendment to this Agreement which is formally approved and executed by both parties. No waiver of any term or condition of this Agreement by either party shall be a continuing waiver thereof.

12. NOTICES

Any notices required or desired to be served by either party upon the other shall be addressed to the respective parties as set forth below:

Notice shall be deemed given when in writing and delivered personally or mailed with confirming delivery receipt addressed as set out above.

13. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

14. STANDARD OF CARE

In performing the police services required by this Agreement, County agrees to use that degree of care and skill ordinarily exercised under similar circumstances by law enforcement officers in performance of the duties required by this Agreement. All Sheriff's personnel who provide general and specialized law enforcement services to City pursuant to this Agreement shall have met the minimum qualifications designated for their specific classification, including a background investigation.

15. JURISDICTION AND VENUE

This Agreement shall be construed under the laws of the State of California. In the event any action or proceeding is filed to interpret, enforce, challenge, or invalidate any term of this Agreement, venue shall lie only in the state or federal courts in or nearest to Riverside County.

16. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement is intended by the parties hereto as a final expression of their understanding with respect to the subject matter hereof and as a complete and exclusive statement of the terms and conditions

thereof and supersedes any and all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings, oral or written, in connection therewith.

17. ELECTRONIC/DIGITAL SIGNATURES

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which will be an original, but all of which together will constitute one instrument. Each party of this Agreement agrees to the use of electronic signatures, such as digital signatures that meet the requirements of the California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (("CUETA") Cal. Civ. Code §§ 1633.1 to 1633.17), for executing this Agreement. The Parties further agree that the electronic signatures of the Parties included in this Agreement are intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as manual signatures. Electronic signature means an electronic sound, symbol, or process attached to or logically associated with an electronic record and executed or adopted by a person with the intent to sign the electronic record pursuant to the CUETA as amended from time to time. The CUETA authorizes use of an electronic signature for transactions and contracts among parties in California, including a government agency. Digital signature means an electronic identifier, created by computer, intended by the party using it to have the same force and effect as the use of a manual signature, and shall be reasonably relied upon by the parties. For purposes of this section, a digital signature is a type of "electronic signature" as defined in subdivision (i) of Section 1633.2 of the Civil Code.

CONSIDERATION OF ANIMAL FIELD AND SHELTER SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY AND THE COUNTY OF

RIVERSIDE

RECOMMENDATION

- 1) That the City Council approve the Agreement for Animal Field and Shelter Services between the City of Jurupa Valley and the County of Riverside; and
- 2) Authorize the Mayor to execute the Agreement on behalf of the City in substantially the form submitted to the City Council.

BACKGROUND

Since June 20, 2017, the County of Riverside ("County") has provided Animal Field and Shelter Services and an integrated canine licensing program. The City has maintained this agreement for animal control services and the current Agreement is set to expire June 30, 2023.

ANALYSIS

The proposed Agreement for Animal Field and Shelter Services continues to provide for similar animal field and shelter services. The animal field services are detailed in Exhibit A to the proposed Agreement, and the animal shelter services are detailed in Exhibit B to the proposed Agreement. This agreement has no changes from the previous 2020 agreement and is effective from July 1, 2023 and terminates on June 30, 2026, unless terminated earlier as stated in Section VI in the Agreement.

Animal field and Sheltering Services Rates in the 2023 Agreement include:

^{*} Yearly cost estimate based on approximate impound rate of 3,221 stray dogs and cats per year, based on an average of ten (10) kenneling days. Rates are established by the Board of Supervisors and are subject to change as amended by County from time to time.

The City will be provided with actual impound statistics each month that detail the number of animals impounded and the number of kenneling days.

Large Animal Sheltering: \$20/animal (horses, ponies, cattle) per day of sheltering.

Large Animal Sheltering: \$12/animal (swine, goats, sheep) per day of sheltering.

B. Collection of License Fees

The City authorizes County to issue and collect the fees for canine licenses and retain ten dollars (\$10) per license on any and all canine license revenue generated by CITY residents during the term of the Agreement. All fees collected for canine licenses shall be accounted for by the County on a monthly basis and the County will credit to City the net amount of license fees collected for each month. The net amount of license fees will mean the total amount of license fees collected in a month less the sum total of \$10 per each canine license issued and shall be separate and apart from the monthly compensation rate due and payable by the City as set forth above in **Section A**.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The contract cost for animal control services for FY 2023-24 is approximately \$1,102,275 and is included in the proposed 2023-24 Budget.

1. Proposed Agreement for Animal Field and Shelter Services

AGREEMENT FOR ANIMAL FIELD AND SHELTER SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY AND THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE

THIS AGREEMENT FOR ANIMAL FIELD AND SHELTER SERVICES ("Agreement"), is made and entered into as of July 1, 2023 ("Effective Date") by and between the CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, a general law city, ("CITY"), and the COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, a political subdivision of the State of California, on behalf of its Department of Animal Services ("COUNTY"), collectively referred to as the "Parties" and individually as a "Party".

RECITALS

WHEREAS, CITY desires to contract with COUNTY to provide animal field and shelter services for the purpose of safeguarding the health and safety of CITY's population and the health and safety of its domestic animals;

WHEREAS, CITY desires to promote the humane treatment of animals;

WHEREAS, COUNTY has the personnel and experience to provide such services and is willing to enter into a contract with CITY for the provision of such services subject to the terms and conditions for compensation as hereinafter set forth; and

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions and advantages herein stated, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

SECTION I. OBLIGATIONS OF PARTIES

A. Recitals:

1. The aforementioned Recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by this reference.

B. County Obligations:

1. COUNTY shall provide the field and shelter services within the corporate jurisdictional limits of CITY as outlined and specified in **Exhibit A**, Scope of Animal Field Services, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, and; **Exhibit B**, Scope of Animal Shelter Services, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

C. City Obligations:

- 1. CITY shall reimburse COUNTY for the services performed and the expenses incurred as set forth in **Section III.**, Compensation, and **Exhibit C**, Payment Provisions, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 2. CITY shall be responsible for handling, whether directly or by its own legal counsel, administrative or criminal proceedings, including and without limitation, appeals and enforcement actions, arising under the services provided in this Agreement. COUNTY shall cooperate with CITY in making available such COUNTY animal control service employees for such proceedings if necessary, for providing testimony or information.

3. In order for COUNTY to provide the full scope of services to CITY under this Agreement, within six months following the Effective Date of this Agreement, CITY shall adopt the current verbatim language of the regulations, provisions, and rates found in Riverside County Ordinance Nos. 534, 560, 630, 716, 771, and 878 ("Animal Control Ordinances"), and shall amend its CITY municipal code when COUNTY amends its Animal Control Ordinances, from time to time. COUNTY shall provide the verbatim language to the CITY that shall be adopted into CITY's municipal codes. Notwithstanding the foregoing, CITY retains all legislative authority pertaining to the regulation of animals within its jurisdiction. The County regulates the issuance of dog licenses in one, two or three year increments as provided in Section 2 of Riverside County Ordinance No. 630. The CITY adopted Section 10.08.020.I of the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code that would permit issuing a dog license for a period of less than a year due to backdating the license issuance date to align the expiration date of the dog license with the expiration of the vaccination and to provide for a pro-rata reduction or discount of the license fee as a result of the backdating. The Parties will work cooperatively to develop a schedule of pro-rated fees for use by the COUNTY when in issuing any licenses where such backdating was performed pursuant to Jurupa Valley Municipal Code Section 10.08.020.I. The schedule of pro-rated fees will be prepared using the following formula: The discounted fee would be calculated by dividing the total dog licensing fee by the number of months within the license period and then subtracting from that the licensing fee the per month license fee cost per the number of months backdated. For illustrative purposes only, the following examples demonstrate how the fees would be pro-rated: JVMC Section 10.08.020.F.(1) provides that the fee for a 1-year dog license for a sterile dog is \$16. If COUNTY issues a 1-year license for the time period of January 1, 2021, through December 31, 2021, but the date of expiration of the subject dog's vaccination immunity is October 31, 2021, and the dog license is backdated to that October date, then the prorated dog license fee would be calculated as follows: \$16 - [(\$16/12 months) x 2 backdated months] =\$13.34. Similarly, a 3-year licensed issued for \$35 under JVMC Section 10.08.020.F.(5) that is backdated by four months upon the dog owner's request would be prorated as follows: \$35 - [\$35/36 months x 4 backdated months] = \$31.11.

SECTION II. PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE

The Effective Date of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 2023 and shall terminate on June 30, 2026, unless terminated earlier as provided herein under **Section VI**, Termination.

SECTION III. COMPENSATION

CITY shall pay actual costs and reimburse COUNTY for the services performed and the expenses incurred in accordance with the terms of **Exhibit C**, subject to any applicable changes in the rates and fees adopted by the Board of Supervisors of COUNTY.

SECTION IV. HOLD HARMLESS/INDEMNIFICATION

- A. CITY shall indemnify and hold harmless the County of Riverside, its Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives from any liability, claim, damage or action whatsoever, based or asserted upon any actions of CITY, its officers, employees, subcontractors, agents or representatives arising out of or in any way relating to this Agreement, including but not limited to property damage, bodily injury, or death or any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever and resulting from any reason whatsoever arising from the negligent or willful actions by CITY, its officers, agents, employees, subcontractors, agents or representatives of this Agreement. CITY shall defend, at its sole expense, all costs and fees including but not limited to attorney fees, cost of investigation, defense and settlements or awards of all Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments of the County of Riverside, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives in any such action or claim or action based upon such alleged acts or omissions.
- **B.** With respect to any action or claim subject to indemnification herein by CITY, CITY shall, at its sole cost, have the right to use counsel of its own choice and shall have the right to adjust, settle, or compromise any such action or claim without the prior consent of COUNTY; provided, however, that any such adjustment, settlement or compromise in no manner whatsoever limits or circumscribes CITY's indemnification to COUNTY as set forth herein. CITY's obligation to defend, indemnify and hold harmless COUNTY shall be subject to COUNTY having given CITY written notice within a reasonable period of time of the claim or of the commencement of the related action, as the case may be, and information and reasonable assistance, at CITY's expense, for the defense or settlement thereof. CITY's obligation hereunder shall be satisfied when CITY has provided to COUNTY the appropriate form of dismissal relieving COUNTY from any liability for the action or claim involved.
- **C.** The specified insurance limits required in this Agreement shall in no way limit the CITY's obligations to indemnify and hold harmless COUNTY herein from third party claims.
- D. COUNTY shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY, its Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments, their respective directors, officers, City Council, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives from any liability, claim, damage or action whatsoever, based or asserted upon any actions of COUNTY, its officers, employees, subcontractors, agents or representatives arising out of or in any way relating to this Agreement, including but not limited to property damage, bodily injury, or death or any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever and resulting from any reason whatsoever arising from the negligent or willful actions by COUNTY, its officers, agents, employees, subcontractors, agents or representatives of this Agreement. COUNTY shall defend, at its sole expense, all costs and fees including but not limited to attorney fees, cost of investigation, defense and settlements or awards of all Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments of the CITY, their respective directors, officers, City Council, elected and appointed officials,

employees, agents and representatives in any such action or claim or action based upon such alleged acts or omissions.

- E. With respect to any action or claim subject to indemnification herein by COUNTY, COUNTY shall, at its sole cost, have the right to use counsel of its own choice and shall have the right to adjust, settle, or compromise any such action or claim without the prior consent of CITY; provided, however, that any such adjustment, settlement or compromise in no manner whatsoever limits or circumscribes COUNTY's indemnification to CITY as set forth herein. COUNTY'S obligation to defend, indemnify and hold harmless CITY shall be subject to CITY having given COUNTY written notice within a reasonable period of time of the claim or of the commencement of the related action, as the case may be, and information and reasonable assistance, at COUNTY's expense, for the defense or settlement thereof. COUNTY's obligation hereunder shall be satisfied when COUNTY has provided to CITY the appropriate form of dismissal relieving CITY from any liability for the action or claim involved.
- **F.** The specified insurance limits required in this Agreement shall in no way limit the COUNTY's obligations to indemnify and hold harmless CITY herein from third party claims.
- **G.** Solely for the purpose of applying the indemnity and hold harmless obligations of the PARTIES pursuant to paragraphs A, B, C and D of this Section IV, COUNTY animal Control service employees shall not be deemed to be officials, employees, subcontractors, agents or representatives of the City, but shall be employees of the COUNTY.

SECTION V. INSURANCE

COUNTY agrees to maintain the following insurance coverage during the term of this Agreement:

A. Workers' Compensation:

COUNTY shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance (Coverage A) as prescribed by the laws of the State of California. The policy shall include Employers' Liability (Coverage B) including Occupational Disease with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per person per accident.

B. Commercial General Liability:

COUNTY shall maintain Commercial General Liability Insurance coverage for claims, which may arise from or out of COUNTY's performance of its obligations hereunder. This coverage shall have a limit of liability not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence combined single limit.

C. Vehicle Liability:

If vehicles or mobile equipment is used in the performance of the obligations under this Agreement, then COUNTY agrees to maintain automobile liability insurance for vehicles provided by the COUNTY for use under this Agreement. This coverage shall have a limit of liability of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit.

D. General Insurance Provisions – All Lines:

- 1. Any insurance carrier providing insurance coverage hereunder shall be admitted to the State of California and have an A M BEST rating of not less than A: VIII (A:8).
- 2. The insurance requirements contained in this Agreement may be met with a program(s) of self-insurance.

SECTION VI. TERMINATION

- **A.** Either Party may terminate this Agreement without cause upon no earlier than six (6) months advance written notice served on the other Party stating the extent and effective date of termination.
- **B.** If a six (6) month notice of termination is served on the other Party, after receiving said notice of termination, COUNTY shall stop work under this Agreement on the termination date specified in the notice of termination; and after termination, CITY shall make payment to COUNTY for performance up to the date of termination in accordance with this Agreement.
- **C.** If the COUNTY materially defaults under this Agreement, the CITY may terminate this Agreement for cause. CITY shall make payment to COUNTY for performance up to the date of termination in accordance with this Agreement.

SECTION VII. FORCE MAJEURE

If either Party is unable to comply with any provision of this Agreement due to causes beyond its reasonable control, and which could not have been reasonably anticipated, such as acts of God, acts of war, civil disorders, or other similar acts, such Party shall not be held liable for such failure to comply.

SECTION VIII. AMENDMENTS

Any amendments, including but not limited to alterations, variations, or supplements, to the terms of this Agreement shall be in writing and signed by the Parties hereto, and shall have the approval of the Board of Supervisors of COUNTY and CITY's City Council. Any amendments will be presented to CITY's City Manager prior to CITY's City Council approval.

This Agreement, including any exhibits, constitutes the entire Agreement of the Parties with respect to its subject matter and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous representations, proposals, discussions and communications, whether oral or in writing.

SECTION IX. SEVERABILITY

Each paragraph or provision of this AGREEMENT is severable from each other provision, and if any provision or part thereof is declared invalid, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect.

SECTION X. RECORDS

COUNTY shall maintain and keep records of all expenditures and obligations incurred pursuant to this Agreement and all income and fees received thereby according to generally recognized accounting principles. Such records and/or animal control operations of COUNTY shall be open to inspection and audit by CITY or its authorized representative as is deemed necessary by the CITY's City Manager, or designated representative, upon written notice to COUNTY.

SECTION XI. NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

This Agreement between the Parties is intended for the mutual benefit of the two signing Parties only. No rights are created under this Agreement in favor of any third party or any party who is not a direct signatory to this Agreement.

SECTION XII. NONDISCRIMINATION

COUNTY shall not discriminate in the provision of services, allocation of benefits, accommodation in facilities, or employment of personnel on the basis of race, ethnicity, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, age, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, or gender identity in the performance of this Agreement; and, to the extent they shall be found to be applicable hereto, shall comply with the provisions of the California Fair Employment and Housing Act (Gov. Code 12900 et. seq.), the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Pub. L. 88-352) and the Americans with Disability Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.).

SECTION XIII. DISPUTE RESOLUTION AND VENUE

- **A.** The Parties shall attempt to resolve any disputes amicably at a working level. If that is not successful, the dispute shall be referred to the senior management of the Parties.
- **B.** Prior to filing any legal action related to this Agreement, the Parties shall be obligated to attend a mediation session in Riverside County before a neutral third party mediator. A second mediation session shall be required if the first session is not successful. The Parties shall share the cost of the mediations.
- **C.** This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any legal action related to the performance or interpretation of this Agreement shall be filed only in the Superior Court of the State of California located in Riverside, California, and the Parties waive any and all provisions of law providing for a change of venue to another location.

SECTION XIV. ASSIGNMENT

This Agreement shall be binding upon COUNTY and its successors. Neither this Agreement nor any part thereof nor any moneys due or to become due hereunder may be assigned by the Parties without the prior written consent of the other Party. CITY and COUNTY hereby agree to the full performance of the covenants contained herein.

SECTION XV. NOTICES

All correspondence and notices required or contemplated by this Agreement shall be delivered to the respective Parties at the addresses set forth below and are deemed submitted two (2) days after their deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid:

SECTION XVI. CONTRACT PERFORMANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

COUNTY's Director of Department of Animal Services, or designated representative, is designated as the Contract Administrator and will meet as necessary to discuss contract performance with CITY's City Manager, or designated representative.

SECTION XVII. HEADINGS

The Section and other headings contained in this Agreement are included for the purpose of convenient reference only and shall not restrict, amplify, modify or otherwise affect in any way the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement or the exhibits and schedules hereto.

SECTION XVIII. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same Agreement, binding on all of the Parties.

SECTION XIX. WAIVER OF BREACH, RIGHT OR REMEDY

The waiver by any Party of any breach or violation by another Party of any provision of this Agreement or of any right or remedy permitted the waiving Party in this Agreement (a) shall not waive or be construed to waive any subsequent breach or violation of the same provision, (b) shall not waive or be construed to waive a breach of violation of any other provision, and (c) shall be in writing and may not be presumed or inferred from any Party's conduct. Except as expressly provided otherwise in this Agreement, no remedy conferred by this Agreement is intended to be exclusive of any other remedy, and each and every remedy shall be in addition to every other remedy granting in this Agreement or now or hereafter existing at law or in equity, by statute or otherwise. The election of any one or more remedies by a Party shall not constitute a waiver of the right to pursue other available remedies.

SECTION XX. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

The COUNTY is acting as an independent contractor to the CITY under this Agreement. Each Party to this Agreement shall have no power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of another Party to this Agreement.

SECTION XXI. COOPERATION, FURTHER ACT

The Parties shall cooperate fully with one another, and shall take any additional acts or sign any additional documents as may be necessary, appropriate or convenient to attain the purposes of this Agreement.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF ANIMAL FIELD SERVICES

CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY

The County of Riverside, on behalf of its Department of Animal Services ("COUNTY"), agrees to provide the following animal field services for the City of Jurupa Valley ("CITY"):

A. PROVISION OF FIELD SERVICES

The animal field services to be provided by COUNTY for CITY within the corporate jurisdictional limits of CITY shall include the following activities:

- 1. <u>Field Service Assistance</u>: Respond to calls for field service assistance pursuant to the priority of calls as described in **Section E** below.
- 2. <u>Impoundment</u>: Impound dogs and livestock found at large and collect such impound fees as established in the appropriate CITY municipal code.
- 3. **Proper Care and Treatment:** Provide humane care and treatment to any stray or abandoned animal impounded by field personnel in accordance with State of California ("State") laws and regulations.
- 4. <u>Animal Bites</u>: Investigate reported bites by animals. COUNTY shall respond in person to all reported bites by animals or by suspected rabid or wild animals. CITY shall be responsible for any appeals arising from administrative proceedings resulting therefrom.
- 5. **Quarantine:** Quarantine all animals suspected to be rabid and/or that have bitten a person as prescribed by the California Compendium of Rabies Control and Prevention, the State law, and COUNTY policy.
- 6. <u>Stray and Barking Animal (Nuisance) Complaints</u>: Respond to and process nuisance complaints, including stray and barking animal complaints, as referenced the appropriate CITY Municipal Code. City shall be responsible for any appeals arising from administrative proceedings resulting therefrom.
- 7. <u>Dead Animals</u>: Remove dead animals from the public right-of-way except in such cases where an animal is on a state highway within CITY limits. In such cases, COUNTY shall immediately (or as soon as practicable) notify the State Department of Transportation by telephone, facsimile, email or other means.
- 8. **Return of Impounded Animals**: Encourage the return of any lost/stray animal impounded by field personnel while in the field to the rightful owner and at the shelter, subject to the payment of impound fees.
- 9. <u>Kennels and Catteries</u>: COUNTY shall inspect and issue licenses to operate dog kennels and catteries within CITY jurisdictional limits pursuant to CITY's municipal codes, and

- collect fees in connection therewith. All fees for licenses to operate dog kennels and catteries shall be retained by COUNTY.
- 10. <u>Issuance of Warnings and Citations</u>: Perform enforcement activities for all applicable provisions of CITY's municipal code as necessary, including the issuance of warning notices or citations, for violations of the provisions of said municipal code. CITY shall be responsible for the prosecution of any criminal enforcement actions or any appeals arising from administrative proceedings resulting therefrom.
- 11. Service to Public: Provide service to the public on matters covered in this Agreement consistent with established policies and procedures that promote courteous and efficient service and good public relations. Other policies and procedures notwithstanding, COUNTY, in processing any type of complaint or request for service, shall indicate to the caller that a response can be expected as per Section E below.
- 12. <u>Field Services Related to Canine Licenses</u>: COUNTY shall verify canine license status when responding to requests for service or when responding to complaints about animal behavior. The Animal Control Officer, as part of the officer's regular animal control duties as defined by, but not limited to, the terms of this Agreement, shall conduct license inspection activities during animal control investigations to ascertain the number of unlicensed dogs, to license such dogs, and to promote and foster compliance with CITY's municipal code.
- 13. <u>Wildlife</u>: COUNTY will not impound free roaming wildlife unless it is a danger to the community, unhealthy, injured, or part of an animal cruelty or animal bite case.
- 14. <u>Mutual Animal Welfare Programs</u>: If mutually agreeable between the Parties, COUNTY and CITY shall work together to establish animal welfare programs that benefit the animals and residents of CITY.
- 15. COUNTY will perform humane investigations of suspected animal neglect and cruelty and will be responsible for investigation, citation and preparing materials for prosecution.
- 16. COUNTY and CITY will work together on educational outreach, promotion of spay/neuter and vaccination clinics, other owner surrender diversion program, responsible pet ownership and adoption programs and activities.
- 17. In case of a disaster, COUNTY and CITY will work collaboratively on animal needs and communication as it relates to rescue, response and recovery efforts.

B. SHELTER CARE AND DISPOSITION SERVICES

The COUNTY shall house CITY's animals at the Western Riverside City/County Animal Shelter, or other County operated shelter at the County's discretion, as set forth in **Exhibit B**.

C. PROVISION OF VEHICLES AND RADIO EQUIPMENT

COUNTY shall provide animal control vehicles and equip them with the appropriate animal control boxes mounted on the truck chassis and with an air conditioning unit mounted on the animal control truck boxes for use in the provision of services as set forth in this Agreement. The COUNTY shall fuel and maintain said vehicles.

D. MISSING OR STOLEN ANIMALS

COUNTY shall file a report with the appropriate law enforcement agency within twenty four (24) hours if an impounded animal is missing or suspected to have been stolen from an animal control vehicle or while in COUNTY's custody. COUNTY shall indicate on the police report the circumstances of the animal's disappearance.

E. PRIORITY OF FIELD SERVICES

- 1. "Services" are those enforcement activities rendered by COUNTY pursuant to the relevant sections of CITY's municipal code and related State law, and are assembled for into two categories: Emergency and Non-Emergency.
- 2. "Priority Ranking" refers to the order of priority with which a call will be handled. All calls will go directly to the dispatcher or assigned clerical staff for relay to the Animal Control Officer. If a call is "exceptional," a set forth in **Section F** below, it shall be referred to the supervisor for evaluation and processing.
- 3. The following definitions of "Regular Service Hours," "Limited Service Hours" and "Holidays" are intended to identify the broad time frames during which specific levels of service will be provided.
 - a. "Regular Service Hours" are between the hours of 7:30 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday, Holidays excepted.
 - b. "Limited Service Hours" are between the hours of 5:00 pm to 7:30 am, Monday through Friday, all day Saturday, Sunday and on Holidays.
 - c. "Holidays" are those days as established by the COUNTY and the CITY where the CITY or COUNTY is closed for service on a business day that would otherwise be a regular service day.
- 4. Field service activities shall be performed daily and generally based on both the Priority Ranking and the time a call for service is received in accordance with this Agreement. All calls involving imminent danger shall be responded to within sixty (60) minutes if reasonably possible, subject to considerations involving the time of day, traffic conditions, or other circumstances. An Animal Control Officer shall respond to animal medical emergencies and other emergencies involving danger to humans within thirty (30) minutes or less during Regular Service Hours, and within sixty (60) minutes or less during Limited

Service Hours and Holidays. CITY acknowledges that response time may be affected by traffic congestion or other hindering circumstances uncontrollable by COUNTY. COUNTY shall provide a means for responding to calls for service that take place during Limited Service Hours which are of an emergent nature pursuant to this **Exhibit A**. Field service personnel may be assigned to patrol and perform other service field tasks as defined by COUNTY and CITY.

- 5. <u>Telephone Service</u>: The COUNTY shall answer all telephone calls for field services during Regular Service Hours. Calls shall be received by the COUNTY answering service during Limited Service Hours and on Holidays, as noted above. Calls answered by the answering service will be handled on an emergency basis as outlined in this **Exhibit A**. The dispatcher and/or clerical support staff shall maintain a detailed record of all requests for service, both emergency and routine, received during Regular Service Hours and Limited Service Hours, including time and date, when the calls were answered, and the disposition of those calls. Records of these calls shall be maintained for at least thirty (30) days.
- 6. The CITY and COUNTY agree that any incident reports to the COUNTY by residents or through emergency services involving a dangerous, aggressive, injured or sick animal constitute an emergency and require immediate action by the COUNTY pursuant to this Agreement. Calls for service received during Limited Service Hours that are not of an emergent nature shall be answered by an answering service and referred to call-back on the next business day during phone center operational hours. These calls will then be scheduled for response in accordance with this **Exhibit A**.

7. Calls Considered Emergencies to be Handled Without Delay:

- a. Animals endangering health or safety of the community
- b. Police Department requests for service
- c. Sick or injured stray animals
- d. Animals in distress
- e. Humane investigations that are life threatening. (Depending on immediate circumstances)

8. Calls Considered Non-Emergency to be Handled during Regular Service Hours:

- a. Pick-up confined, healthy, stray-animals
- b. Dead animal removal
- c. Quarantine investigations
- d. Leash law enforcement
- e. Nuisance animal investigations
- f. Permit investigations

F. EXCEPTIONS

The Director of Animal Control, or designee, may, on a case-by-case basis, authorize variations of priority when circumstances require such a variance.

G. LICENSE FEES (Section 2 of Riverside County Ordinance No. 630)

Licenses shall be issued upon payment of the license fees at the same rate as established in Section 2 of Riverside County Ordinance No. 630 and are subject to change as amended by COUNTY's Board of Supervisors, from time to time.

H. RABIES VACCINATION CERTIFICATE DATA

Rabies vaccination certificates shall be collected from area veterinarians and downloaded into COUNTY's database after the data has been cleared of inconsistencies. Reminders of licensing requirements shall be automatically generated and mailed to dog owners. Those dog owners who fail to comply may be subsequently issued administrative citations. Remittance options include the web licensing portal on COUNTY's website, www.rcdas.org. COUNTY shall verify dog license status when responding to requests for service or when responding to complaints. COUNTY shall also provide an automated or manual verification system whereby owners can verify the status of their animal's license by telephone.

I. COLLECTION OF LICENSE FEES

CITY authorizes COUNTY to issue and collect the fees for canine licenses and retain ten dollars (\$10) per license on any and all canine license revenue generated by CITY residents during the term of the Agreement. All fees collected for canine licenses shall be accounted for by the COUNTY on a monthly basis and the COUNTY shall credit to CITY the net amount of license fees collected for each month. For purposes of this Agreement, the net amount of license fees shall mean the total amount of license fees collected in a month less the sum total of \$10 per each canine license issued and shall be separate and apart from the monthly compensation rate due and payable by the CITY as required in **Exhibit C, Payment Provisions**. CITY shall be responsible for a one-time conversion fee for new data entered into COUNTY's licensing database.

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EXHIBIT B SCOPE OF ANIMAL SHELTER SERVICES

CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY

The County of Riverside, on behalf of its Department of Animal Services ("COUNTY"), agrees to provide the following Animal Shelter Services for the City of Jurupa Valley ("CITY"). All capitalized terms set forth herein are defined in Section B below.

A. COUNTY ANIMAL SHELTER LOCATION

1. <u>Shelter Location</u>: The COUNTY shall maintain CITY's animals at the Western Riverside County/City Animal Shelter ("Shelter"), or other shelter operated by COUNTY at COUNTY's discretion.

The COUNTY shall be responsible for the operation and maintenance of its shelters and the care of the animals on a twenty four (24) hour basis.

2. <u>Shelter Hours of Operation</u>: COUNTY shall maintain hours of operation at the Shelter to provide maximum public access to the animals, to the extent possible.

B. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

- 1. "Animal Shelter Services" shall include the following activities and services:
 - a. Impoundment, admittance, receipt of, care of, custody of and/or feeding of stray animals and as part of investigations.
 - b. Redemption, treatment, sale, adoption, and/or disposal of all animals.
 - c. Counseling and advising animal owners.
 - d. Posting on Shelter's website of photographs of all newly impounded animals and identifying each animal individually.
 - e. Ensuring that all dogs, four (4) months and older, released from the COUNTY to a resident of County of Riverside are licensed and spayed/neutered and, if not licensed, to sell license to the owner or other person taking custody of such dog. In accordance with COUNTY ordinances, require the micro-chipping of released animals at the owner's expense.
 - f. Humane euthanasia of animals as lawful and necessary, including the creation of a log detailing those animals that are euthanized and the reasons for such euthanasia on an animal-by-animal basis. This log shall include whether the animal was unhealthy and/or unsuitable for adoption.
 - g. Proper disposal of dead animals at the rate as set forth in **Exhibit C**, Payment Provisions.
 - h. "Care" includes, but is not limited to providing a safe, temporary refuge for any animal impounded, and providing needed medical services for injured/sick animals or transfer of animal to the appropriate agency.
- 2. "Adoptable Animal" shall mean an animal eight (8) weeks of age or older that at or subsequent to the time the animal is impounded or taken into possession, has manifested no sign of disease, injury, or congenital or hereditary condition that adversely affects the

- health or temperament of the animal, or that is likely to adversely affect the animal's health in the future. Dogs declared "vicious" or "potentially dangerous" under State and/or local laws shall be deemed unadoptable.
- 3. "Treatable" shall mean an animal with a medical condition such as skin problems, bad flea or skin infestations, a broken limb, abscesses, or problems that may be treated with appropriate resources, holding space, treatment and/or time. "Treatable" shall also mean an animal with behavioral conditions that may be corrected with time and proper training, such as chasing animals/objects, food aggression, etc.
- 4. "Untreatable Animal" shall mean any animal that is irremediably suffering from a serious illness or physical injury or behavioral condition and shall not be held for owner redemption or adoption.
- 5. "Impounded Animal" shall include animals found running at large, removed from private property, or that are taken into the custody by COUNTY or law enforcement.
- 6. "Seized Animal" shall include animals that are confiscated under Penal Code 597.1 from an owner when ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction, whether the seizure was determined justified or not, when exigent circumstances exist.

C. SCOPE OF ANIMAL SHELTER SERVICES

- 1. <u>Treatment of Animals</u>: COUNTY shall provide adequate care and treatment of CITY's animals whiles in custody of COUNTY to ensure that impounded animals are provided with humane and appropriate levels of care, including a clean environment, fresh water, adequate nutrition and appropriate medical care.
- 2. <u>Level of Service Provided</u>: COUNTY shall provide Animal Shelter Services as defined in this Agreement. COUNTY's policies and procedures for Animal Shelter Services shall be based on standards and/or guidelines derived from reputable animal care organizations including, but not limited to, the Humane Society of the United States, American Humane Association and American Veterinary Medical Association.
- 3. <u>Feeding Protocols</u>: All animals shall be fed in amounts appropriate to meet their nutritional needs.
- 4. <u>Disease Control and Sanitation</u>: COUNTY shall maintain the Shelter in a clean and sanitary condition. COUNTY's policies and procedures may include beneficial standards and/or guidelines derived from reputable animal care organizations including, but not limited to, the Humane Society of the United States, American Humane Association and American Veterinary Medical Association.
- 5. <u>Provision of Personnel and Supplies</u>: COUNTY shall provide personnel, supplies, materials, medication, pharmaceuticals, and equipment, including forms and reports, to perform all aspects of the Animal Shelter Services described herein.
- 6. <u>Holding Periods</u>: COUNTY shall hold all stray-impounded animals, not otherwise owner identifiable, for the holding periods as required by State law.

- 7. **Euthanasia:** Humane euthanasia services shall be provided as required for impounded animals held at the Shelter for the lawful number of days, if such animal is not reclaimed by the animal's owner and is deemed not adoptable by COUNTY. Untreatable Animals that are irremediably suffering from a serious illness or severe injury may not be held for owner redemption or adoption. Only euthanasia methods approved by the American Veterinary Medical Association shall be used. Records shall be kept for a period of not less than three (3) years on each euthanized animal shall include the following information: breed; sex; color; weight; other distinguishing characteristics; date, time and location where animal was found; method of euthanasia, and reason for use of method.
- 8. **Quarantine:** COUNTY shall quarantine, as prescribed by the California Compendium of Rabies Control and Prevention, State law, and COUNTY policy, all animals suspected of being rabid, or involved in a bite investigation.
- 9. <u>Impoundments and Quarantines:</u> COUNTY shall house, feed and care for all animals impounded and/or quarantined at the Shelter.
 - a. <u>Animals Surrendered by their Owners:</u> Owner Surrenders will be impounded on a case by case basis. Diversion programs will be offered to assist with pet retention.
- 10. Any pet surrendered by the owner to an Animal Control Officer and transported to the COUNTY shelter shall incur prevailing owner surrender charges. Such fees shall be collected from the owner and conveyed to the COUNTY, or be charged directly to the CITY at the established stray animal rate.
- 11. <u>Wildlife.</u> COUNTY will work with constituents to ensure public safety while maintaining wildlife in the wild. COUNTY will triage wildlife reports to determine the appropriate response. Wildlife will be impounded if there is a public safety hazard, if the animal's welfare is at risk, if the animal is injured or orphaned, if the animal has been involved in a bite, or involved in an animal cruelty investigation.
- 12. Vicious and Potentially Dangerous Dogs: Any dog declared or determined to be vicious or potentially dangerous and in custody of COUNTY either under impoundment or quarantine shall be deemed unsuitable for adoption and shall not be released except as required by State law or at the Director of Animal Services' discretion.
- 13. <u>Incoming Animal Identification:</u> Incoming animals shall be checked immediately for collar tags and scanned for microchip by qualified Shelter staff within one (1) hour of arrival to the Shelter. Shelter staff shall make all attempts to notify owners within twenty-four (24) hours of an Impounded Animal delivered by CITY to COUNTY.
- 14. <u>Incoming Animal Examinations/Assessments:</u> A cursory exam of an animal shall be performed within twelve (12) hours, except during Limited Service Hours when the examination will be performed within twenty-four (24) hours. Incoming animal assessment shall include the following:

- **a.** A physical examination to determine if a medical condition exists which requires a veterinarian's attention
- b. Routine vaccinations and de-worming, as needed
- c. External parasite treatment, as needed
- d. Document the animal's incoming weight
- e. Scan for microchip identification
- f. Establish unique identifier for the animal
- g. Document any identifying features or abnormalities. The COUNTY shall properly document on an animal-by-animal basis that an examination/assessment has been performed.
- 15. **Enforcement:** Enforce all relevant provisions of CITY's municipal code and State law as may be applicable to animals housed, kept or maintained at the Shelter.
- 16. <u>Adoption:</u> Animals identified as being available for adoption shall be up for adoption in the shelter or by posting online.
- 17. **Spay and Neuter:** COUNTY shall ensure that all dogs and cats adopted from the Shelter are spayed or neutered, or that adequate provisions are made for such spaying or neutering if COUNTY transfers any animals, or if an adopted animal is unable to receive spaying or neutering due to a medical condition.
 - In accordance with California Food and Agricultural ("F&A") Code Sections 30503 and 31751.3, if veterinarian employed at the Shelter certifies that a dog or cat is too sick or injured to be spayed or neutered, the COUNTY shall collect a spay/neuter deposit from the adopter or purchaser and this deposit shall be deposited into a segregated fund maintained by the COUNTY. The deposit shall be fully refunded to the adopter or purchaser if proof of sterility is provided within thirty (30) business days from the date of surgery, at which the deposit is forfeited in accordance with F&A Code Sections 30503 and 31751.3. Spay and neuter deposits shall only be used by the COUNTY for canine and feline spay and neuter programs.
- 18. Community Adoption Partners: COUNTY shall comply with F&A Code Sections 31108 and 31752 that provide that any stray dog or cat that is impounded "shall, prior to the euthanasia of that animal be released to a nonprofit, as defined in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, animal rescue or adoption organization if requested by the organization prior to the scheduled euthanasia of that animal. The public or private shelter may enter into cooperative agreements with any animal organization or adoption organization. In addition to any required spay or neuter deposit, the public or private shelter, at its discretion, may assess a fee, not to exceed the standard adoption fee, for animals adopted or released."
- 19. <u>Foster Care Placement:</u> Certain animals may be placed in COUNTY's foster care placement program so to improve animal care, give certain animals a better chance of adoption, and lift the spirits and morale of staff and volunteers.

- 20. **Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA):** COUNTY shall comply with all applicable Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) regulations regarding storage, record-keeping, inventory, use, and disposal of all controlled substances used in the ordinary course of its operations and services.
- 21. Staffing and Volunteers: COUNTY will staff and supervise all necessary personnel for the office, kennel, veterinary and other areas of the Shelter. Staffing shall include any and all full or part-time personnel and shall include the recruitment, supervision and assignment of volunteers in suitable Shelter-related activities. Personnel employed at the Shelter in the performance of Shelter-related activities shall be designated as COUNTY employees and any and all volunteers engaged in Shelter activities shall participate in activities designated by COUNTY and shall be under the auspices of COUNTY. Use of volunteers at the Shelter shall be determined by COUNTY.
- 22. <u>Missing Animals:</u> COUNTY shall notify an appropriate law enforcement agency immediately of any animal missing from the Shelter that had previously been impounded and/or in protective custody.
- 23. <u>CITY Access:</u> COUNTY shall provide access of the entire Shelter to the authorized representatives of CITY during Regular Service Hours or at such other times upon written notice.
- 24. <u>Livestock and Fowl Care:</u> COUNTY shall provide food, care and shelter to livestock and fowl, either at the Shelter or at another location, when such animals cannot be cared for at the Shelter.

Costs of housing any livestock or fowl, regardless of Shelter location shall be charged to the owner of the animal, if known. If the animal's owner wishes to redeem the animal, the owner shall first pay all applicable fees and charges at the Shelter; except as otherwise required by law, then and only, will the COUNTY authorize release of the animal. COUNTY shall notify CITY in writing when said expenses reach the amount of \$5,000 or greater per incident. Such expenses shall not exceed the amount of \$25,000 per incident unless authorized in writing by CITY.

25. <u>Animal Disposal:</u> COUNTY shall prohibit any animal whether dead or alive, which has been impounded, in custody, or in quarantine at the Shelter to be given away, disposed of, traded, sold or in any manner given over to another person, organization or entity for experimentation, regardless of purpose. COUNTY shall be responsible for the disposal of animal remains in its custody or control, subject to applicable State laws.

D. <u>COMPENSATION</u>

1. Compensation for Animal Shelter Services:

Additional compensation for Animal Shelter Services may be required. Additional costs for large animal sheltering are incurred at \$20 per animal, per day for horses and cattle, and \$12 per animal, per day for swine, goats and sheep in accordance with COUNTY's

Animal Control Ordinances and shall be billed based on actual sheltering on a monthly basis.

- 2. Impound/Quarantine Fees: CITY shall be responsible for all costs associated with any and all animals seized within the CITY boundaries and brought to COUNTY, which are held in Shelter, including facilities that have agreements with the COUNTY to provide additional shelter services under the supervision of the COUNTY. This includes, but is not limited to, animals held in association with any criminal prosecution of animal abuse and welfare cases, animals being held as evidence in a court filing, or rabies quarantine. The COUNTY agrees to assist the CITY in seeking reimbursement from the owner by providing invoices for all services provided. All services provided to each animal involved shall be charged as of the current date including but not limited to the following: IMP 1-collection; State Fine 1-collection, Board collection- all fees due; QT Board collection-if applicable; Rabies Vaccination collection- if applicable; DA2PPV collection; Bordatella collection; microchip collection; any and all medications provided to each animal; and personnel charges. All fees will be in accordance with the COUNTY's current fee schedule.
- 3. <u>Outreach Activities:</u> CITY shall work with COUNTY to promote responsible pet ownership, lost and found animals, mutually agreeable animal welfare program, Spay/Neuter Services, and adoption of animals through its own educational outreach, and through its own social media pages. If requested by CITY, the daily flat rates for educational outreach events, vaccination clinics or spay/neuter clinics shall be billed based actual outreach days scheduled at a rates below:
 - a. Vaccination or Spay/Neuter Clinic: \$3,000* per event, flat rate billed on actual use.
 - *The cost for staff, vaccinations and microchips, free to constituents with a two hundred (200) animal cap per event.
 - b. Education Outreach Event: \$2,553* per event, flat rate billed on actual use. *The cost to staff an outreach event for the purpose of educating CITY constituents.

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EXHIBIT C PAYMENT PROVISIONS

CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY

City of Jurupa Valley ("CITY") shall compensate the County of Riverside ("COUNTY") on a monthly basis all fees and rates in accordance with the COUNTY's current fee schedule as set forth below:

City shall be provided with actual impound statistics each month that detail the number of animals impounded and the number of kenneling days.

Large Animal Sheltering: \$20/animal (horses, ponies, cattle) per day of sheltering.

Large Animal Sheltering: \$12/animal (swine, goats, sheep) per day of sheltering.

B. Collection of License Fees

CITY authorizes COUNTY to issue and collect the fees for canine licenses and retain ten dollars (\$10) per license on any and all canine license revenue generated by CITY residents during the term of the Agreement. All fees collected for canine licenses shall be accounted for by the COUNTY on a monthly basis and the COUNTY shall credit to CITY the net amount of license fees collected for each month. For purposes of this Agreement, the net amount of license fees shall mean the total amount of license fees collected in a month less the sum total of \$10 per each canine license issued and shall be separate and apart from the monthly compensation rate due and payable by the CITY as set forth above in **Section A**.

CITY shall be responsible for all costs associated with any and all animals seized within the CITY boundaries and brought to COUNTY held in the Shelter, including facilities that have agreements with the COUNTY to provide additional shelter services under the supervision of the COUNTY.

This includes, but is not limited to, animals held in association with any criminal prosecution of animal abuse and welfare cases, animals being held as evidence in a court filing, or rabies quarantine. The COUNTY agrees to assist the CITY in seeking reimbursement from the owner by providing invoices for all services provided. All services provided to each animal involved shall be charged as of the current date including but not limited to the following: IMP 1-collection; State Fine 1-collection, Board collection- all fees due; QT Board collection-if applicable; Rabies Vaccination collection- if applicable; DA2PPV collection; Bordatella collection; microchip collection; any and all medications provided to each animal; and personnel charges.

- **D.** Optional Services at City's Request. If requested by CITY, the daily flat rates for optional services shall be billed based on actual outreach days scheduled at the rates below:
- 1. **Vaccination or Spay/Neuter Clinic:** \$3,000 per event, flat rate billed on actual use. The service provided herein shall be free to constituents, with a two hundred (200) animal cap per vaccination clinic, or thirty (30) spay and/or neuter surgeries per spay/neuter clinic.
- 2. **Education Outreach Event:** \$2,553 per event, flat rate billed on actual use. The cost for staff an outreach event for the purpose of educating CITY constituents.

APPROVAL OF THE SECOND AMENDMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY AND STC TRAFFIC, INC. FOR ON-CALL

TRAFFIC ENGINEERING SERVICES

RECOMMENDATION

1) That the City Council approve the Second Amendment to the Agreement between the City of Jurupa Valley and STC Traffic, Inc. for On-Call Traffic Engineering Services and authorize the City Manager to execute the amendment in substantially the form and format attached and as approved by the City Attorney.

BACKGROUND

On January 3, 2022, the City published a Request for Proposals ("RFP") for On-Call Traffic Engineering Services. The scope of work included performing tasks such as traffic engineering studies, traffic operations analysis, design services, and other related studies and surveys. At the end of the solicitation period, the City received a total of 11 responsive proposals. On April 7, 2022, the City Council approved an Agreement between the City and STC Traffic, Inc. ("STC") to perform the traffic related services. STC is a well-established full-service exclusive traffic engineering consulting firm.

The Agreement between the City and STC contained a not to exceed amount of \$95,000.00 annually. Due to the high volume of development projects in the City, this amount was increased to \$150,000.00 annually with the approval of the First Amendment on March 16, 2023.

ANALYSIS

STC is performing an array of services to numerous projects within a timely and efficient manner. The majority of the services that have been provided thus far were reimbursable

through development projects and capital improvement projects. For services that could not be charged to development accounts, \$20,000.00 was allocated from the General Fund

With the influx of development occurring throughout the City and Public Works projects, STC has been vital in providing traffic engineering services to keep projects in motion. Due to the heavy workload, STC is approaching the not to exceed amount of \$150,000.00. For the City to continue rendering traffic engineering services, an amendment is needed to increase the not to exceed amount. The proposed Second Amendment will increase STC's Agreement to \$250,000.00 per fiscal year through the term of the Agreement. The impact to the General Fund is minimal as the funding will largely come from new development projects or capital improvement projects.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

If the Second Amendment is approved, the not to exceed amount will be increased to \$250,000.00 per fiscal year throughout the term of the Agreement. The majority of services provided will continue to be reimbursed by new development projects or capital improvement projects.

SECOND AMENDMENT TO THE AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY AND STC TRAFFIC, INC. FOR ON-CALL TRAFFIC ENGINEERING SERVICES

This Second Amendment is made and effective as of June 15, 2023, between the City of Jurupa Valley, a municipal corporation ("City") and STC Traffic, Inc. ("Consultant"). In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. This Second Amendment is made with the respect to the following facts and purposes:
- A. On April 7, 2022, the City and Contractor entered into that certain Agreement entitled "AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY AND STC TRAFFIC, INC. FOR ON-CALL TRAFFIC ENGINEERING SERIVCES."
- B. On March 16, 2023, the City and Consultant entered into that certain First Amendment to the original agreement, which increased the annual compensation to One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) for the total term of the Agreement.
- C. The original Agreement as amended by the First Amendment shall be collectively referred to as the "Agreement."
- D. The City and Consultant now desire to amend the Agreement as set forth in this Amendment.
- 2. Section 4.A of the Agreement is hereby amended to read as follows:

4. PAYMENT

- A. The City agrees to cause Consultant to be paid monthly, in accordance with the payment rates and terms and the schedule of payments as set forth in Exhibit B, Fee Schedule, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference as though set forth in full, based upon actual time spent on the above tasks. This amount shall not exceed Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) each fiscal year for the total term of the Agreement unless additional payment is approved as provided in this Agreement.
- 5. The person or persons executing this Agreement on behalf of Contractor warrants and represents that he or she has the authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of the Contractor and has the authority to bind Contractor to the performance of its obligations hereunder.
- 6. Except for the changes specifically set forth herein, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

RECOMMENDATION

1) That the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2023-42, entitled:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING A LIST OF PROJECTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023/24 FUNDED BY SB 1: THE ROAD REPAIR AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT OF 2017

BACKGROUND

The City's street system connects over 45 square miles of residential, commercial, industrial, urban, rural and transitional uses. This network consists of over 300 centerline miles and more than 700 lane miles of streets that the City is responsible to maintain. One of the main sources for roadway capital improvement projects is from Senate Bill 1 (SB1).

On April 28th, 2017, Governor Brown signed SB1, which created the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA) to address deferred maintenance on the state highway and local streets and roads systems. SB1 requires the City to meet specific reporting and accountability requirements established by the California Transportation Commission (CTC).

ANALYSIS

The CTC Resolution G-18-08 specifies that prior to receiving an apportionment of RMRA funds in a fiscal year, a city or county must submit to the CTC a list of projects proposed to be completed with these funds. To receive the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 RMRA funds, the City must submit a City Council-approved list of projects to the CTC by July 1, 2023 (Attachment A).

The City is expected to receive approximately \$2,553,620 of RMRA funding in FY 2023/2024. There are three projects included in the FY 2023/2024 program year funded either in whole or partially with RMRA, shown below:

Crestmore Road Pavement Rehabilitation

- Mission Boulevard to Loring Ranch Road
- Includes roughly 7,200 linear feet of pavement rehabilitation or reconstruction as well as signing and striping
- Estimated useful life of 15-20 years
 Anticipated schedule: Complete construction by Spring 2024

Etiwanda Ave Boulevard Pavement Rehabilitation

- Philadelphia Street to Bellegrave Ave
- Includes roughly 12,400 linear feet of pavement rehabilitation or reconstruction as well as signing and striping
- Estimated useful life of 15-20 years
- o Anticipated schedule: Complete construction by Spring 2024

Mission Blvd Pavement Rehabilitation

- Riverview Drive to Crestmore Road
- Includes roughly 5,300 linear feet of pavement rehabilitation or reconstruction as well as signing and striping
- Estimated useful life of 15-20 years
 Anticipated schedule: Complete construction by Spring 2024

The list may change if unforeseen conditions arise or new information regarding other street-related projects becomes available.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

These budgets do not require any General Fund monies.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING A LIST OF PROJECTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-24 FUNDED BY SB 1: THE ROAD REPAIR AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT OF 2017

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 1 (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (Chapter 5, Statutes of 2017) was passed by the Legislature and Signed into law by the governor in April 2017 to address the significant multi-modal transportation funding shortfalls statewide; and

WHEREAS, SB 1 includes accountability and transparency provisions that will ensure the residents of our City are aware of the projects proposed for funding in our community and which projects have been completed each fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the City must adopt by resolution a list of projects proposed to receive fiscal year funding from the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA), created by SB 1, which must include a description and the location of each proposed project, a proposed schedule for the project's completion, and the estimated useful life of the improvement; and

WHEREAS, the City, will receive an estimated \$2,553,620 in RMRA funding in Fiscal Year 2023-24 from SB 1; and

WHEREAS, this is the fifth year in which the City is receiving SB 1 funding and will enable the City to continue essential road maintenance and rehabilitation projects, safety improvements, repairing and replacing aging bridges, and increasing access and mobility options for the traveling public that would not have otherwise been possible without SB 1; and

WHEREAS, the City used a Pavement Management System to develop the SB 1 project list to ensure revenues are being used on the most high-priority and cost-effective projects that also meet the communities priorities for transportation investment; and

WHEREAS, the funding from SB 1 will help the City maintain and rehabilitate 1.1 centerline miles of pavement with one project throughout the City this year and many similar projects into the future; and

WHEREAS, the City's roads have an average pavement condition index (PCI) of 52 which is considered to be in "poor" condition and this revenue will help us increase the overall quality of our road system over the next decade into a "fair" to "good" condition; and

WHEREAS, the SB 1 project list and overall investment in our local streets and roads infrastructure with a focus on basic maintenance and safety, investing in complete streets infrastructure, and using cutting-edge technology, materials and practices, will have significant positive co-benefits statewide.

NOW, THEREFORE IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, ORDERED AND FOUND by the City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley, State of California, as follows:

RAILROAD, NW CORNER OF APN 163-400-046

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1. Accept the offer of dedication of an easement for the purpose of accessing the storm drain line over private property, as described on the attached Grant of Easement (DED22-006).
- Authorize the Director of Public Works and City Clerk to sign the Acceptance of Dedication for DED22-006.

BACKGROUND

On November 4 2021, the Jurupa Valley City Council approved TTM No.37714 for Appaloosa Springs. A residential subdivision of 67.67 combined acres into 254 single family residential lots on 25.59 acres. The project site is located a 6501 Clay Street (APNS: 163- 400-001 & 052) and bounded by the Union Pacific Railroad Company (UPRR) right-of-way on the south.

On June 1 2023, the Jurupa Valley City Council approved an agreement with the Union Pacific Railroad Company (UPPR) for the access and maintenance of this storm line within the UPRR right- of-way.

ANALYSIS

As part of extending utilities to the project site, a 36" storm drain pipe is required to be installed under the UPRR crossing inside a 48" steel casing, connecting offsite to Van Buren Boulevard. The applicant prepared a Grant of Easement document that provides the City of Jurupa Valley the rights to access the public storm drain line and the rights to use, maintain and operate the storm drain line. Exhibit B of the Grant of Easement (DED22-006) depicts the boundary of the proposed easement. Staff reviewed the documents, and found them in compliance with the California Government Code (7050) and local ordinances.

In anticipation of the acceptance of offer of easement dedications, staff prepared a Certificate of Acceptance as required by Government Code Section 27281. Acceptance of the offers of dedication will grant the City with the rights over such land to improve and maintain the public irrigation line.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no anticipated impact to the general fund.

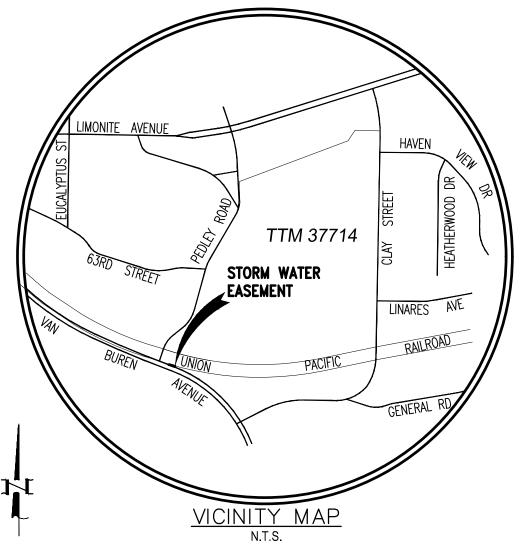

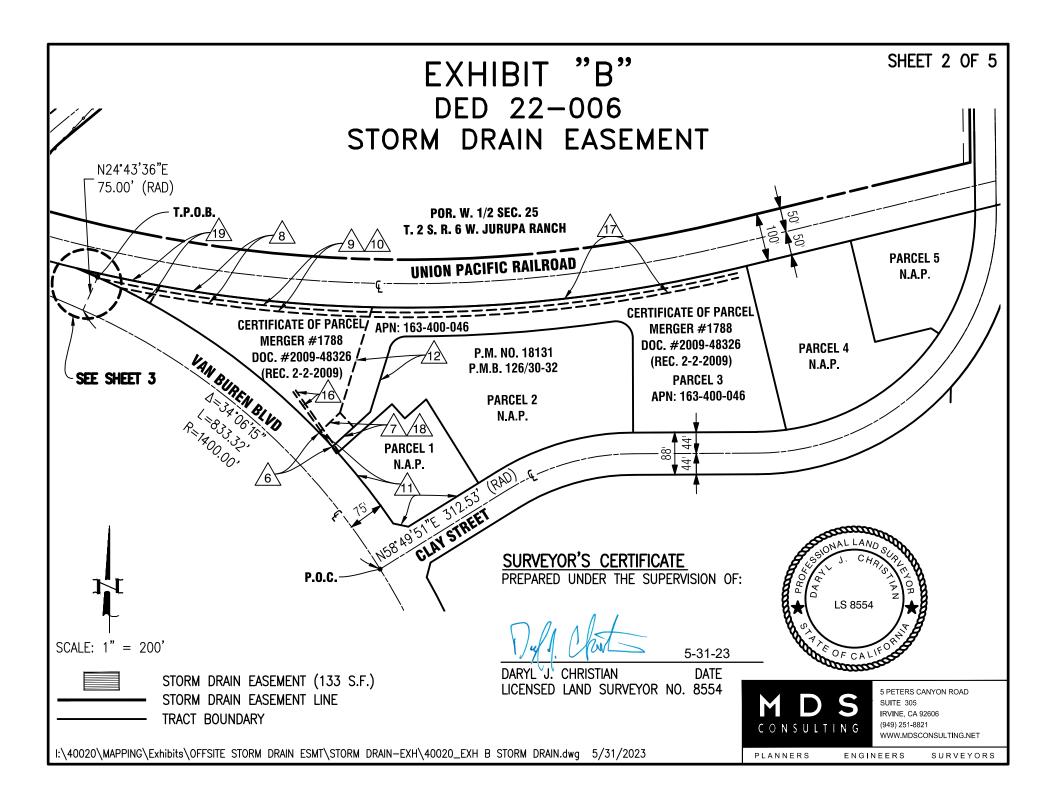

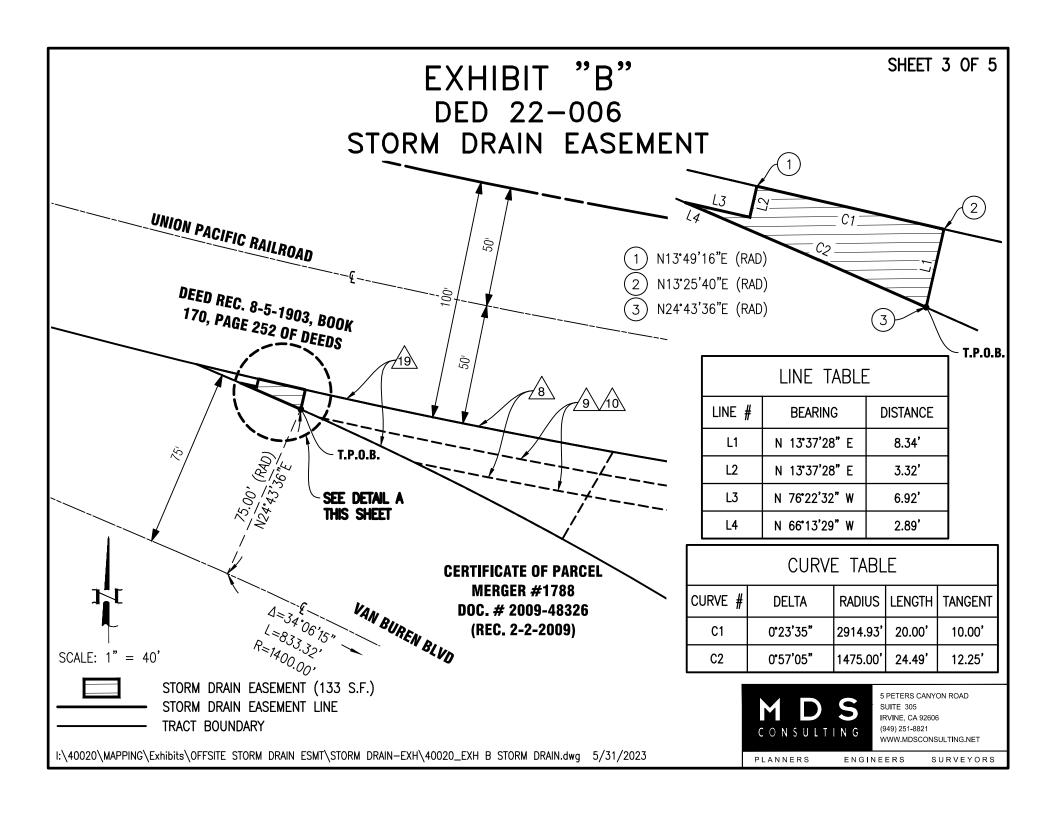

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING PARTICIPATION IN AND APPROVING THE AMENDED AND RESTATED JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT OF THE FIRE RISK MANAGEMENT SERVICES JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY

2) Authorize the City Manager, or designee, to executive all documents pursuant to the proposed agreement, including the ability to make minor non-substantive changes.

BACKGROUND

The Fire Districts Association of the California Employment Benefits Association (FDAC EBA) and Fire Agencies Self-Insurance System (FASIS) will consolidate, effective July 1, 2023, to form Fire Risk Management Services (FRMS). FRMS is a multi-line risk pool providing eligible fire districts and public agencies that provide emergency services employee benefits coverage and workers' compensation to eligible fire districts in California.

The FDAC EBA and FASIS Consolidation Advisory Committee has met regularly over the past twelve months to work toward streamlining the financial and administrative services via a consolidation of the two programs. At the Special Board of Directors Meeting on

February 22, 2023, the FASIS and FDAC EBA Boards unanimously approved the FRMS Amended and Restated Joint Powers Agreement (JPA), effective, July 1, 2023.

In accordance with the Joint Powers Agreement, the FDAC Fire Benefits Authority, Article, 14 states:

"This Joint Powers Agreement may be amended by an amendment in writing signed by two-thirds of the Agencies then parties to this Agreement."

Signatories to the Agreement will require approval from their respective governing bodies. To aid in this endeavor, the attached resolution allows for approval of the Agreement and authorize the designated executive officer to execute, thus enabling participation in FRMS, effective July 1, 2023.

At this time, the City only participates in the Self-Funded Plans (Medical, Dental, and Vision) with the FDAC EBA and will continue to participate in these plans for a three-year term under the FRMS Amended and Restated Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) effective July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2026.

Currently, the City does not participate in the FRMS JPA Risk Management Program. The City will continue its third party agreements with the Public Entity Risk Management Authority (PERMA) for the General Liability Program and the Special District Risk Management Authority (SDRM) for the Workers' Compensation Program.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The amended and restated of the FRMS JPA Agreement has no impact on General Funds.

ALTERNATIVES

Reject or amend the agreement with Fire Risk Management Services (Formerly FDAC Employee Benefits Authority).

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING PARTICIPATION IN AND APPROVING THE AMENDED AND RESTATED JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT OF THE FIRE RISK MANAGEMENT SERVICES JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, the Fire Agencies Self Insurance System (FASIS) was formed in 1984 for the purpose of jointly funding losses and providing risk management services to reduce such losses by and among California fire protection and community services districts; and

WHEREAS, the FDAC Employment Benefits Authority (FDAC EBA) was formed in 2005 to establish, operate, manage, and administer health and welfare benefit programs for the benefit of the existing and retired officers, employees and members of the legislative body of the California public agencies who are members of FDAC EBA; and

WHEREAS, following the exploration and in-depth analysis of a strategic partnership, the Board of Directors of FASIS and FDAC EBA directed the merger of the two programs, effective July 1, 2023, to provide comprehensive and cost-effective coverage programs through a responsive risk pool for fire service agencies; and

WHEREAS, FASIS and FDAC EBA have agreed that FASIS will change its name to Fire Risk Management Services (FRMS) and adopt an amended and restated joint exercise of powers agreement, and that FDAC EBA will assign its rights and liabilities to FRMS and adopt the same agreement as its own; and

WHEREAS, the amended and restated agreement allows FRMS to operate the programs previously operated by both FDAC EBA and FASIS, and admit members that would have been eligible to join either FDAC EBA or FASIS in the past; and

WHEREAS, City of Jurupa Valley is currently a member of FDAC EBA, and the City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley finds it in the best interest of City of Jurupa Valley to continue participating in and obtaining self-insurance coverage services from FRMS program; and

WHEREAS, FRMS requires the City of Jurupa Valley to pass a resolution expressing the desire and commitment of City of Jurupa Valley to approve the amended and restated joint exercise of powers agreement of FRMS and continue participation in FRMS, which requires a new three-year minimum participation period.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley approves the Amended and Restated Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for FRMS, as presented; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council authorizes the City Manager to sign the Amended and Restated Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement that shall enable the City of Jurupa Valley to continue participating in the joint self-insurance programs provided by FRMS.

3) MAKE OTHER MINOR EDITS AND CORRECTIONS

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council initiate a General Plan Technical Amendment to: 1) amend Table 2-4 'Summary of General Plan Land Use Designations' to add minimum residential densities; 2) amend Table 2-5 'General Plan Land Use Designations and Consistent Zone Districts' to correct inaccuracies; and 2) make other minor edits and corrections.

BACKGROUND

The City's first General Plan was adopted by the City Council on September 7, 2017. Adoption of the General Plan was the culmination of over two years of public input, research, analysis and deliberation which resulted in a robust planning document tailored to the City's unique characteristics and circumstances. The General Plan consists of 10 chapters or "elements" that cover major planning topics. In addition to the seven Statemandated elements (Land Use, Mobility, Housing, Conservation, Open Space, Safety and Noise), the General Plan includes five "optional" elements: Community Services and Facilities (combined with the Safety Element), Air Quality, Environmental Justice, Healthy Communities, and Economic Sustainability.

From time to time, amendments to the General Plan are needed to reflect specific issues in the community. The City Council has approved several amendments to the General Plan since adoption, including amendments to change the land use designations on specific properties and a comprehensive update to the Housing Element in December of 2021.

As outlined in Jurupa Valley Municipal Code Section 9.30.040, "Technical" General Plan Amendments "involve changes of a technical nature including, without limitation: statistical corrections; mapping error corrections; changes in spheres of influence and city boundaries; changes in Communities of Interest; editorial clarifications that do not change the intent of the General Plan' or appendix information useful in interpreting the General Plan but which does not change the General Plan intent." Like other General Plan Amendments, Technical General Plan Amendments are subject to Section 9.30.040.B, Initiation of Amendment Proceedings, which provides that the City Council may adopt an order to initiate General Plan Amendment proceedings at any time and that such an order shall not require a public hearing and shall not imply that any such amendment will be approved.

ANALYSIS

The City has identified a number of corrections, clarifications and editorial edits to the General Plan which require initiation of a General Plan Technical Amendment. Proposed amendments include amendments to Tables 2-4 and 2-5, as well as other editorial corrections and clarifications as described below.

Table 2-4 – Summary of General Plan Land Use Designations

Table 2-4 of the General Plan includes a comprehensive listing of all of the land use designations in the City, including the maximum density allowed for each residential designation, the floor area ratio allowed for non-residential designation, and other notes and information.

The 2021-2029 Housing Element includes Action Item 1.1.8 which requires the City to update General Plan density provisions to establish minimum density requirements in addition to maximum densities. This was included at the request of the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) to prevent low-density development in areas planned for higher density and ensure consistency with State law. Thus, amendments to Table 2-4 are proposed to add minimum density thresholds to each residential land use category thereby creating density 'ranges' that proposed development must achieve.

Table 2-5 - General Plan Land Use Designations and Consistent Zone Districts

Table 2-5 includes a summary of the City's land use designations and identifies which zones are consistent with each designation. However, one designation is missing and several consistent zones are not included with the appropriate land use designations. Modifications are proposed to correct the inaccuracies and include the missing designation and zones.

Other Corrections and Clarifications

A number of other corrections and clarifications are proposed to correct inaccurate table and figure references and add approval information for key General Plan Amendments. In addition, the title of the document is proposed to be changed from "2017 General Plan" to "General Plan" as the reference to the adoption year has caused confusion about whether the plan horizon year was 2017, and to clarify the document continues to be the City's long-range planning vision.

NOTICING REQUIREMENTS

The initiation of a General Plan Technical Amendment is not subject to any noticing requirements.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

Initiation of a General Plan Technical Amendment is not a "project" per Section 15378 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as it has no potential for resulting in a physical change in the environment and thus is not subject to CEQA. If initiated, the proposed General Plan Technical Amendment would be reviewed pursuant to CEQA and the City's local CEQA Guidelines.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Costs associated with processing the General Plan Technical Amendment are covered by the General Fund.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. <u>Recommended Action</u>: That the City Council initiate a General Plan Technical Amendment to: 1) amend Table 2-4 'Summary of General Plan Land Use Designations' to add minimum residential densities; 2) amend Table 2-5 'General Plan Land Use Designations and Consistent Zone Districts' to correct inaccuracies; and 2) make other minor edits and corrections:

BACKGROUND

Upon incorporation on July 1, 2011, the City of Jurupa Valley assumed the responsibility for certain L&LMD No. 89-1-C zones now within the City's jurisdictional boundaries. As such, the City is now responsible for the services and charges provided by L&LMD No. 89-1-C zones within its boundaries.

On February 4, 2016, the City adopted Resolution 2016-01, which clarified the City of Jurupa Valley Landscape and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-C (JV L&LMD No. 89-1-C) is separate and distinct from the County of Riverside Landscape and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-C. JV L&LMD No. 89-1-C maintains and services 77 locations throughout the City of Jurupa Valley. The District contains 47 landscaping assessment zones and 21 street lighting assessment zones as described in Attachment A. The annual levy of assessments on the parcels within the boundaries of JV L&LMD No. 89-1-C is consistent with the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.

ANALYSIS

Adoption of Resolution Nos. 2023-47 and 2023-48 will allow the City of Jurupa Valley to collect funds to maintain this Landscape and Lighting Maintenance District.

Consistent with the City Council's direction regarding compliance with Article XIIID of the California Constitution and the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, the attached resolutions have been prepared and a public hearing scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on July 6, 2023 to receive testimony for and against the proposed assessments.

OTHER INFORMATION

Zone 95, Zone 102, Zone 128, Zone 141, Zone 142, Zone C, Zone DD, Street Lighting Zone 69 are not yet maintained and assessed. Should that status remain the same prior to submission of fixed charges to the County of Riverside Auditor Controller's Office, the assessment will not be submitted and therefore not collected.

Zone P, Zone W, Zone Y, Zone DD, Zone EE, Zone FF, Zone II and Street lighting Zone 2-G are expected to start maintenance in Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The annual budget for fiscal year 2023-24 totals \$2,168,682.

Provide staff with further direction.

As a matter of urgency this item must appear on the June 15, 2023 City Council agenda in order to set the July 6, 2023 public hearing; failure to do so will result in loss of District revenue for FY 2023-24 for the maintenance of landscaping, trails, fencing, fossil filters and street lights within certain areas of the City of Jurupa Valley.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Take no action. This would mean that the City of Jurupa Valley could not continue collecting assessments to pay for maintenance of improvements in these specific rights-of-way and would need to discontinue (a) the maintenance of landscaping, trails, fencing, and irrigation services to these areas, in certain zones, (b) maintaining the fossil filters in certain zones as required by the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board regarding compliance with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit, and (c) paying Edison for street light energy costs in certain zones.

- 5. As of the date of this report, there is one parcel within Zone 4 that is owned by the City of Jurupa Valley. Parcel identified by Assessor Parcel Number 163-042-043 is the location of Jurupa Valley City Hall. Federal, State, and other local government agency's owned lots do not benefit from the maintained improvements.
- 6. As of the date of this report, there is three parcels within Zone 16 that is owned by the City of Jurupa Valley. Parcel identified by Assessor Parcel Numbers 181052017, 181052018, and 181052004 correspond to the location of Jurupa Valley Operation Center. Federal, State, and other local government agency's owned lots do not benefit from the maintained improvements.

PART I – PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

Backround

This combined Annual Engineer's Report is prepared in compliance with the requirements of Article 4, Chapter 1, of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 ("1972 Act"), which is Part 2, Division 15 of the California Streets and Highways Code.

Since the Passage of Proposition 218, Right to Vote on Taxes Act, which added Articles XIII (C) and XIII (D) to the California Constitution, new procedures must be followed to levy annual assessments under the 1972 Act. Proposition 218 requires that all annual assessments be supported by a detailed Engineer's Report ("Report") prepared by a registered professional engineer. The Report includes the information required by law.

The 1972 Act provides for the annual levy of assessments for the Jurupa Valley Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-C, for the express purpose of installing, maintaining, and servicing of the following:

- Landscaping, including trees, shrubs, grass, or other ornamental vegetation; Statuary, fountains, and other ornamental structures;
- Public lighting facilities, including traffic signals;
- Appurtenant facilities necessary for the maintenance or servicing thereof, including walls, sidewalks, and removal of debris; and
- Maintenance and/or servicing of any of the foregoing, including the removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste; and the cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti.

The cost associated with the installation, maintenance, and servicing of the improvements may be assessed against those properties which are specially benefited by the installation, maintenance, and servicing. A City may levy annual assessments for an assessment district after complying with the requirements of the 1972 Act, and the provisions in Proposition 218.

The City initiates proceedings for the annual levy of assessments by passing a resolution, which proposed the annual levy under the 1972 Act. This resolution also describes the improvements, describes the location of the District, and finally, orders an engineer, who is a registered professional engineer, certified by the State of California, to prepare and file a detailed report.

The Report prepared by the engineer must include maintenance plans for the improvements. The Report must also include an estimate of the costs of the improvements, a diagram, i.e., map of the District showing the boundary of the District, and an assessment of the estimated costs of the improvements against the parcels or lots which benefit from the improvements. Once the Report is completed, it is presented to the City Council for its review and approval as presented, or it may be modified and approved.

Once the Report is completed, it is presented to the City Council for its review and approval as presented, or it may be modified and approved. After preliminary approval of the Report, the City Council may adopt a Resolution of Intention, which declares its intent to levy the annual assessments against parcels within the existing District, describes the



improvements, and refers to the Report for details of the District. The Resolution of Intention also sets a time and place for a hearing on the annual levy of assessments for the District.

In accordance with Proposition 218, property owners of the assessed parcels must approve any new or increased assessments. Zones included in this Report have been previously approved by property owners in accordance with Proposition 218.

Part I – Plans and Specifications

A. INTRODUCTION

The Plans and Specifications portion of the report describes the improvements in the District. Plans and specifications for the improvements are as set forth on the list thereof, attached hereto, and are on file in the Office of the City Engineer of the City of Jurupa Valley.

Assessment Zone means the zones which include landscaping, water quality, streetlighting and other combinations of improvements. Streetlighting Zone means a zone that only includes streetlighting improvements which includes streetlights and traffic signals.

There are 77 locations within the District: 47 separate assessment zones with 56 locations (Zones 4, 5, and 21 have multiple locations), and 21 street lighting assessment zones with 21 locations.

There are 59 maintained locations within the City. Seventeen (17) locations within the District have no improvements or have not completed the turnover process and are, therefore, not yet maintained by the City; and one (1) location within the District consists of improvements currently maintained by the property owner(s) within the boundary of the respective zone. The Assessment Zones that have no improvements are zones 95, 102, 128, 141, 142, F, Z, DD and Street Lighting Zone 69. The City will begin maintenance of the improvements on seven (7) locations within the District on Fiscal Year 2023-2024; these locations are in Assessment District Zone G, P, W, Y, EE, FF, II and Street Lighting Zone 2-G.

The Annual Engineer's Report will cover the 68 existing Zones (77 locations). New or pending Zones will be presented to the City Council under separate reports.

C. DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES

The improvements for the District and Zones may be generally described as follows:

The installation, maintenance and servicing of landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities (also referred herein to as "streetlighting" or "traffic signals"), and appurtenant facilities, including walls (also referred herein to as "fencing"), sidewalks (also referred herein to as "multi purpose trail"), and debris removal facilities (also referred herein to as "bio-swales" or "fossil filters") are located in public rights-of-way within the boundaries of the Zones. Maintenance means the furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation, and servicing of any improvement, including: repair, removal, or replacement of all or part of any improvement; providing for the life, growth, health, and beauty of landscaping, including cultivation, irrigation, trimmings, spraying, fertilizing, or treatment for disease or injury; removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste; the cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti. Servicing means the furnishing of electricity for the lighting and operation of any ornamental structures, landscaping, and appurtenant facilities; water for the irrigation and control of the landscaping, and the maintenance of any of the ornamental structures, landscaping and appurtenant facilities.



Article XIII (D) of the California Constitution defines "maintenance and operation expenses" as "the cost of rent, repair, replacement, rehabilitation, fuel, power, electrical current, care and supervision necessary to properly operate and maintain a permanent public improvement". The District's funding includes, but is not limited to, the removal, repair, replacement and appurtenances, electrical energy, supplies, engineering and incidental costs relating to the maintenance and operation of the improvements benefiting the District's parcels.

PART II – METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

Part II – Method of Apportionment

INTRODUCTION

The 1972 Act permits the establishment of assessment districts by agencies for the purpose of providing certain public improvements, which include the construction, maintenance, and servicing of public lights, landscaping, dedicated easements for landscape use, and appurtenant facilities. The 1972 Act further provides that assessments may be apportioned upon all assessable lots or parcels of land within an assessment district in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each lot or parcel from the improvements rather than assessed value.

"The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be apportioned by any formula or method which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements."

The formula used for calculating assessments reflects the composition of the parcels and the improvements and services provided by the District to fairly apportion the costs based on the estimated benefit to each parcel.

In addition, Article XIII(D) of the California Constitution ("Article") requires that a parcel's assessment may not exceed the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel. The Article provides that only special benefits are assessable, and the City must separate the general benefits from the special benefits conferred on a parcel. A special benefit is a particular and distinct benefit over and above general benefits conferred on the public at large, including real property withinthe district. The general enhancement of property value does not constitute a special benefit.

SPECIAL BENEFIT

The maintenance of landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities, and appurtenant facilities provides direct and special benefit to those properties located within Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-Consolidated ("L&LMD No. 89-1-C" or "District").

Each and every lot or parcel within the District, receives a particular and distinct benefit from the improvements over and above general benefits conferred by the improvements. First, the improvements were conditions of approval for the creation or development of the parcels. In order to create or develop the parcels, the County or City required the original developer to install and/or guarantee the maintenance of the improvements, and appurtenant facilities serving the lots or parcels. Therefore, each and every lot or parcel within the District could not have been developed in the absence of the installation and expected maintenance of these facilities.

In addition, the improvements continue to confer a particular and distinct special benefit upon parcels within the District because of the nature of the improvements. The proper maintenance of of landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities, and appurtenant facilitiesspecially benefit parcels within the District by moderating temperatures, providing oxygenation, attenuating noise from adjacent streets and controlling dust for those properties in close proximity to the landscaping. Improved erosion and water quality control, dust abatement, increased public safety (e.g., control sight distance restrictions and fire hazards), improved neighborhood property protection and aesthetics. The spraying and treating of landscaping for disease reduces the likelihood of insect infestation and other diseases spreading to landscaping



located throughout the properties within the District. Streetlights also provide safety for pedestrians and motorists living and owning property in the District during the nighttime hours, and to assign right-ofways for the safety of pedestrians and motorists by defining a specific path during all hours of the day.

Landscaping, Ornamental Structures, and Appurtenant Facilties

The proper maintenance of the landscaping, ornamental structures, and appurtenant facilities reduces property-related crimes (especially vandalism) against properties in the District through the screening of properties within the District from arterial streets.

Finally, the proper maintenance of landscaping, graffiti abatement, and appurtenant structures improves the attractiveness of the properties within the District. This provides a positive visual experience and provides an enhanced quality of life and sense of well-being for properties within the District.

Public Lighting Facilities

Streets provide an area for underground and overhead utilities. These elements are a distinct and special benefit to all developed parcels in the District.

Streetlights are determined to be an integral part of "streets" as a "permanent public improvement." One of the principal purposes of fixed roadway lighting is to create a nighttime environment conducive to quick, accurate, and comfortable seeing for the user of the facility. These factors, if attained, combine to improve traffic safety and achieve efficient traffic movement. Fixed lighting can enable the motorist to see detail more distinctly and to react safely toward roadway and traffic conditions present on or near the roadway facility. Provision of a well lit roadway prevents damage to properties in the district from traffic accidents from poor visibility at night. Therefore, the installation of streetlights is for the express, special benefit of the parcels within the District.

Traffic signal assessments are based on traffic studies and/or trip counts. For specific zone benefits, see Part III Estimate of Costs and Expenses.

Summary

Because all benefiting properties consist of a uniform land use, it is determined that all lots or parcels benefit equally from the improvements and the costs and expenses for the provision of electricity for the streetlights and traffic signals and the maintenance of landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities, and appurtenant facilities, are apportioned on a per acre, per Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU), or per parcel basis.

Based on the benefits described above, landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities, and appurtenant facilities are an integral part of the quality of life of the District. This quality of life is a special benefit to those parcels that are not government-owned easements, utility easements, or flood channel parcels. Government-owned easement, utility easement and flood channel parcels do not benefit from the improvements due to their use and lack of habitation on such parcels. Parcels of this nature are usually vacant, narrow strips of land or flood control channels and therefore do not generate or experience pedestrian or vehicular traffic. Nor do these types of parcels support dwelling units or other structures that would promote frequent use of the parcels by the traveling public. As a result of this lack of activity on such parcels, they do not receive any benefit from landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities, and appurtenant facilities and are not assessed.



Special Benefit of Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-Consolidated Authorized Improvements and Services:

- The installation and planting of landscaping, including trees, shrubs, grass and other ornamental vegetation;
- The installation or construction of statuary, fountains and other ornamental structures and facilities;
- The installation or construction of public lighting facilities, including, but not limited to, traffic signals;
- The installation or construction of any facilities which are appurtenant to any of the foregoing, or which are
 necessary or convenient for the maintenance or servicing thereof, including, but not limited to, grading, clearing,
 removal of debris, the installation or construction of curbs, gutters, walls, sidewalks or paving, water irrigation,
 drainage or electrical facilities, and;
- The maintenance or servicing, or both, of any of the foregoing.

GENERAL BENEFIT

The total benefit from the works of improvement is a combination of the special benefits to the parcels within the District and the general benefits to the public at large and to adjacent property owners. The portion of the total landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities, and appurtenant facilities maintenance costs associated with general benefits will not be assessed to the parcels in the District, but will be paid from other City Funds. Because the landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities, and appurtenant facilities improvements are located immediately adjacent to properties within the District and are maintained solely for the benefit of the properties within the District, any benefit received by properties outside of the District will be in the proportions stated under Special Benefit. As a result, no property is assessed in excess of the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that property. However, some traffic signal improvements provide general and specific benefit. It was previously determined that the costs and expenses for the traffic signal improvements are less than the County's total maintenance cost. Percentages of the County's total maintenance costs were previously determined from budgets at the time of annexation by Riverside County Transportation Department. These percentages are noted on the applicable Fiscal Year 2023–2024 budgets for those Zones with traffic signal improvements in Part III, Estimate of Costs and Expenses. Therefore, only the costs directly related to the specific benefit of the traffic signal improvements will be assessed to the applicable Zones.



PART III – ESTIMATE OF COSTS AND EXPENSES

Part III – Estimate of Costs and Expenses

INTRODUCTION

The cost estimate contains each of the items specified in Section 22569 of the 1972 Act.

The 1972 Act provides that the estimated costs of the improvements shall include the total cost of the improvements for the entire fiscal year (2023-2024), including incidental expenses, which may include operating reserves.

The 1972 Act also provides that the amount of any surplus, deficit, or contribution be included in the estimated cost of improvements. The net amount to be assessed on the lots or parcels within the Zones is the total cost of installation, maintenance, and servicing with adjustments either positive or negative for reserves, surpluses, deficits, and/or contributions.

The inflation factor, for those zones with an inflation factor in place, may increase budgets for Zones, which have not been accepted for maintenance, as if assessed. However, the amount to levy may be credited resulting in a zero assessment.

Each succeeding fiscal year the maximum assessment for Zones 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, and 173, may be subject to an annual adjustment of two percent and the maximum assessment for Zones 14, 16, 17, 21, 34, 61, 73, 78, 95, 102, 106, 126, 128, 132, 137, 141, 142, 182, A, C, E, F, G, I, K, L, M, N, O, P, S, T, U, W, X, Y, Z, DD, EE, FF and II may be subject to an annual adjustment that is the greater of two percent or the cumulative percentage increase, if any, in the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for All Items or the CPI-U for Electricity (as applicable) for the Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario County CaliforniaStandard Metropolitan Statistical area or, as implemented on December 2017, Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario

Statistical area ("Index") published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor. The annual CPI-U for All Items or CPI-U for Electricity adjustment will be based on the cumulative increase, if any, in the Index as it stands on March of each year over the base Index. Any increase larger than the greater of two percent, the CPI-U for All Items, or CPI-U for Electricity annual adjustment requires a majority approval of all the property owners within each of the benefit zones in the District.

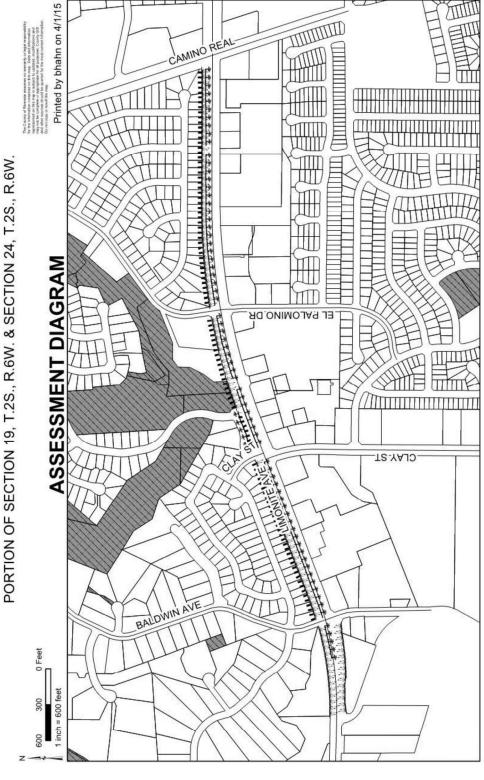

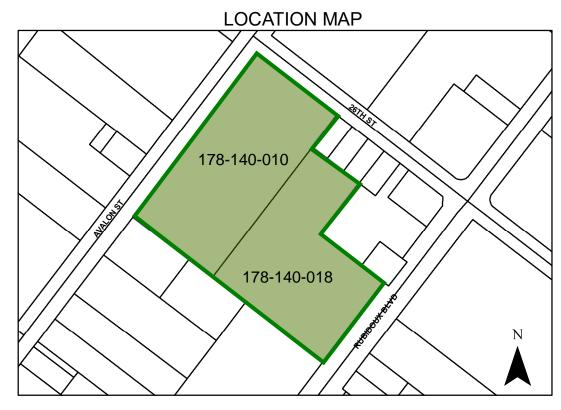

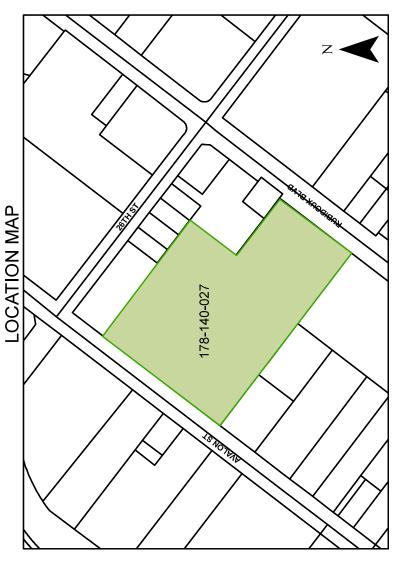

This Engineer's Report ("Report") has been prepared pursuant to the provisions 22565 through 22574 of the Landscape & Lighting Act of 1972, said act being Part 2 of Division 15 of the Streets and Highways and direction from the Jurupa Valley City Council of Riverside County. The Report describes the improvements which can be constructed, operated, maintained, and serviced by the District, and lists the maximum assessments that can be levied upon each assessable lot or parcel of land within each Zone of the District.

The Jurupa Valley City Council, pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, being Division 15 of the Streets and Highways Code of the State of California, adopt Resolution No. 2016-01 to initiate proceedings to form a special assessment district known and designated as:

Jurupa Valley Landscape and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-Consolidated ("JV L&LMD No. 89-1- C" or "District"); and,

WHEREAS, the Jurupa Valley City Council did direct the appointed Engineer to make and file an annual Report, in accordance with Article 4 (commencing with Section 22565) of Chapter 1 of Part 2 of Division 15 of the Streets and Highways Code, being and article of the aforementioned Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.

WHEREAS, Section 22567 of said Article 4 states the Report shall consist of the following:

- a. Plans for the improvements.
- b. An estimate of the maintenance costs of the improvements.
- c. A diagram for the assessment district.
- d. An assessment of the estimated costs of the maintenance of the improvements.

I hereby assess and apportion the total amount of the costs and expenses upon several parcels of land within said designated area liable therefore and benefited thereby, in proportion to the estimated benefits that each parcel receives, respectively, from said services.



Therefore, I, the appointed Engineer, acting on behalf of the City of Jurupa Valley, pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, respectfully submit the enclosed Engineer's Report:

- 1. Pursuant to the provisions of law, the costs and expenses of the District have been assessed upon the parcels of land in the District benefited thereby in direct proportion and relation to the estimated benefits to be received by each of said parcels. For particulars as to the identifications of said parcels, reference is made to the Assessment Diagram, a reduced copy of which is included herein.
- 2. As required by law, a Diagram is filed herewith, showing the District, as well as the boundaries and dimensions of the respective parcels and subdivisions of land within said District as the same exist each of which subdivisions of land or parcels or lots, respectively, have been given a separate number upon said Diagram and in the Assessment Roll contained herein.
- 3. The separate numbers given the subdivisions and parcels of land, as shown on said Assessment Diagram and Assessment Roll, correspond with the numbers assigned to each parcel by the Riverside County Assessor. Reference is made to the County Assessment Roll for a description of the lots or parcels.
- 4. As of the date of this report, there are no parcels or lots within Street Lighting Zones 5, 7, 15, 17, 19, 39, 41, 62, 69, 86, 91, 93, 94 102, 2-A, 2-B, 2-C, 2-D, 2-E and 2-F that are owned by a federal, state or other local governmental agency that will benefit from the services to be provided by the assessments to be collected.

In conclusion, it is my opinion that the assessments for Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-Consolidated have been spread in direct accordance with the benefits that each parcel receives from the items being financed.

PART I – PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

Background

This combined Annual Engineer's Report is prepared in compliance with the requirements of Article 4, Chapter 1, of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 ("1972 Act"), which is Part 2, Division 15 of the California Streets and Highways Code.

Since the Passage of Proposition 218, Right to Vote on Taxes Act, which added Articles XIII (C) and XIII (D) to the California Constitution, new procedures must be followed to levy annual assessments under the 1972 Act. Proposition 218 requires that all annual assessments be supported by a detailed Engineer's Report ("Report") prepared by a registered professional engineer. The Report includes the information required by law.

The 1972 Act provides for the annual levy of assessments for the Jurupa Valley Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-C, for the express purpose of installing, maintaining, and servicing of the following:

- Landscaping, including trees, shrubs, grass, or other ornamental vegetation; Statuary, fountains, and other ornamental structures;
- Public lighting facilities, including traffic signals;
- Appurtenant facilities necessary for the maintenance or servicing thereof, including walls, sidewalks, and removal of debris; and
- Maintenance and/or servicing of any of the foregoing, including the removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste; and the cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti.

The cost associated with the installation, maintenance, and servicing of the improvements may be assessed against those properties which are specially benefited by the installation, maintenance, and servicing. A City may levy annual assessments for an assessment district after complying with the requirements of the 1972 Act, and the provisions in Proposition 218.

The City initiates proceedings for the annual levy of assessments by passing a resolution, which proposed the annual levy under the 1972 Act. This resolution also describes the improvements, describes the location of the District, and finally, orders an engineer, who is a registered professional engineer, certified by the State of California, to prepare and file a detailed report.

The Report prepared by the engineer must include maintenance plans for the improvements. The Report must also include an estimate of the costs of the improvements, a diagram, i.e., map of the District showing the boundary of the District, and an assessment of the estimated costs of the improvements against the parcels or lots which benefit from the improvements. Once the Report is completed, it is presented to the City Council for its review and approval as presented, or it may be modified and approved.

After preliminary approval of the Report, the City Council may adopt a Resolution of Intention, which declares its intent to levy the annual assessments against parcels within the existing District, describes the



improvements, and refers to the Report for details of the District. The Resolution of Intention also sets a time and place for a hearing on the annual levy of assessments for the District.

In accordance with Proposition 218, property owners of the assessed parcels must approve any new or increased assessments. Zones included in this Report have been previously approved by property owners in accordance with Proposition 218.

Part I – Plans and Specifications

INTRODUCTION

The Plans and Specifications portion of the report describes the improvements in the District. Plans and specifications for the improvements are as set forth on the list thereof, attached hereto, and are on file in the Office of the City Engineer of the City of Jurupa Valley.

Assessment Zone means the zones which include landscaping, water quality, streetlighting and other combinations of improvements. Streetlighting Zone means a zone that only includes streetlighting improvements which includes streetlights and traffic signals.

There are 77 locations within the District: 47 separate assessment zones with 56 locations (Zones 4, 5, and 21 have multiple locations), and 21 street lighting assessment zones with 21 locations.

There are 59 maintained locations within the City. Seventeen (17) locations within the District have no improvements or have not completed the turnover process and are, therefore, not yet maintained by the City; and one (1) location within the District consists of improvements currently maintained by the property owner(s) within the boundary of the respective zone. The Assessment Zones that have no improvements are zones 95, 102, 128, 141, 142, F, Z, DD and Street Lighting Zone 69. The City will begin maintenance of the improvements on seven (7) locations within the District on Fiscal Year 2023-2024; these locations are in Assessment District Zone G, P, W, Y, EE, FF, II and Street Lighting Zone 2-G.

The Annual Engineer's Report will cover the 68 existing Zones (77 locations). New or pending Zones will be presented to the City Council under separate reports.

The installation, maintenance and servicing of landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities (also referred herein to as "streetlighting" or "traffic signals"), and appurtenant facilities, including walls (also referred herein to as "fencing"), sidewalks (also referred herein to as "multi purpose trail"), and debris removal facilities (also referred herein to as "bio-swales" or "fossil filters") are located in public rights-of-way within the boundaries of the Zones. Maintenance means the furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation, and servicing of any improvement, including: repair, removal, or replacement of all or part of any improvement; providing for the life, growth, health, and beauty of landscaping, including cultivation, irrigation, trimmings, spraying, fertilizing, or treatment for disease or injury; removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste; the cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti. Servicing means the furnishing of electricity for the lighting and operation of any ornamental structures, landscaping, and appurtenant facilities; water for the irrigation and control of the landscaping, and the maintenance of any of the ornamental structures, landscaping and appurtenant facilities.



Article XIII (D) of the California Constitution defines "maintenance and operation expenses" as "the cost of rent, repair, replacement, rehabilitation, fuel, power, electrical current, care and supervision necessary to properly operate and maintain a permanent public improvement". The District's funding includes, but is not limited to, the removal, repair, replacement and appurtenances, electrical energy, supplies, engineering and incidental costs relating to the maintenance and operation of the improvements benefiting the District's parcels.

DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES

The improvements for the District and Zones may be generally described as follows:

The installation, maintenance and servicing of landscaping, ornamental structures, public lighting facilities (also referred herein to as "street lighting"), and appurtenant facilities, including walls (also referred herein to as "fencing"), sidewalks, and debris removal facilities are located in public rights-of-way within the boundaries of the Zones. Maintenance means the furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation, and servicing of any improvement, including: repair, removal, or replacement of all or part of any improvement; providing for the life, growth, health, and beauty of landscaping, including cultivation, irrigation, trimmings, spraying, fertilizing, or treatment for disease or injury; removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste; the cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti. Servicing means the furnishing of electricity for the lighting and operation of any ornamental structures, landscaping, and appurtenant facilities; water for the irrigation and control of the landscaping, and the maintenance of any of the ornamental structures, landscaping and appurtenant facilities.

Article XIII (D) of the California Constitution defines "maintenance and operation expenses" as "the cost of rent, repair, replacement, rehabilitation, fuel, power, electrical current, care and supervision necessary to properly operate and maintain a permanent public improvement". The District's funding includes, but is not limited to, the removal, repair, replacement and appurtenances, electrical energy, supplies, engineering and incidental costs relating to the maintenance and operation of the improvements benefiting the District's parcels.

PART II - METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

Part II – Method of Apportionment

The 1972 Act permits the establishment of assessment districts by agencies for the purpose of providing certain public improvements, which include the construction, maintenance, and servicing of public lights, landscaping, dedicated easements for landscape use, and appurtenant facilities. The 1972 Act further provides that assessments may be apportioned upon all assessable lots or parcels of land within an assessment district in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each lot or parcel from the improvements rather than assessed value.

"The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be apportioned by any formula or method which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements."

The formula used for calculating assessments reflects the composition of the parcels and the improvements and services provided by the District to fairly apportion the costs based on the estimated benefit to each parcel.

In addition, Article XIII(D) of the California Constitution ("Article") requires that a parcel's assessment may not exceed the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel. The Article provides that only special benefits are assessable, and the City must separate the general benefits from the special benefits conferred on a parcel. A special benefit is a particular and distinct benefit over and above general benefits conferred on the public at large, including real property within the district. The general enhancement of property value does not constitute a special benefit.

SPECIAL BENEFIT

The maintenance of street lighting provides direct and special benefit to those properties located within Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-Consolidated ("L&LMD No. 89-1-C" or "District").

Each and every lot or parcel within the District, receives a particular and distinct benefit from the improvements over and above general benefits conferred by the improvements. First, the improvements were conditions of approval for the creation or development of the parcels. In order to create or develop the parcels, the County or City required the original developer to install and/or guarantee the maintenance of the improvements, and appurtenant facilities serving the lots or parcels. Therefore, each and every lot or parcel within the District could not have been developed in the absence of the installation and expected maintenance of these facilities.

In addition, the improvements continue to confer a particular and distinct special benefit upon parcels within the District because of the nature of the improvements. The proper maintenance of street lighting specially benefit parcels within the District by increasing public safety for both pedestrians and the motoring public, and increasing traffic safety by improving visibility. Street lighting also provides safety for pedestrians and motorists living and owning property in the District during the nighttime hours, and to assign right-of ways for the safety of pedestrians and motorists by defining a specific path during all hours of the day.



Streets are constructed for the safe and convenient travel of vehicles and pedestrians. They also provide an area for underground and overhead utilities. These elements are a distinct and special benefit to all developed parcels in the District. Streetlights are installed on and are for street purposes and are maintained and serviced to allow the street to perform to the standards it was designed.

Streetlights are determined to be an integral part of "streets" as a "permanent public improvement." One of the principal purposes of fixed roadway lighting is to create a nighttime environment conducive to quick, accurate, and comfortable seeing for the user of the facility. These factors, if attained, combine to improve traffic safety and achieve efficient traffic movement. Fixed lighting can enable the motorist to see detail more distinctly and to react safely toward roadway and traffic conditions present on or near the roadway facility.

The system of streets within the District is established to provide access to each parcel in the District. Streetlights provide a safer street environment for owners of the parcels served. If the parcels were not subdivided to provide individual parcels to owners within the District, there would be no need for a system of streets with streetlights. Therefore, the installation of streetlights is for the express, special benefit of the parcels within the District.

Finally, the servicing of streetlights provides an enhanced quality of life and sense of well-being for properties within the District.

Because all benefiting properties consist of a uniform land use, it is determined that all lots or parcels benefit equally from the improvements and the costs and expenses for the provision of electricity for the streetlights are apportioned on a per acre or per parcel basis.

Based on the benefits described above, streetlights are an integral part of the quality of life of the District. This quality of life is a special benefit to those parcels that are not government-owned easements, utility easements, or flood channel parcels. Government-owned easement, utility easement and flood channel parcels do not benefit from the improvements due to their use and lack of habitation on such parcels. Parcels of this nature are usually vacant, narrow strips of land or flood control channels and therefore do not generate or experience pedestrian or vehicular traffic. Nor do these types of parcels support dwelling units or other structures that would promote frequent use of the parcels by the traveling public. As a result of this lack of activity on such parcels, they do not receive any benefit from landscaping, multi-purpose trails, fencing, fossil filters, bio-swales, streetlights, traffic signals, bridge lights, and graffiti abatement and are not assessed.

<u>Special Benefit of Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1- Consolidated Authorized</u> Improvements and Services:

- The installation or construction of public lighting facilities, including traffic signals,
- The installation or construction of any facilities which are appurtenant to any of the foregoing, or which are
 necessary or convenient for the maintenance or servicing thereof, including, but not limited to, grading, clearing,
 removal of debris, the installation or construction of curbs, gutters, walls, sidewalks or paving, water irrigation,
 drainage or electrical facilities, and;
- The maintenance or servicing, or both, of any of the foregoing.

GENERAL BENEFIT

The total benefit from the works of improvement is a combination of the special benefits to the parcels within the District and the general benefits to the public at large and to adjacent property owners. The portion of the total streetlight servicing costs associated with general benefits will not be assessed to the parcels in the District, but will be paid from



other City Funds. Because the streetlights are located immediately adjacent to properties within the District and are maintained solely for the benefit of the properties within the District, any benefit received by properties outside of the District will be in the proportions stated under Special Benefit. As a result, no property is assessed in excess of the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that property.



PART III – ESTIMATE OF COSTS AND EXPENSES

Part III – Estimate of Costs and Expenses

INTRODUCTION

The cost estimate contains each of the items specified in Section 22569 of the 1972 Act.

The 1972 Act provides that the estimated costs of the improvements shall include the total cost of the improvements for the entire fiscal year (2023-2024), including incidental expenses, which may include operating reserves.

The 1972 Act also provides that the amount of any surplus, deficit, or contribution be included in the estimated cost of improvements. The net amount to be assessed on the lots or parcels within the Zones is the total cost of installation, maintenance, and servicing with adjustments either positive or negative for reserves, surpluses, deficits, and/or contributions.

The inflation factor, for those zones with an inflation factor in place, may increase budgets for Zones, which have not been accepted for maintenance, as if assessed. However, the amount to levy may be credited resulting in a zero assessment.

Each succeeding fiscal year the maximum assessment for Street Lighting Zones 5, 7, 15, 17, 19, 39, 41, 62, 69, 86, 91, 93, 94, 102, 2-A, 2-B, 2-C, 2-D, 2-E, 2-F and 2-G, may be subject to an annual adjustment that is the greater of two percent or the cumulative percentage increase, if any, in the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for Electricity (as applicable) for the Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario County California Standard Metropolitan Statistical area or, as implemented on December 2017, Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario Statistical area ("Index") published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor. The annual CPI-U for All Items or CPI-U for Electricity adjustment will be based on the cumulative increase, if any, in the Index as it stands on March of each year over the base Index. Any increase larger than the greater of two percent, the CPI-U for All Items, or CPI-U for Electricity annual adjustment requires a majority approval of all the property owners within each of the benefit zones in the District.

There is a two percent proposed inflationary increase in the maximum assessment per parcel or per acre as applicable in Street Lighting Zones 7, 41, 62, 69, 86, 93, and 102 over the maximum assessment for fiscal year 2022-2023 (if applicable), and is consistent with ballot proposition approved by the qualified electors when establishing said zones.

BUDGET SHEETS PER ZONE

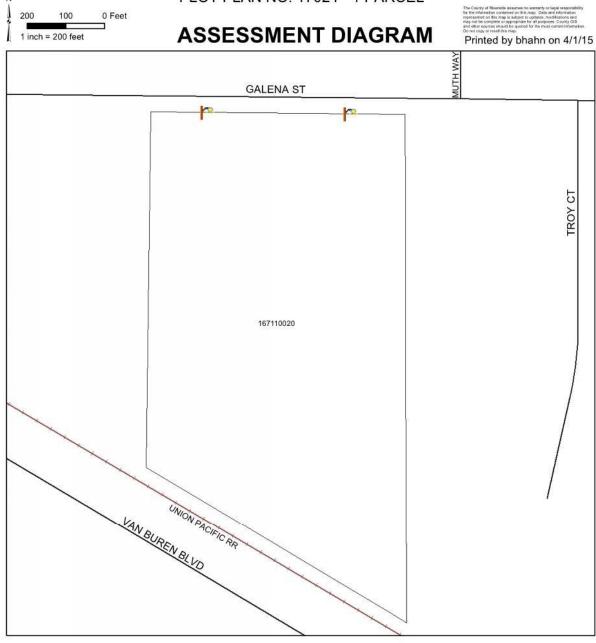

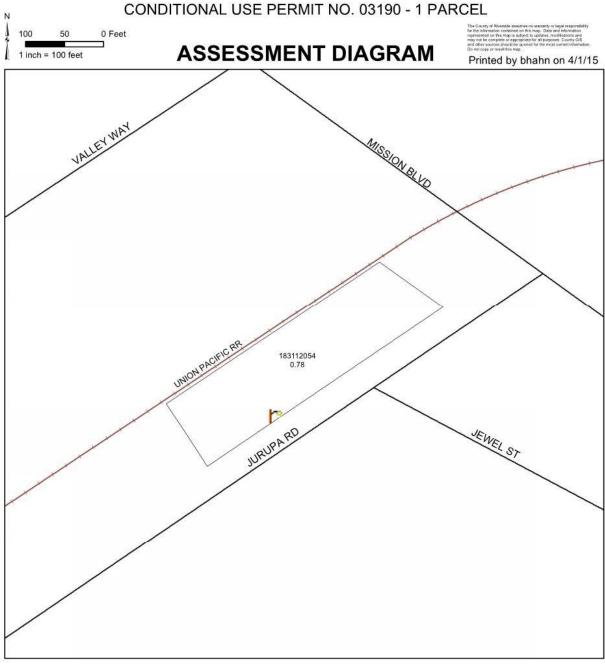
STREET LIGHTING ZONE 5

PORTION OF SECTION 15, T.2S., R.6W. PLOT PLAN NO. 17024 - 1 PARCEL

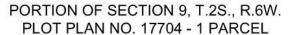


STREET LIGHTING ZONE 7

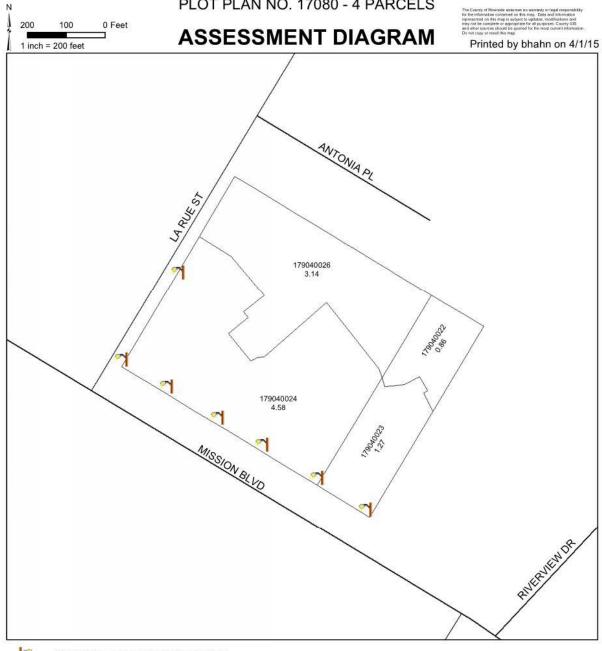

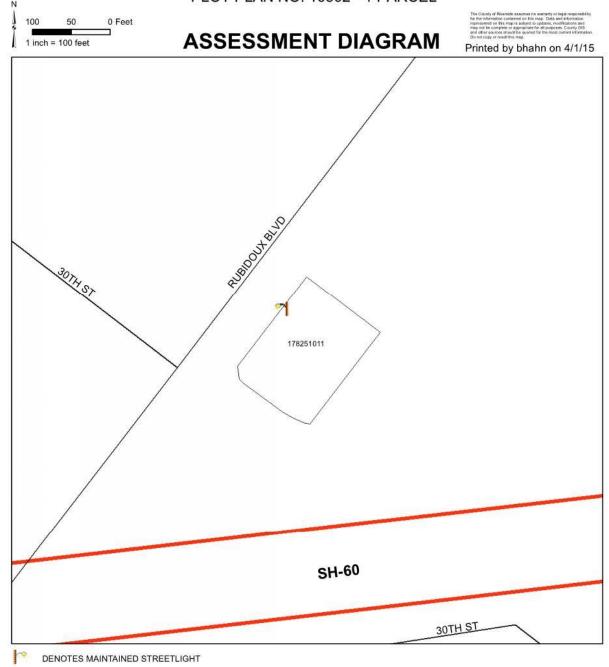
STREET LIGHTING ZONE 17

PORTION OF SECTION 16, T.2S., R.5W. PLOT PLAN NO. 17080 - 4 PARCELS



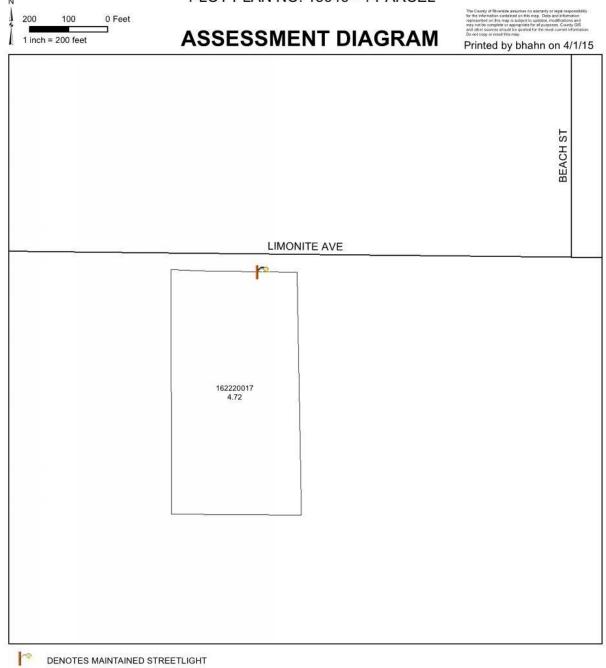
STREET LIGHTING ZONE 19

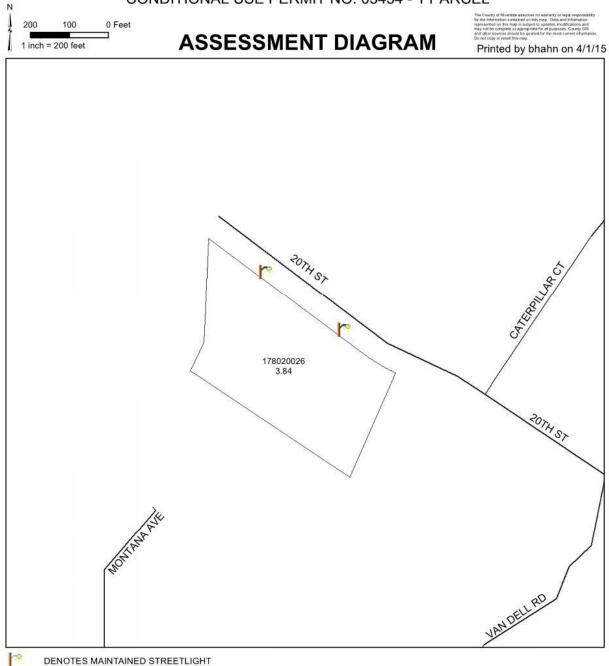

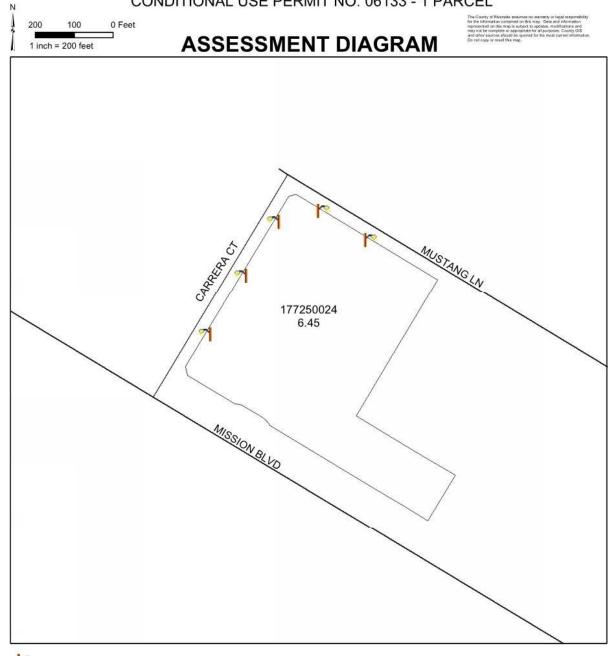

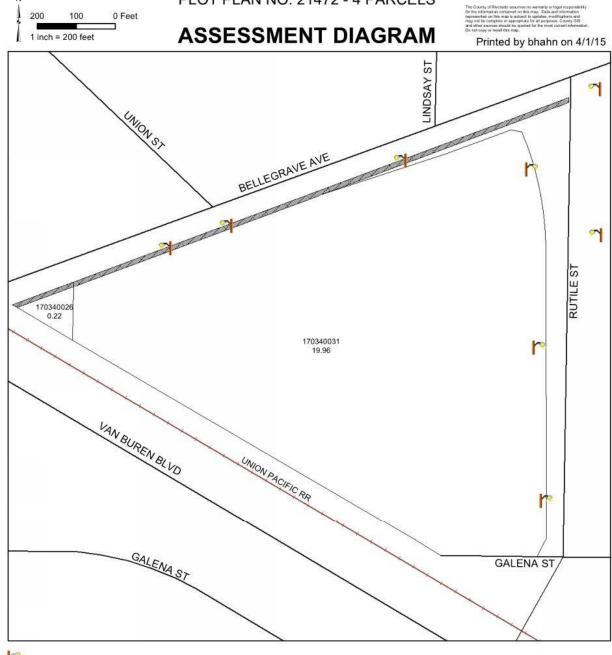

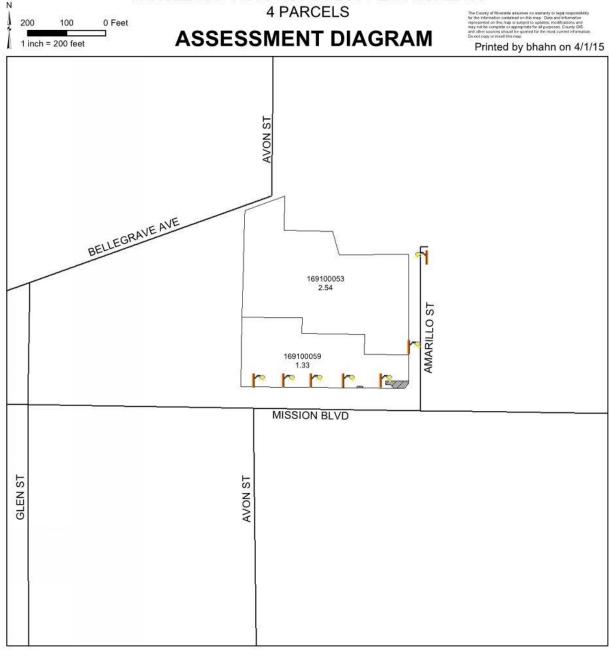
PORTION OF SECTION 10, T.2S., R.6W. PLOT PLAN NO. 21472 - 4 PARCELS

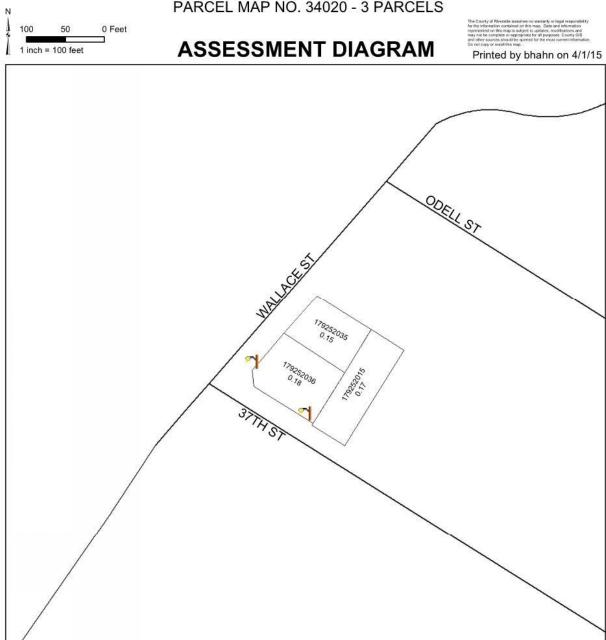

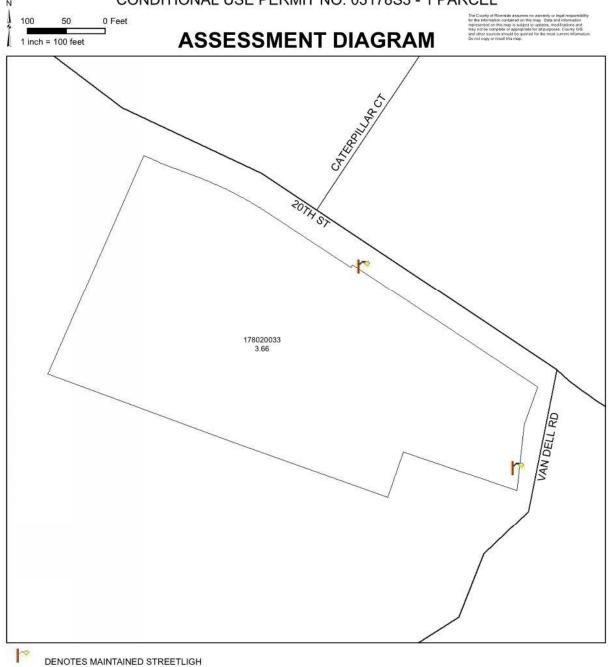

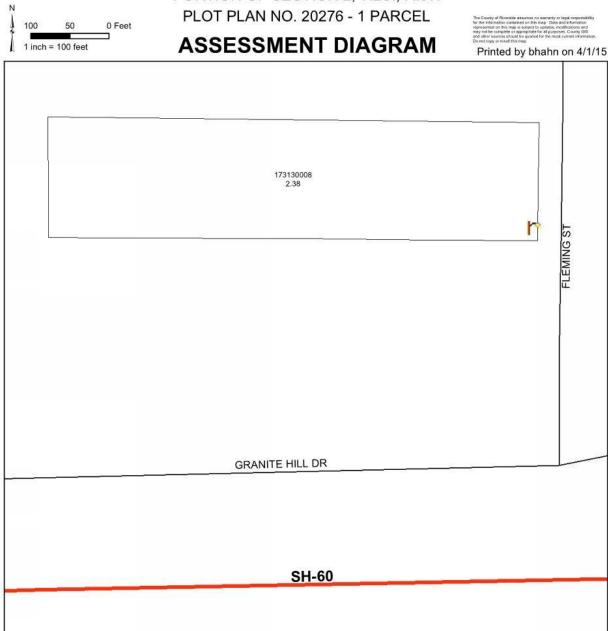

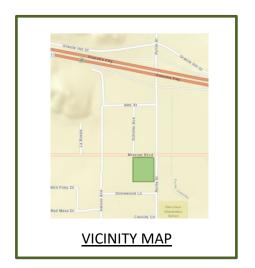

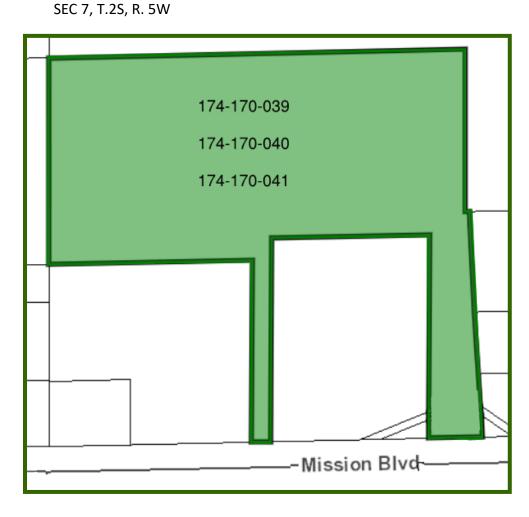

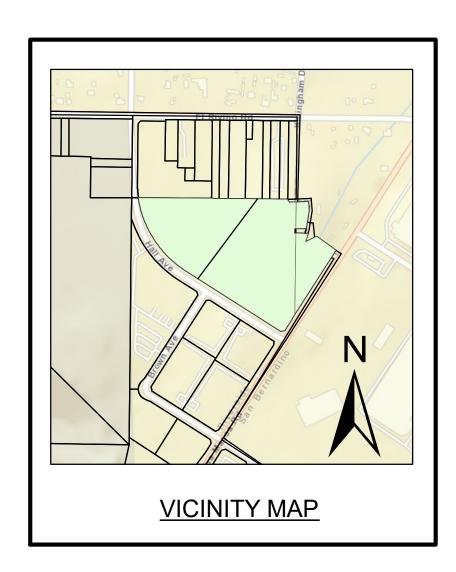

In addition, Zone C is authorized to provide the following:

- (b) The maintenance of trail along the boundary frontage per approved landscape plans.

In addition, Zones E, F, G, K, L, M, N, O, P, T, W and Y are authorized to provide the following:

(a) The maintenance and servicing of streetlights within the public right-of ways including incidental costs and expenses

In addition, Zone I is authorized to provide the following:

- (a) The maintenance and servicing of streetlights within the public right-of ways including incidental costs and expenses.
- (b) The maintenance of trail along the boundary frontage per approved landscape plans.

The Report proposes no inflationary increase in the assessment per acre, per unit or per parcel as applicable in Zones 5, 61, 95, 102, 126, 128, 141, and 142 over the assessment levied for fiscal year 2022-23 and is consistent with ballot proposition approved by the qualified electors when establishing said zones. The Report proposes a 4.57% inflationary increase in the assessment per acre, per unit or per parcel as applicable in Zones 14, 16, 17, 21, 34, 73, 78, 106, 132, 137, 182, A, C, E, F, G, I, K, L, M, N, O, P, S, W over the assessment levied for fiscal year 2022-23 and is consistent with ballot proposition approved by the qualified electors when establishing said zones. Fiscal year 2023-2024 is the first year of assessment for Zone DD, EE, FF, II and Streetlight Zone 2-G, therefore, no inflationary increase is applied for the fiscal year 2023-2024 levy. The Report proposes a 10.17 % inflationary increase in the assessment per acre or per parcel as applicable in Street Lighting Zones 5, 7, 15, 17, 19, 39, 41, 62, 69, 86, 91, 93, 94, 102,

2-A, 2-B, 2-C, 2-D, 2-E, and 2-F over the assessment levied for fiscal year 2022-23 and is consistent with ballot proposition approved by the qualified electors when establishing said zones.

There are no parcels or lots within said zones that are owned by a federal or state governmental agency. There are four parcels or lots within said zones that are owned by the local agency (City of Jurupa Valley) and are not subject to special assessment. The assessments will be collected at the same time and in the same manner as property taxes are collected, and all laws providing for the collection and enforcement of property taxes shall apply to the collection and enforcement of the assessments.

In addition, Zones 14 and 16 are authorized to provide the following:

(a) Maintenance, repair and/or replacement of decorative and monument lighting;

In addition, Zone 141 is authorized to provide the following:

- (a) Maintenance and servicing of bio-swales within the public right-of-way including the removal of petroleum hydrocarbons and other pollutants from water runoff.
- (b) Maintenance and servicing of streetlights within the public right-of-ways including incidental costs and expenses.

In addition, Zone 142 is authorized to provide the following:

- **Section 11.** <u>Information.</u> Any property owner desiring additional information regarding 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 14, 16, 17, 21, 34, 61, 73, 78, 95, 102, 106, 126, 128, 132, 137, 141, 142, 173, 182, A, C, E, F, G, I, K, L, M, N, O, P, S, T, U, W, X, Y, Z, DD, EE, FF, and II, and Street Lightning Zones 5, 7, 15, 17, 19, 39, 41, 62, 69, 86, 91, 93, 94, 102, 2-A, 2-B, 2-C, 2-D, 2-E, 2-F, of JV L&LMD No. 89-1-C., the Report, or the proposed assessments shall contact the City Clerk of the City of Jurupa Valley.

Section 12. <u>Notice of the Public Hearing</u>. Notices of the public hearing shall be given consistent with Section 22626(a) of the Streets and Highways Code. The notice of the public hearing shall be given by publication in an appropriate newspaper of a certified copy of this Resolution once at least ten (10) days prior to July 6, 2023. Said publication of this Resolution is to be effected by the City Clerk of the City of Jurupa Valley.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1) That the City Council conduct a public hearing, receive public testimony, and consider the following alternatives:
 - a. Sustain the Planning Commission's decision and adopt Resolution No. 2023-44, entitled:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY AFFIRMING THE PLANNING COMMISSION'S DECISION TO DENY MINOR CHANGE NO. 1 TO TENTATIVE TRACT MAP NO. 37211 (TTM37211M1) WHICH REQUESTED THE DELETION OF CONDITIONS NOS. 1.12 AND 2.15 REGARDING ESTABLISHING A CFD FOR LANDSCAPING AND WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT FEATURES, AND CONDITION NO. 3.15 REGARDING THE UNDERGROUNDING OF UTILITY LINES ALONG PACIFIC AVENUE, AND DETERMINING THAT NO FURTHER CEQA REVIEW IS REQUIRED PURSUANT TO CEQA GUIDELINES SECTION 15162

b. Approve the appeal to the Planning Commission decision and proceed with the implementation of the alternative remedy proposed by the staff. This alternative entails the specific requirement of undergrounding utilities exclusively along the frontage of the property. As a result, staff will prepare a drafted resolution for the City Council's consideration at the upcoming Regular meeting.

APPEAL TO CITY COUNCIL

The Planning Commission denied Minor Change No. TTM37211M1 resulting in the Applicant submitting an appeal on March 22, 2023. The proposed amendments to certain conditions were rejected by the Planning Commission. The following are the revisions required.

- Condition No. 1.12 requires the owner to form a Community Facilities District (CFD) for landscape maintenance.
 - <u>Request</u>: Change the responsibility of landscape maintenance from the City to Homeowner Association (HOA).
- Condition No. 2.15 requires the developer to initiate the formation of, or annexation to, if one already exists, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for operation and maintenance of post-construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs).
 - <u>Request</u>: Change the responsibility of the operation and maintenance of BMPs from the City to HOA.
- Condition No. 3.15 requires the undergrounding of electrical power, telephone, communication, street lighting, and cable television lines. The developer is responsible for coordinating the work with the serving utility company.
 - <u>Request</u>: Modify the condition to not require the undergrounding of the electric service lines that traverse State-Route (SR) 60. The applicant intends to satisfy the requirement of undergrounding the lower lines and pole that does not traverse SR-60.

The applicant's appeal solely pertains to the Planning Commission's denial of modifying Engineering Condition No. 3.15 to eliminate the obligation of undergrounding the highest electrical lines crossing over State Route 60 (SR-60) and the associated power poles, along the project's frontage. However, the applicant agrees to comply with the requirement of undergrounding the lower electrical lines on Pacific Avenue along the project's frontage.

MINOR CHANGE REQUEST

The Minor Change application pertains to the Conditions of Approval associated with Tentative Tract Map No. 37211, commonly referred to as Sequanata Heights Tract, which involves the subdivision of a 10.4-acre property into 48 single-family residential lots, each with a minimum size of 6,000 square feet. The subdivision also includes two water quality basin lots (lots A and B) and three letter street lots (A-C). Furthermore, the project included the approval of CZ17003, which changed the zoning classification of the project site from

R-1 (One-Family Dwellings) to R-4 (Planned Residential). The project was initially granted approval on March 21, 2019.

The applicant has submitted a request (Attachment 2) to modify Condition No. 3.15 in light of the significant expenses and extensive coordination time involved in implementing the required improvements along the frontage of Pacific Avenue. Specifically, the undergrounding of the highest power lines along this route is projected to incur costs amounting to \$616,850. Moreover, due to the power lines traversing the State Route 60, coordination efforts with multiple government agencies, including the California Department of Transportation (CALTRANS) and the California Highway Patrol, would be necessary. Such coordination would also entail managing highway closures.

In addition to the proposed improvements, the Conditions of Approval also require the construction of a 13-foot-high freeway sound wall, spanning 1,117 linear feet along the 60 freeway. This cost of constructing the sound wall, coupled with the requirements of undergrounding power line, is estimated to cost approximately \$2.3 million. The direct cost per lot for the tract is expected to exceed \$61,000.

These two off-site improvements highlight the financial implications and logistical complexities associated with fulfilling the required improvements along Pacific Avenue, underscoring the rationale behind the applicant's request for modification.

The proposed amendment to the Condition of Approval exempts the requirement for undergrounding the highest power lines and associated power poles depicted in Exhibit No. 1, indicated in red. However, it should be noted that the applicant still intends to comply with the condition by undergrounding the lower lines depicted in yellow.

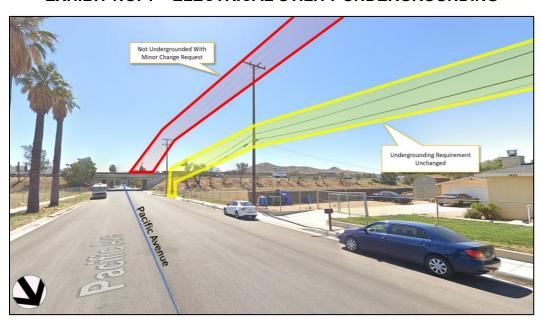


EXHIBIT NO. 1 – ELECTRICAL UTILITY UNDERGROUNDING

HEARINGS AND PLANNING COMMISSION DENIAL

The Planning Commission conducted a public hearing on the Minor Change request on January 11, 2023. However, the item was subsequently continued to February 22, 2023,

to allow the applicant to meet with the Public Works, Engineering Department, and the Community Development Department to explore potential options regarding their original request.

On February 22, 2023, the Planning Commission reconvened the public hearing for the Minor Change. The meeting provided an opportunity for all interested parties to express their views to the Planning Commission concerning the project. Following the receipt of public testimony, the Planning Commission formally closed the public hearing and engaged in deliberations on the subject. The outcome of these deliberations was the direction to prepare and present a resolution at the March 8, 2023, Planning Commission meeting, which would deny the Minor Change application. The direction to deny the Minor Change application was approved by a vote of (4-0), with Chair Pro Tem Newman absent.

On March 8, 2023, the Planning Commission adopted Resolution No. PC-2023-03, thereby denying Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1). Furthermore, they upheld Engineering Condition No. 1.12, 2.15, and 3.15, and determined that no additional review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) is necessary.

ANALYSIS OF PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

On March 8, 2023, the Planning Commission considered the possibility of waiving the requirement to underground utility lines, as stated in Engineering Condition No. 3.15. However, the Commission concluded that such a waiver would have a detrimental impact on public health, safety, and welfare. During their discussions, the Commissioners acknowledged the susceptibility of the City of Jurupa Valley to strong winds and fires, particularly due to its dry and hot weather conditions. These weather conditions increase the risk of utility lines being toppled by strong winds, which can potentially lead to fires. Consequently, modifying the condition to retain above-ground utility lines would exacerbate the exposed electrical risk, weather-related hazards, and fire danger, thus endangering public safety and welfare.

Under the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code Section 7.50.010.G, developers are granted the opportunity to request a waiver or appeal specific requirements related to the installation of electrical lines. However, for a waiver to be granted, the reviewing body must make certain determinations:

- The costs associated with undergrounding existing utility lines or paying the in-lieu fee would impose an unjustifiable financial burden on the developer, disproportionate to the customary and reasonable costs of constructing the development, as verified by the City Engineer.
- 2. The utilization of overhead facilities is not inconsistent with the objectives and intentions of the relevant section.
- 3. Granting the waiver would not result in any adverse impact on public health, safety, or welfare.
- 4. The developer is not receiving any special privileges that are not ordinarily granted to neighboring properties.

After considering these criteria, the Planning Commission concluded that the waiver cannot be approved due to the provision in Section 7.50.010.G.3, which explicitly states that granting a waiver should not result in any negative impact on public health, safety, or welfare.

As a result, the Planning Commission made the necessary findings to deny the requested modifications to Engineering Condition No. 3.15.

ANALYSIS OF ALTERNATIVE REMEDY FOR UNDERGROUNDING

After the Planning Commission action, Staff developed an alternative proposal for the appeal, recommended as a separate alternative for consideration by the City Council. This proposed alternative suggests an interpretation of Condition No. 3.15 that would require the undergrounding of utility lines solely along the segment in front of the property in question. The specific details of this alternative are outlined below:

- Pole #1, which is located on the Developer's property, would remain unchanged.
- Pole #1.5 would be removed.
- Pole #2, which is located on the adjacent property, can be retained, but the utility lines between poles 1 and 2 must be undergrounded, resulting in the undergrounding of approximately 240 linear feet of utilities.

It should be noted that if Southern California Edison mandates the removal of Pole #2, the developer may be required to underground the utility lines up to Pole #3, as illustrated In Exhibit No. 2 below. However, this alternative does not entail the more extensive task of undergrounding utilities across State Route 60.

This proposed alternative offers the City Council two distinct options to choose from, facilitating a comprehensive assessment of the matter at hand. Staff has discussed this alternative with the applicant, and they have expressed agreement with this proposed course of action.

EXHIBIT NO. 2 - ALTERNATIVE FOR UNDERGROUNDING

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

On March 21, 2019, the city officially adopted a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the project, ensuring compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). In light of the minor change request, a comprehensive evaluation has been conducted to compare the proposed appeal's potential impacts with the analysis presented in the previous MND. The primary objective was to determine whether approving or denying the appeal would introduce new significant impacts or substantially intensify the severity of previously assessed impacts.

After a thorough review, the City's CEQA Administrator has concluded that the analyses and conclusions drawn in the MND remain valid. Based on this evaluation, it has been determined that the proposed alternatives will not give rise to new significant impacts nor significantly exacerbate the severity of impacts previously identified. The current project under consideration falls within the scope of the earlier MND, as outlined in CEQA Guidelines Section 15162(a). For detailed information, please refer to Exhibit A of the City Council Resolution.

NOTICING REQUIREMENTS

The June 15, 2023 City Council hearing regarding the project was duly noticed by the Community Development Department. To ensure proper notification, 10-day hearing notices were mailed to property owners residing within 1,000 feet of the project site's boundaries. Furthermore, a 10-day legal advertisement was published in the Press Enterprise.

As of the preparation of this report, there have been no public comments or concerns received regarding the project.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The applicant paid the required fixed fee for the appeal, and additional time to process this appeal will be covered by the general fund.

ALTERNATIVES

- <u>Recommended Action:</u> That the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2023-__ sustaining the Planning Commission's denial of Minor Change (TTM37211M1) to modify Engineering Condition No. 3.15 and determine that no further CEQA review is required pursuant to CEQA guidelines section 15162.
- 2. <u>Recommended Alternative:</u> Approve the appeal to the Planning Commission Decision and implement the alternative remedy put forward by the staff, which entails the requirement of undergrounding utilities solely along the property's frontage.
- 3. Continue the public hearing and provide direction to staff.
- 4. Provide direction to prepare and present a resolution approving Minor Change No. 1 to TTM37211.

RESOLUTION NO. 2023-44

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, AFFIRMING THE PLANNING COMMISSION'S DECISION TO DENY MINOR CHANGE NO. 1 TO TENTATIVE TRACT MAP NO. 37211 (TTM37211M1) WHICH REQUESTED THE DELETION OF **CONDITIONS** NOS. 1.12 AND 2.15 REGARDING ESTABLISHING A CFD FOR LANDSCAPING AND WATER **OUALITY MANAGEMENT FEATURES, AND CONDITION** NO. 3.15 REGARDING THE UNDERGROUNDING OF UTILITY LINES ALONG PACIFIC AVENUE, AND DETERMINING THAT NO FURTHER CEOA REVIEW IS REQUIRED PURSUANT TO CEQA GUIDELINES SECTION 15162

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. **Project**. Sequanata Partners, LP (the "Applicant) applied for Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (Master Plan Application No. 20117) to modify Engineering Department Conditions of Approval to no longer comply with Condition Nos. 1.12, 2.15, and 3.15 regarding the formation of, or annexation into, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for the maintenance of landscaping and the operation and maintenance of post-construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs) and the undergrounding of certain electric service lines (the "Project").

<u>Section 2.</u> <u>Appeal.</u> On March 8, 2023, the Planning Commission considered the Project at a duly noticed public hearing. At the conclusion of the meeting, the Planning Commission adopted Resolution No. PC-2023-03 denying the Project. The Applicant subsequently appealed the Planning Commission's decision.

Section 3. Minor Changes to Tentative Tract Map Authority.

- (a) On March 21, 2019, the City Council initially approved Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 and Change of Zone No. 17003 (known collectively as MA17099). TTM No. 37211 approved a Schedule "A" subdivision of the 10.4-acre property into 48 single-family residential lots with a minimum lot size of 6,000 square feet; two (2) water quality basin lots (Lots A and B) and three (3) letter street lots (A-C). Additionally, the project included the approval of CZ17003 to change the zoning classification of the project site from R-1 (One-Family Dwellings) to R-4 (Planned Residential).
- (b) The City Council originally approved Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 on March 21, 2019.
- (c) The Applicant filed an application for the Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) on July 21, 2020.

- (d) The Applicant is seeking Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) to delete Engineering Department's Condition of Approval Nos. 1.12 and 2.15 which read as follows:
 - 1.12. The owner will be required to form a Community Facilities District (CFD) for landscape maintenance.
 - 2.15. The Developer shall initiate the formation of, or annexation to, if one already exists, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for the operation and maintenance of post-construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs).
- (e) The Applicant is also seeking to modify Condition 3.15 which reads as follows:
 - 3.15. Electrical power, telephone, communication, street lighting, and cable television lines shall be designed to be placed underground per Riverside County Ordinances 460 and 461, as adopted by the City. The Project Proponent is responsible for coordinating the work with the serving utility company. This requirement applies to underground existing overhead electrical lines, which are 33.6 kilovolts or below along the project frontage and between the nearest poles offsite in each direction of the project site, including services that originate from poles on the far side of the street. A disposition note describing the above shall be reflected on design improvement plans whenever those plans are required. Written proof confirming the initiation of the design of utility improvements or relocations issued by the utility company shall be submitted to the Engineering Department for verification purposes.

Specifically, the Applicant seeks to modify this condition to leave the highest electrical lines that traverse the 60 freeway above ground while undergrounding the lower electrical lines.

- (f) Section 7.15.210 of Chapter 7.15 of the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code provides the procedure for a minor change to a previously approved tentative map.
- (g) Pursuant to Section 7.15.210, any request for approval of a minor change to a previously approved tentative map must be filed with the Planning Department. The Planning Director must make a recommendation to the body having jurisdiction over the underlying map and notice a public hearing in accordance with Section 7.15.130 of the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code unless the underlying map did not previously require a hearing. The Planning Commission may decide the matter when it appears on the agenda, or it may continue the matter with or without the consent of the land divider. The decision of the Planning Commission shall be final unless the decision is appealed to the City Council. The approval by the Planning Commission of a minor change shall not affect the time period within which the land divider must prepare and file the final map.

- (h) Section 7.15.200(B) provides that proceedings on a revised tentative map shall be conducted in the same manner as for the original approval of a tentative map except those procedures that are not applicable. Section 7.15.180 states that a tentative map shall be denied if it does not meet all requirements of this title, or if any of the following findings are made:
- 1) That the proposed land division is not consistent with applicable general and specific plans;
- 2) That the design or improvement of the proposed land division is not consistent with applicable general and specific plans;
- 3) That the site of the proposed land division is not physically suitable for the type of development;
- 4) That the site of the proposed land division is not physically suitable for the proposed density of the development;
- 5) That the design of the proposed land division or proposed improvements are likely to cause substantial environmental damage or substantially and avoidably injure fish or wildlife or their habitat;
- 6) That the design of the proposed land division or the type of improvements are likely to cause serious public health problems;
- 7) That the design of the proposed land division or the type of improvements will conflict with easements, acquired by the public at large, for access through, or use of, property within the proposed land division. A land division may be approved if it is found that alternate easements for access or for use will be provided and that they will be substantially equivalent to ones previously acquired by the public. This subsection shall apply only to easements of record or to easements established by judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction;
- 8) Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, a tentative map may be approved if an environmental impact report was prepared with respect to the project and a finding was made, pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (Pub. Resources Code Section 21000 et seq.), that specific economic, social, or other considerations make infeasible the mitigation measures or project alternatives identified in the environmental impact report.
- <u>Section 4.</u> <u>**Procedural Findings**</u>. The City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley does hereby find, determine and declare that:
- (a) The application for MA No. 20117 was processed, including, but not limited to public notice, in the time and manner prescribed by State law and Jurupa Valley Ordinances.
- (b) On February 22, 2023, the Planning Commission of the City of Jurupa Valley held a public hearing on MA No. 20117, at which time all persons interested in the Project had the opportunity and did address the Planning Commission on these matters. Following the receipt of public testimony, the Planning Commission closed the public hearing and provided direction to staff to prepare a resolution to deny the Project.

- (c) On March 8, 2021, the Planning Commission adopted Resolution No. PC-2023-03 denying the Project and upholding Engineering Condition Nos. 1.12, 2.15 and 3.15. The Applicant subsequently appealed the Planning Commission's decision.
 - (d) All legal preconditions to the adoption of this Resolution have occurred.
- <u>Section 5.</u> <u>California Environmental Quality Act Findings</u>. The City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley hereby makes the following environmental findings and determinations in connection with the approval of the Project:
- (a) On March 21, 2019, the City adopted a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the project in compliance with CEQA. The proposed Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) is exempt from further environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") and the City's CEQA Guidelines pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162. The City has prepared a Previous Environmental Document Review analysis attached as Exhibit "A". The City Council has reviewed the administrative record, and based on its own independent judgment, finds that no further environmental review is required pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162.
- (b) The proposed Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) has been evaluated against the previous analysis in the MND, to ensure that the requested modifications do not create new significant impacts or substantially increase the severity of previously analyzed impacts as compared to those identified previously. It has been determined that the analyses and the conclusions in the MND remain valid and that the project currently under review is "within the scope" pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162 (a)
- (c) The custodian of records for the MND prepared for Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 and the Previous Environmental Document Review Determination, and all other materials that constitute the record of proceedings upon which the City Council's action is based, is the Community Development Department of the City of Jurupa Valley. Those documents are available for public review in the Community Development Department at 8930 Limonite Avenue, Jurupa Valley, California 92509.

Section 6. Findings for Denial of Minor Change No. 1

Conditions 1.12 and 2.15: The City Council denies the request to modify Conditions 1.12 and 2.15 because the proposed changes to the map are not consistent with the General Plan and the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code Chapter 6.05, Storm Water/Urban Runoff Management and Discharge Controls, and Chapter 9.283, Water Efficiency Landscaping Design Requirements, requiring off-site landscaping and water quality management features. Conditions 1.12. and 2.15 are important because they require off-site landscaping and water quality management features to be maintained by the City of Jurupa Valley through a CFD. The direct management by the City will assist in maintaining and funding these features in perpetuity and ensure that they are suitable for general safety, health, and welfare. Modifying these conditions, as requested by the Applicant, so that a homeowner's association would maintain them, does not provide the same level of management nor is there any assurance that the landscaping and water quality management features will be properly funded and maintained. The proposed change is not

consistent with General Plan Program CSSF 2.2 which creates a framework to provide a high level of community services and facilities to meet the existing and future needs of Jurupa Valley. CSSF 2.2 aims to ensure the provision of sufficient public facilities and services concurrently with new development and this includes the maintenance and operation of public right-of-way landscaping and water control features for new development.

- (b) <u>Condition 3.15</u>: Section 7.50.010(G) provides that an applicant can request a waiver from the undergrounding requirement. The developer is required to underground utilities pursuant to Condition 3.15, but is now seeking a partial waiver of this requirement. A waiver may be granted if the reviewing body determines that:
- 1) The costs of undergrounding existing utility lines and/or paying the in-lieu fee would present a financial burden upon the developer that is unfairly out of proportion to the customary and reasonable costs of constructing the development, as verified by the City Engineer;
- 2) The use of overhead facilities is not inconsistent with the goals and purposes of this section;
- 3) Granting the waiver would not otherwise result in a negative impact to the public health, safety or welfare; and
- 4) The developer is not receiving a special privilege not otherwise enjoyed by other property in the vicinity.
- (c) In denying the request for a waiver, the City Council makes the following findings:
- 1) The use of overhead facilities is inconsistent with the goals and purposes of Section 7.50.010 of the Municipal Code which is to protect the health and safety of the community by having all new and existing electrical power, telephone or other communication, street lighting, and cable television lines placed underground. The use of overhead facilities is also inconsistent with Policy ME2.11 of the General Plan which provides that the City should require street improvements as a condition of new developments, including undergrounding of utility lines. In addition, the use of overhead lines is inconsistent with Policy COS 9.3 of the General Plan that states that in and near public streets, features that clutter, degrade, intrude on, or obstruct view should be avoided.

The waiver would result in a negative impact to the public health, safety or welfare. The City of Jurupa Valley is prone to strong winds and fires due to dry and hot weather. This can result in utility lines being felled by the strong winds which can lead to fires. Undergrounding utilities in fire prone areas reduces the risk of wildfires. Waiving this condition would result in a negative impact to the public safety or welfare as it would not mitigate the fire risk posed by having utility lines above ground.

Section 7. Denial of Master Application No. 20117. Based on the foregoing, the City Council of the City of Jurupa Valley hereby denies Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map

No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) maintaining in place the Engineering Department's Condition of Approval Nos. 1.12, 2.15, and 3.15.

Section 8. Certification. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Resolution.

2.0 PREVIOUS ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENT REVIEW (PED)

Once an environmental impact determination under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) has been approved or certified for a project, no further action is required unless further discretionary approval for that project is required. CEQA Guidelines §15162 Subsequent EIRs and Negative Declarations, allows a previously adopted EIR or MND to be used as the environmental assessment for a project requiring further discretionary approval if it is determined that the Project currently under review does not propose substantial changes to the previously adopted or certified CEQA documentation that would:

- 1) Create one or more new significant impacts.
- Create impacts that are more severe.
- 3) Require major revisions to the CEQA document.

This PED has been prepared to determine if the Minor Change(s) in conditions of approval request is within the scope of the analysis contained in the Final Initial Study / Mitigated Negative Declaration, Master Application 17099, Change of Zone 17003, Tentative Tract Map 37211 ("IS/MND") adopted by the City Council on March 21, 2019 by Resolution No. 2019-02, to ensure that by approval, the Project does not create new significant impacts or substantially increase the severity of previously analyzed impacts as compared to those identified previously.

The previously adopted Final IS/MND is on file with the City of Jurupa Valley Planning Department, 8930 Limonite Avenue, Jurupa Valley, CA 92509, and is hereby incorporated by reference according to CEQA Guidelines Section 15150.

3.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The approved Tentative Tract Map (TTM) proposes to subdivide 10.4-acres property into 48 residential lots, 2 water quality basin lots, and 3 lettered street lots and the construction of associated infrastructure. The project is located at the intersection of Canal and Opal Streets, north of State Route 60, and east of Pacific Avenue. APNs: 177-130-007 and 177-142-018.

This is the Minor Change request to modify the following conditions of approval as follows:

- 1. <u>Condition No. 1.12</u>: "Owner will be required to form a Community Facilities District (CFD) for landscape maintenance". Owners request that all landscape maintenance be performed by the Homeowner's Association.
- 2. <u>Condition No. 2.15</u> "the Developer shall initiate formation of, or annexation to if one already exists, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for operation and maintenance of post construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs). Owners request that operation and maintenance of post construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs) be performed by the Homeowner's Association.
- 3. <u>Condition No. 3.15</u>: "Electrical power, telephone, communication, street lighting and cable television lines shall be designed to be placed underground in accordance with Riverside County Ordinances 460 and 461 as adopted by the City. The Project Proponent is responsible for coordinating the work with the serving utility company. This requirement applies to underground existing overhead electrical lines which are 33.6 kilovolts or below along the project frontage between the nearest poles on the far side of the street....". Owner requests to modify this condition to leave the highest electrical lines that traverse the 60 freeway remain while underground the lower electrical lines per the condition.

The minor change request does not propose to amend boundaries or change the number of lots, additionally, changes to Condition No. 1.12 and 2.15 do not propose any changes to infrastructure or utilities that are different than the previously approved TTM. The minor change request for Condition No. 3.15 would result in maintaining the current location and condition of existing aboveground electrical utility lines traversing SR60.

4.0 ANALYSIS

Previously Identified Environmental Impacts

The adopted IS/MND determined that the previously approved TTM would result in **no impacts or less than significant** environmental impacts under the following issue areas: Aesthetics, Air Quality, Agriculture and Forestry Resources, Geology and Soils, Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Hazards and Hazardous Materials (including Wildfire), Hydrology and Water Quality, Land Use and Planning, Mineral Resources, Population and Housing, Public Services, Recreation, Transportation/Traffic, and Utility and Service Systems.

The adopted IS/MND determined that the development accommodated by the TTM would result in **potentially significant impacts** to Biological Resources, Cultural Resources (archaeological and paleontological), Noise, and Tribal Cultural Resources. Required mitigation measures for each issue area impact(s) were determined to be **less than significant with mitigation incorporated**.

Current Environmental Impacts

When the TTM was approved in 2019, the Project site was highly disturbed land adjacent to SR-60. The physical setting for the Project has not significantly changed since the adoption of the MND on March 21, 2019. The Project site remains undeveloped, vacant land, and none of the surrounding land uses have changed since then. In addition, there have been no new projects approved in the Project area that would affect the physical environment surrounding the Project site. Because construction has not occurred and the property remains highly disturbed, the environmental impacts identified in 2019 remain the same as indicated in the aerial photographs from 2019 and 2022 in Exhibits 4.0-1 and 4.0-2.

Applicability of the 2019 Adopted Final IS/MND

The request for minor change in conditions of approval does not propose to amend boundaries, change the number of lots, change the design, or propose any changes to infrastructure or utilities that are different than existing conditions and those previously analyzed in the adopted MND. The power lines subject to the requested change in Condition No 3.15 are existing electrical lines and therefore no new environmental impacts will occur with maintaining their current location. The Mitigation and Monitoring Program adopted on March 21, 2019, remains in full force and applies to the Project.

The Community Development Department, through Interagency Development Review Process, has determined that there are no new or substantially different issues raised by the Project, including, but not limited to, ability to serve with utilities (line extensions, etc.), access problems (fire trucks, emergency access, traffic safety), drainage, water quality, grading, or requirements to dedicate and improve public facilities or roads, that would result in physical impacts to the environment.

If the minor changes are approved, the Project will incorporate the following as required by the adopted Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) adopted with the IS/MND:

- Plans, Policies, or Programs These include existing regulatory requirements such as plans, policies, or programs applied to the Project-based on federal, state, or local law currently in place, which effectively reduce environmental impacts.
- Mitigation Measures (MM) These measures include requirements that are imposed where the impact analysis determines that implementation of the proposed Project

would result in significant impacts; mitigation measures are proposed in accordance with the provisions of CEQA. The MMs are summarized below.

<u>MM-BIO-1: Pre-Construction Burrowing Owl Survey.</u> Within 30 calendar days prior to grading on proposed property, a qualified biologist shall conduct a survey of the proposed impact footprint and make a determination regarding the presence or absence of the burrowing owl. The determination shall be documented in a report and shall be submitted, reviewed, and accepted by the City of Jurupa Valley Planning Department prior to the issuance of a grading permit and subject to the following provisions:

- a). In the event that the pre-construction survey identifies no burrowing owls in the impact area, a grading permit may be issued without restriction.
- b). In the event that the pre-construction survey identifies the presence of at least one individual but less than three (3) mating pairs of burrowing owl, then prior to the issuance of a grading permit and prior to the commencement of ground-disturbing activities on the property, the qualified biologist shall passively or actively relocate any burrowing owls. Passive relocation, including the required use of one-way doors to exclude owls from the site and the collapsing of burrows, will occur if the biologist determines that the proximity and availability of alternate habitat is suitable for successful passive relocation. Passive relocation shall follow California Department of Fish and Wildlife relocation protocol. If proximate alternate habitat is not present as determined by the biologist, active relocation shall follow California Department of Fish and Wildlife relocation protocol. The biologist shall confirm in writing to the Planning Department that the species has fledged or been relocated prior to the issuance of a grading permit.

<u>MM-BIO-2: Coordination With USACE, CDFW, and RWQCB</u>. Prior to the issuance of grading permit, the applicant shall contact the United State Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife to positively determine whether or not either agency wishes to exert jurisdiction of the onsite drainage feature. If either agency decides to exert jurisdiction, Mitigation Measures BIO-3 and BIO-4 shall be implemented.

MM-BIO-3: CDFW Jurisdiction. If state jurisdictional authority is exercised under Mitigation Measure BIO-2, the following shall be implemented: Prior to the issuance of a grading permit, the Project applicant shall obtain a Streambed Alteration Agreement under Section 1602 of the California Fish and Game Code from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. The following shall be incorporated into the permitting, subject to approval by the regulatory agencies: (a) Replacement and/or restoration of jurisdictional "waters of the State" within the Santa Ana River watershed at a ratio of not less than 1:1 onsite or not less than 2:1 for permanent impacts; (b) The applicant shall restore any onsite or offsite temporary impact areas to pre-project conditions and revegetate where applicable; and (c) Off-site mitigation may occur on land acquired for the purpose of in-perpetuity preservation, or through the purchase of mitigation credits at an agency approved off-site mitigation bank or within an agency-accepted off-site permittee responsible mitigation area such as the Santa Ana Watershed Project Area (SAWPA), Prado Basin, or an appropriate nearby downstream established mitigation bank area.

<u>MM-BIO-4: Federal Jurisdiction</u>. If federal jurisdictional authority is exercised under Mitigation Measure BIO-2, the following shall be implemented: Prior to issuance of a grading permit, the developer shall obtain a Clean Water Act Section 404 Nation-Wide Permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and compensate for the loss of more than 0.1 acre of wetlands and 1,278 lineal

feet of streambed channel, and a Clean Water Act Section 401 Certification from the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board These permits will address impacts to identified jurisdictional resources on the Project site and appropriate offsite mitigation such as such as the Santa Ana Watershed Project Area (SAWPA), Prado Basin, or an appropriate nearby downstream established mitigation bank area. The developer shall implement this measure to the satisfaction of the City Planning Department.

<u>MM-BIO-5: Nesting Bird Survey</u>. As a condition of approval for all grading permits, vegetation clearing and ground disturbance shall be prohibited during the migratory bird nesting season (February 1 through October 1), unless a migratory bird nesting survey is completed in accordance with the following requirements:

a. A migratory nesting bird survey of the Project's impact footprint shall be conducted by a qualified biologist within three business (3) days prior to initiating vegetation clearing or ground disturbance.

b. A copy of the migratory nesting bird survey results report shall be provided to the City of Jurupa Planning Department. If the survey identifies the presence of active nests, then the qualified biologist shall provide the Planning Department with a copy of maps showing the location of all nests and an appropriate buffer zone around each nest sufficient to protect the nest from direct and indirect impact. The size and location of all buffer zones, if required, shall be subject to review and approval by the Planning Department and shall be no less than a 300-foot radius around the nest for non-raptors and a 500-foot radius around the nest for raptors. The nests and buffer zones shall be field checked weekly by a qualified biological monitor. The approved buffer zone shall be marked in the field with construction fencing, within which no vegetation clearing or ground disturbance shall commence until the qualified biologist and Planning Department verify that the nests are no longer occupied and the juvenile birds can survive independently from the nests.

<u>MM-BIO-6:-Tree Preservation and Replacement.</u> Prior to the issuance of a grading permit, the measure listed below (or equivalent language) shall appear on all Project grading plans, construction specifications and bid documents, and the City shall ensure such language is incorporated prior to issuance of any permits:

"Prior to the removal of any trees, the issuance of a grading permit, or approval of a Site Development Permit, whichever comes first, a Tree Removal and Planting and Monitoring Plan shall be submitted to the Planning Department that demonstrates that the following will be implemented:

1). The trees along Opal Street and Canal Street. identified in the Tree Survey prepared by BrightView Design Group, April 24, (Appendix D of the Initial Study Checklist for MA 17009) shall be replaced at a 3:1 ratio with an approved species as determined by the City's Planning Department. Tree selection must be at least 15- gallon purchased from quality nursery stock. This number of trees is above the number identified in the Project's Landscape Plan".

<u>MM-CR-1: Archaeological Monitorina</u>. A qualified archaeologist (the "Project Archaeologist") shall be retained by the developer prior to the issuance of a grading permit. The Project Archaeologist will be on-call to monitor ground-disturbing activities and excavations on the Project site following identification of potential cultural resources by project personnel. If archaeological resources are encountered during implementation of the Project, ground-disturbing activities will be temporarily

redirected from the vicinity of the find. The Project Archaeologist will be allowed to temporarily divert or redirect grading or excavation activities in the vicinity in order to make an evaluation of the find. If the resource is significant, Mitigation Measure CR-2 shall apply.

MM-CR-2: Archeological Treatment Plan. If a significant archaeological resource(s) is discovered on the property, ground disturbing activities shall be suspended 100 feet around the resource(s). The archaeological monitor, the Project Proponent, and the City Planning Department shall confer regarding mitigation of the discovered resource(s). A treatment plan shall be prepared and implemented by the archaeologist to protect the identified archaeological resource(s) from damage and destruction. The treatment plan shall contain a research design and data recovery program necessary to document the size and content of the discovery such that the resource(s) can be evaluated for significance under CEQA criteria. The research design shall list the sampling procedures appropriate to exhaust the research potential of the archaeological resource(s) in accordance with current professional archaeology standards (typically this sampling level is two (2) to five (5) percent of the volume of the cultural deposit). At the completion of the laboratory analysis, any recovered archaeological resources shall be processed and curated according to current professional repository standards. The collections and associated records shall be donated to an appropriate curation facility. A final report containing the significance and treatment findings shall be prepared by the archaeologist and submitted to the City of Jurupa Valley Planning Department and the Eastern Information Center.

MM-CR-3: Paleontological Monitoring: A qualified paleontologist (the "Project Paleontologist") shall be retained by the developer prior to the issuance of a grading permit. The Project Paleontologist will be on-call to monitor ground-disturbing activities and excavations on the Project site following identification of potential paleontological resources by project personnel. If paleontological resources are encountered during implementation of the Project, ground-disturbing activities will be temporarily redirected from the vicinity of the find. The Project Paleontologist will be allowed to temporarily divert or redirect grading or excavation activities in the vicinity in order to make an evaluation of the find. If the resource is significant, Mitigation Measure CR-4 shall apply.

MM-CR-4: Paleontological Treatment Plan: If a significant paleontological resource(s) is discovered on proposed property, in consultation with the Project proponent and the City, the qualified paleontologist shall develop a plan of mitigation which shall include salvage excavation and removal of the find, removal of sediment from around the specimen (in the laboratory), research to identify and categorize the find, curation in the find a local qualified repository, and preparation of a report summarizing the find.

MM-NOI-1: Construction Noise Mitigation Plan: Prior to the issuance of a grading permit the developer is required to submit a construction-related noise mitigation plan to the City Planning Department for review and approval. The plan must depict the location of construction equipment and how the noise from this equipment will be mitigated during construction of this project. In addition, the plan shall require that the notes from the approved Mitigation Monitoring Plan are included on grading plans and building plans. Project contractors shall be required to ensure compliance with the notes and permit periodic inspection of the construction site by City of Jurupa Valley staff or its designee to confirm compliance. These notes also shall be specified in bid documents issued to prospective construction contractors.

- a) Haul truck deliveries shall be limited to between the hours of 6:00am to 6:00pm during the months of June through September and 7:00am to 6:00pm during the months of October through May.
- b) Construction contractors shall equip all construction equipment, fixed or mobile, with properly operating and maintained mufflers, consistent with manufacturers' standards.
- c) All stationary construction equipment shall be placed in such a manner so that emitted noise is directed away from any sensitive receptors adjacent to the Project site.
- d) Construction equipment staging areas shall be located the greatest distance between the staging area and the nearest sensitive receptors."

MM-NOI-2: Sound Walls: Prior to issuance of building permits, a final noise study based on final precise grading plan elevations shall be prepared by a qualified acoustician and approved by the City to validate appropriate noise barrier heights, locations, and construction materials. Sound walls are required around all habitable exterior backyard and sideyard areas for all lots (See Exhibit C of Noise Impact Analysis, Appendix K of this Initial Study Checklist) for specific wall heights and locations. All required noise barriers shall be designed to reduce noise levels to below 65 dBA CNEL within private exterior areas (i.e., backyards) of residential lots. The noise barriers may consist of any material (block, tempered glass, earthen berm, etc.) or combination of materials that achieves the required noise attenuation and shall have no decorative cutouts or other line-of-sight openings between shielded areas and the noise source (adjacent roadway). Prior to issuance of building permits, the City of Jurupa Valley shall review and approve the noise barrier design, placement, and materials to ensure that the required level of sound attenuation will be achieved.

<u>MM-NOI-3: Interior Noise Analysis</u>: Prior to issuance of any residential building permit, an interior noise analysis shall be completed to the satisfaction of the City Planning Department demonstrating that proposed building materials will achieve interior noise levels less than 45 dBA CNEL. Measures that would facilitate compliance with the 45dBA CNEL interior noise standard include, but are not limited to:

- a) A "windows closed" condition is required to meet interior noise standards for all homes.
- b) Upgraded windows and sliding glass doors are required on all homes. See Tables 5 and 6 of Noise Impact Analysis, Appendix K of this Initial Study Checklist for specific STC requirements.
- c) Attic and roof vents that directly face the SR-60, if applicable, shall include an acoustical baffle to prevent vehicle noise intrusion. See Exhibits D and E of Noise Impact Analysis, Appendix K of this Initial Study Checklist for examples acoustical baffles. The contractor may install similar measures to provide noise reduction.
- d) For proper acoustical performance, all exterior windows, doors, and sliding glass doors must have a positive seal and leaks/cracks must be kept to a minimum.

MM-TCR-1: Native American Monitoring, Treatment of Discoveries, and Disposition of Discoveries:

MONITORING: Prior to the issuance of a grading permit, the applicant shall contact the consulting Native American Tribe(s) that have requested monitoring through consultation with the City during the AB 52 process. The applicant shall coordinate with the Tribe to develop a Tribal Monitoring Agreement(s). A copy of the agreement shall be provided to the Jurupa Valley Planning Department prior to the issuance of a grading permit.

TREATMENT OF DISCOVERIES: If a significant tribal cultural resource is discovered on the property, ground disturbing activities shall be suspended 100 feet around the resource(s). A representative of the appropriate Native American Tribe(s), the Project Proponent, and the City Planning Department shall confer regarding mitigation of the discovered resource(s). A treatment plan shall be prepared and implemented to protect the identified tribal cultural resources from damage and destruction. The treatment plan shall contain a research design and data recovery program necessary to document the size and content of the discovery such that the resource(s) can be evaluated for significance under CEQA criteria. The research design shall list the sampling procedures appropriate to exhaust the research potential of the tribal cultural resources in accordance with current professional archaeology standards. The treatment plan shall require monitoring by the appropriate Native American Tribe(s) during data recovery and shall require that all recovered artifacts undergo basic field analysis and documentation or laboratory analysis, whichever is appropriate. At the completion of the basic field analysis and documentation or laboratory analysis, any recovered tribal cultural resources shall be processed and curated according to current professional repository standards. The collections and associated records shall be donated to an appropriate curation facility, or, the artifacts may be delivered to the appropriate Native American Tribe(s) if that is recommended by the City of Jurupa Valley. A final report containing the significance and treatment findings shall be prepared by the archaeologist and submitted to the City of Jurupa Valley Planning Department, the Eastern Information Center, and the appropriate Native American Tribe.

DISPOSITION OF DISCOVERIES: In the event that Native American cultural resources are inadvertently discovered during the course of grading for this project. The following procedures will be carried out for treatment and disposition of the discoveries:

The landowner(s) shall relinquish ownership of all cultural resources, including sacred items, burial goods, and all archaeological artifacts and non-human remains as part of the required mitigation for impacts to tribal cultural resources. The applicant shall relinquish the artifacts through one or more of the following methods and provide the Jurupa Valley Planning Department with evidence of same:

- a) A fully executed reburial agreement with the appropriate culturally affiliated Native American tribes or bands. This shall include measures and provisions to protect the future reburial area from any future impacts. Reburial shall not occur until all cataloguing and basic recordation have been completed.
- b) A curation agreement with an appropriate qualified repository within Riverside County that meets federal standards per 36 CFR Part 79 and therefore would be professionally curated and made available to other archaeologists/researchers for further study. The collections and associated records shall be transferred, including title, to an appropriate curation facility within Riverside County, to be accompanied by payment of the fees necessary for permanent curation.
- c) If more than one Native American Group is involved with the project and cannot come to an agreement as to the disposition of cultural materials, they shall be curated at the Western Science Center by default.
- d) Should reburial of collected cultural items be preferred, it shall not occur until after the Phase IV monitoring report has been submitted to the Jurupa Valley Planning Department. Should curation be preferred, the developer/permit applicant is responsible for all costs and the repository and curation method shall be described in the Phase IV monitoring report.

Conclusion:

The project site is vacant, undeveloped land that remains substantially in the same physical condition as it was in 2019 being subject to a continued variety of anthropogenic disturbances. Based on the Interagency Development Review Process and the Planning Department Staff Report for MA20117, the minor changes to the conditions of approval would not result in any new significant environmental impacts, substantially increase the severity of previously identified effects, or necessitate implementation of additional or considerably different mitigation measures than those identified in the IS/MND. The effects associated with the minor changes to the condition of approval (COA) would be substantially the same as those reported for the approved IS/MND, and thus no Supplemental or Subsequent Environmental Review (IS/MND) is required.

A RESOLUTION OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY APPROVE MINOR CHANGE NO. 1 TO TENTATIVE TRACT MAP NO. 37211 (TTM37211M1) TO MODIFY CONDITION REGARDING THE UNDERGROUNDING OF ELECTRIC LINES ALONG PACIFIC AVENUE, AND DENY MODIFICATIONS TO CONDITIONS NO. 1.12, 2.15 REGARDING OFF-SITE LANDSCAPING AND WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT FEATURE **CFD** REQUIREMENTS, AND DETERMINE THAT NO FURTHER CEQA REVIEW IS REQUIRED PURSUANT TO CEQA **GUIDELINES SECTION 15162**

THE PLANNING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Project. Sequanata Partners, LP (the "Applicant) has applied for Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (Master Plan Application No. 20117) to modify Engineering Department Conditions of Approval Nos. 1.12 and 2.15 regarding the formation of, or annexation into, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for the maintenance of landscaping and the operation and maintenance of post-construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs), and approve modifications to Condition No. 3.15 regarding the undergrounding of electric lines along Pacific Avenue. (the "Project").

Section 2. Minor Changes to Tentative Tract Map Authority.

- (a) On March 21, 2019, the City Council initially approved Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 and Change of Zone No. 17003 (known collectively as MA17099). TTM37211 approved a Schedule "A" subdivision of the 10.4-acre property into 48 single-family residential lots within a minimum lot size of 6,000 square feet; two (2) water quality basin lots (Lot A and B) and three (3) letter street lots (A-C). Additionally, the project included the approval of CZ17003 to change the zoning classification of the project site from R-1 (One-Family Dwellings) to R-4 (Planned Residential). Further, the City Council adopted a
- (b) The City Council originally approved Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 on March 21, 2019.
- (c) The applicant filed an application for the Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) on July 21, 2020.
- (d) The Applicant is seeking Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) to modify Engineering Department's Condition of Approval No. 1.12, 2.15, and 3.15, which reads as follows:

- 1.12. The owner will be required to form a Community Facilities District (CFD) for landscape maintenance.
- 2.15. The Developer shall initiate the formation of, or annexation to, if one already exists, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for the operation and maintenance of post-construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs).
- 3.15. Electrical power, telephone, communication, street lighting, and cable television lines shall be designed to be placed underground per Riverside County Ordinances 460 and 461, as adopted by the City. The Project Proponent is responsible for coordinating the work with the serving utility company. This requirement applies to underground existing overhead electrical lines, which are 33.6 kilovolts or below along the project frontage and between the nearest poles offsite in each direction of the project site, including services that originate from poles on the far side of the street. A disposition note describing the above shall be reflected on design improvement plans whenever those plans are required. Written proof confirming the initiation of the design of utility improvements or relocations issued by the utility company shall be submitted to the Engineering Department for verification purposes.
- (e) Staff recommends approving modifications to Condition of Approval Nos. 1.12, 2.15, and approving modifications to Condition of Approval No 3.15 as shown below:
 - 3.15. Electrical power, Telephone, communication, street lighting, and cable television lines shall be designed to be placed underground in accordance with Riverside County Ordinances 460 and 461, as adopted by the City. The Project Proponent is responsible for coordinating the work with the serving utility company. This requirement applies to underground existing overhead electrical lines which are 33.6 kilovolts or below along the project frontage and between the nearest poles offsite in each direction of the project site including services that originate from poles on the far side of the street. A disposition note describing the above shall be reflected on design improvement plans whenever those plans are required. Written proof confirming initiation of the design of utility improvements or relocations, issued by the utility company, shall be submitted to the Engineering Department for verification purposes.
- (f) Section 7.15.210 of Chapter 7.15 of the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code provides the procedure for a minor change to a previously approved tentative map.
- (g) Pursuant to Section 7.15.210, any request for approval of a minor change to a previously approved tentative map must be filed with the Planning Department. The Community Development Director must make a recommendation to the body having jurisdiction over the underlying map and notice a public hearing in accordance with Section 7.15.130 of the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code unless the underlying map did not previously require

a hearing. The Planning Commission may decide the matter when it appears on the agenda, or it may continue the matter with or without the consent of the land divider. The decision of the Planning Commission shall be final unless the decision is appealed to the City Council. The approval by the Planning Commission of a minor change shall not affect the time period within which the land divider must prepare and file the final map.

Section 3. <u>Procedural Findings</u>. The Planning Commission of the City of Jurupa Valley does hereby find, determine and declare that:

- (a) The application for MA No. 20117 was processed, including, but not limited to public notice, in the time and manner prescribed by State law and Jurupa Valley Ordinances.
- (b) On January 11, 2023, the Planning Commission of the City of Jurupa Valley held a public hearing on MA No. 20117, at which time all persons interested in the Project had the opportunity and did address the Planning Commission on these matters. Following the receipt of public testimony, the Planning Commission continued the public hearing to the February 22, 2023, Planning Commission meeting to provide additional time for the Engineering Department to consider the minor change.
- (c) On February 22, 2023, the Planning Commission of the City of Jurupa Valley held the continued public hearing on MA No. 20117, at which time all persons interested in the Project had the opportunity and did address the Planning Commission on these matters. Following the receipt of public testimony, the Planning Commission closed the public hearing.
- (d) All legal preconditions to the adoption of this Resolution have occurred.

Section 4. California Environmental Quality Act Findings. The Planning Commission of the City of Jurupa Valley hereby makes the following environmental findings and determinations in connection with the approval of the Project:

(a) The proposed Minor Change to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) is exempt from further review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162. The proposed project is within the scope of the previously adopted Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) since it modifies Engineering Condition No. 3.15 and denies modifications to Conditions No. 1.12 and 2.15. The City has prepared a Previous Environmental Document Review analysis attached as Exhibit B. The Planning Commission has reviewed the administrative record concerning and based on its own independent judgment, finds that Minor Change No. 1 is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") and the City's CEQA Guidelines pursuant to CEQA Guideline Section 15162.

By motion, adopt Resolution No. PC-2023-03 denying Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211(TTM37211M1) sustaining Engineering Condition Nos. 1.12, 2.15, and 3.15, and determining that no further CEQA review is required pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162.

BACKGROUND

On February 22, 2023, the Planning Commission held a public hearing for the Minor Change. At that time, all persons interested in the Project had the opportunity and did address the Planning Commission on these matters. After receiving public testimony, the Planning Commission closed the public hearing and provided direction to prepare and present a resolution to deny the Minor Change application for their consideration at the March 8, 2023, Planning Commission meeting. The Resolution is attached as Attachment 1.

The Planning Commission, after deliberating on the matter, determined that the requirements for undergrounding utility lines per Engineering Condition No. 3.15 should not be modified because it would negatively impact public health, safety, or welfare. The City of Jurupa Valley is prone to strong winds and fires due to dry and hot weather. This can result in utility lines being felled by the strong winds which can lead to fires. Undergrounding utilities in fire prone areas reduces the risk of wildfires. Modifying this condition would result in a negative impact to public safety or welfare as it would not mitigate the fire risk posed by having utility lines above ground.

The Planning Commission also determined that the CFD requirement in Engineering Conditions Nos. 1.12 and 2.15 should not be modified since the proposed changes are not consistent with the General Plan and the Jurupa Valley Municipal Code Chapter 6.05, Storm Water/Urban Runoff Management and Discharge Controls, and Chapter 9.283, Water Efficiency Landscaping Design Requirements, requiring off-site landscaping and water quality management features. Conditions 1.12. and 2.15 are important because they require off-site landscaping and water quality management features to be maintained by the City of Jurupa Valley through a CFD. The direct management by the City will assist in maintaining and funding these features in perpetuity and ensure that they are suitable for general safety, health, and welfare. Modifying these conditions, as requested by the developer, so that a homeowner's association would maintain them, does not provide the same level of management nor is there any assurance that the landscaping and water quality management features will be properly funded and maintained.

EVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

On March 21, 2019, the City adopted a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the project in compliance with CEQA. The proposed Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 (TTM37211M1) is exempt from further environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") and the City's CEQA Guidelines pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162. The City has prepared a Previous Environmental Document Review analysis attached as Exhibit "A". The decision to deny the Minor Change does not impact the environment and all adopted conditions of approval and mitigation measures would continue to apply. Therefore, no additional CEQA review is required.

NOTICING REQUIREMENTS

The Community Development Department noticed the January 11, 2023, Planning Commission hearing by mailing 10-day hearing notices to surrounding property owners within 1,000 feet of the boundaries of the project site. Additionally, a 10-day legal advertisement was published in the Press Enterprise. On January 11, 2023, it was announced that the hearing was continued until February 22, 2023. On February 22, 2023 the Planning Commission held and closed the public hearing. The Planning Commission provided direction for a resolution for denial to be presented for their consideration at the March 8, 2023, Planning Commission meeting. No notice is required for this item on the March 8, 2023 Planning Commission agenda.

CONCLUSION

It is recommended that the Planning Commission adopt Planning Commission Resolution No. PC-2023-03 denying Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211(TTM37211M1) sustaining Engineering Condition Nos. 1.12, 2.15, and 3.15, and determining that no further CEQA review is required pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162.

BACKGROUND

On March 21, 2019, the City Council initially approved Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 and Change of Zone No. 17003 (known collectively as MA17099). TTM37211 approved a Schedule "A" subdivision of the 10.4-acre property into 48 single-family residential lots within a minimum lot size of 6,000 square feet; two (2) water quality basin lots (Lots A and B) and three (3) letter street lots (A-C). Additionally, the project included the approval of CZ17003 to change the zoning classification of the project site from R-1 (One-Family Dwellings) to R-4 (Planned Residential). The Minor Change application under consideration seeks to modify three conditions of approval.

On January 11, 2023, the Planning Commission held a public hearing on MA20117. The item was continued to February 22, 2023, to provide the applicant time to discuss options with the Engineering Department.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Applicant ("Applicant" or "Sequanata Partners, LP") requests to modify the conditions of the approved Tentative Tract Map No. 37211 regarding the maintenance of

landscaping, water quality management facilities, and the undergrounding of electric lines. A summary of the requested modifications are as follows:

1. Condition No. 1.12 requires the owner to form a Community Facilities District (CFD) for landscape maintenance.

Request: Change the responsibility of landscape maintenance from the City to Homeowner Association (HOA).

 Condition No. 2.15 requires the developer to initiate the formation of, or annexation to, if one already exists, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for operation and maintenance of post-construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs).

Request: Change the responsibility of the operation and maintenance of BMPs from the City to HOA.

3. Condition No. 3.15 requires the undergrounding of electrical power, telephone, communication, street lighting, and cable television lines. The developer is responsible for coordinating the work with the serving utility company.

Request: Modify the condition to not require the undergrounding of the electric service lines that traverse State-Route (SR) 60. The applicant intends to satisfy the requirement of undergrounding the lower lines and pole that does not traverse SR-60.

PROJECT LOCATION

The project site is north of State Route (SR) 60, east of Pacific Avenue, and southeast of Canal and Opal Streets. Single-family homes surround the property to the east and west, State Route (SR) 60 to the south, and Union Pacific Railroad to the north. Beyond the railroad, tracks are industrial land uses. TITLE 7 - SUBDIVISIONS / CHAPTER 7.15. - TENTATIVE MAPS

The City's Municipal Code, Section 7.15.210 (Minor Changes), provides that a Minor Change to an approved tentative map shall be filed with the Community Development Department. A Minor Change may alter or delete any condition of approval that is no longer appropriate or necessary.

The Community Development Director should make a written recommendation to the advisory agency having jurisdiction over the underlying map, in this case, the Planning Commission, and shall notice a public hearing unless the underlying map did not previously require such a hearing.

ANALYSIS

The Applicant states that the requirements of the abovementioned conditions are a financial burden and increases the cost and coordination required to develop the project. These conditions reduce home affordability and make the project challenging to complete. The modifications are an effort to find cost-saving alternatives and facilitate the completion of the project. The modifications focus on three conditions that do not compromise the project's quality and design. The Community Development and Engineering Department have reviewed the request and included a recommendation for each request below.

A. Condition Nos. 1.12 and 2.15 - Applicant Justification and Staff Recommendation

Condition No. 1.12. The owner will be required to form a Community Facilities District (CFD) for landscape maintenance.

Condition No. 2.15. The Developer shall initiate the formation of, or annexation to, if one already exists, a Community Facilities District (CFD) for the operation and maintenance of post-construction water quality management features and facilities (BMPs).

<u>Applicant's Justification:</u> The Applicant states that the request to have a Home Owner's Association, as opposed to a CFD, to maintain and operate the (a) off-site landscaping and (b) post-construction water quality management facilities (BPM) would be less expensive than forming, or initiating the annexation to, a CFD. Exhibit No. 4 demonstrates the landscape maintenance areas impacted by the abovementioned conditions.

Recommendation: It is recommended to deny modifications and sustain both conditions. <u>Applicant's Justification</u>: The applicant is requesting to modify Condition No. 3.15 not to require the undergrounding of the existing pole and the top electrical line parallel to Pacific Avenue and traverses the State-Route 60 freeway while undergrounding the lower lines. The following summarizes the reasons for not requiring the undergrounding of the electrical lines traversing SR-60:

- 1. The estimated cost of removing and undergrounding these electric lines is approximately \$616,850 or \$12,851.04 per home, in addition to the months to coordinate the closure of State Route 60.
- 2. Undergrounding the top electrical lines would require coordination with Southern California Edison (SCE) and CALTRANS for the removal of the pole located on the southeast property corner.
- 3. Undergrounding the top electrical lines would require coordination with SCE, CALTRANS, and the California Highway Patrol for the complete shutdown of up to 4 hours on a weekend evening to remove the pole and lines.

Exhibit No. 5 demonstrates a street view of the existing location of the electric lines.

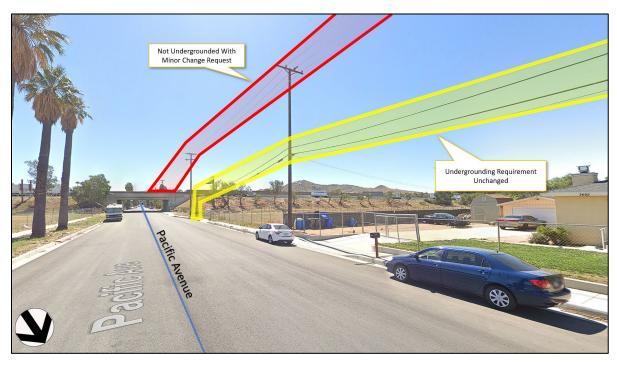
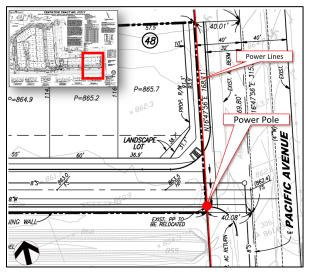


EXHIBIT NO. 5 – SERVICE LINE UNDERGROUNDING

Approving the modification of this condition would facilitate the construction of this project since other conditions require time and costly improvements. For instance, a separate condition requires the construction of a 13-foot high, 1,117 linear foot, freeway sound wall along the segment of SR-60 adjacent to the project. Construction and coordination of the required sound wall is expected to cost \$2,600,000, equating to \$54,000 per dwelling unit.

Recommendation: It is recommended to approve a modification to Condition No. 3.15 as the undergrounding of the top electrical lines is out of proportion to the customary and reasonable cost.

EXHIBIT NO. 6 – SERVICE LINE UNDERGROUNDING



The City Engineer has evaluated the cost of undergrounding and has determined that the minor change may be granted due to the cost of undergrounding the electric lines. The estimated cost of removing the power pole and undergrounding the top electric lines is approximately \$616,850.00. The power pole being removed with the undergrounding is one foot within the tentative map's project boundary. Exhibit 6 demonstrates the precise location of the power pole and lines in relation to the tentative parcel map.

The cost and coordination of undergrounding the top electrical lines is affected by how the lines traverse the SR-60. The top electric lines are adjacent to Pacific Avenue and extends over SR-60. The applicant has contacted the respective agencies and departments for a cost estimate of the undergrounding and has provided information to the City of Jurupa Valley to support the request. The estimated cost of removing the power pole and undergrounding the top electric lines has been evaluated and it is generally out of proportion to the customary cost of undergrounding.

In addition to the reasons stated above, granting the minor change is consistent with the goals and purposes of the section on Minor Changes and would not result in a negative impact on public health, safety, or welfare.

The recommended modifications to Engineering Condition No. 3.15 are shown in red text as follows:

3.15 Electrical power, Telephone, communication, street lighting, and cable television lines shall be designed to be placed underground in accordance with Riverside County Ordinances 460 and 461, as adopted by the City. The Project Proponent is responsible for coordinating the

work with the serving utility company. This requirement applies to underground existing overhead electrical lines which are 33.6 kilovolts or below along the project frontage and between the nearest poles offsite in each direction of the project site including services that originate from poles on the far side of the street. A disposition note describing the above shall be reflected on design improvement plans whenever those plans are required. Written proof confirming initiation of the design of utility improvements or relocations, issued by the utility company, shall be submitted to the Engineering Department for verification purposes.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

On March 21, 2019, the city adopted a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the project in compliance with CEQA. The minor change request has been evaluated against the previous analysis in the MND to ensure that extending the approval time does not create new significant impacts or substantially increase the severity of previously analyzed impacts compared to those identified previously.

The City's CEQA Administrator finds that the analyses and the conclusions in the MND remain valid and that by approving the proposed changes, the project does not create new significant impacts or substantially increase the severity of previously analyzed impacts as compared to those identified previously and that the project currently under review is "within the scope" of the earlier MND under CEQA Guidelines Section 15162 (a), see Exhibit B of Attachment 1.

Additionally, the project is exempt from further CEQA review pursuant to Section 15061 (b)(4). This exemption extends to projects that will be rejected or disapproved by the reviewing public agency.

NOTICING REQUIREMENTS

The Community Development Department noticed the January 11, 2023, Planning Commission hearing by mailing 10-day hearing notices to surrounding property owners within 1,000 feet of the boundaries of the project site. Additionally, a 10-day legal advertisement was published in the Press Enterprise. During the January 11, 2023 hearing, it was announced that the hearing is continued to February 22, 2023. As of the date of this report, no public comments or concerns have been received regarding the project.

CONCLUSION

It is recommended for the Planning Commission to hold a public hearing and approve the Minor Change by modifying Engineering Condition No. 3.15 to not require the undergrounding of the top electric lines that are parallel to Pacific Avenue and cross SR-60 and denying modifications to Conditions No. 1.12, 2.15. The construction of this in-fill residential community would add value and improvements to the immediate residential area.

STUDY SESSION ITEM NO. 1

MASTER APPLICATION NO. 22318: PRE-APPLICATION REVIEW FOR A 43 SINGLE-FAMILY DETACHED HOMES ON 15.04 ACRES WITHIN THE RIO VISTA SPECIFIC PLAN

Kumail Raza, Senior Planner provided a PowerPoint presentation on a pre-application for a proposed residential community consisting of 43 single-family detached homes on a 15.04 acres of vacant land at northeast corner of Armstrong Road and Gail Drive (Planning Area 7) of the proposed Rio Vista Specific Plan. The proposed community would consist of 43-single family detached homes on minimum 7,200 sf lots. The community would include improvements and amenities including: new streets with street parking, landscaped parkways, sidewalks and curbs and gutters; front yard landscaping; walls and fencing for privacy and a drainage basin to manage excessive water runoff.

Under the existing Specific Plan No. 243, the project site is in Planning Area 1. The area is designated for an equestrian center for residents that would provide for boarding and training facilities. In conjunction with the equestrian center, Planning Area 1 would serve

as a park and equestrian trailhead and would consist of pedestrian and equestrian trails, parking area, cool down area, and a horseshoe pit. Under the proposed Specific Plan, the project site is in Planning Area 7 and it is proposed for single-family residential.

The proposed residential project would require the following entitlement if the City adopted the proposed Rio Vista Specific Plan: Tentative Tract Map to subdivide existing 15.04-acre project site into new lots for 43 single-family detached homes, streets, and drainage basin.

If the proposed Rio Vista Specific Plan is not adopted, this project would require a General Plan Amendment, Specific Plan Amendment, and a Tentative Tract Map.

Commissioner Pruitt inquired on the PowerPoint presentation slide titled "Amenities" and asked what the green section would be used for.

Senior Planner Raza informed the Commission that the area in question would be used for a vegetated drainage basin.

Commissioner Villagomez asked staff to explain how a drainage basin works.

Senior Planner Raza informed the Commission that storm water basins will have fencing to prevent debris from entering and the capacity for the drainage basin would be determined by a Water Quality Report.

Commissioner Villagomez inquired what the surrounding residential properties are zoned.

Senior Planner Raza informed the Commission that the properties south of the proposed site are zoned A-1 and the properties adjacent to Armstrong Road are zoned R-A. The properties that sit on the City of Fontana are zoned Light Industrial.

Commissioner Villagomez asked what will be the affects and or risk of changing the zone for the proposed project to the surrounding residential properties.

Senior Planner Raza informed the Commission that the surrounding residential community is an established single family community and it is unlikely to have the owners come to the City and request a change of zone.

Commissioner Jackson asked if the City is aware of any development being proposed on the City of Fontana vacant property zoned Light Industrial.

Senior Planner Raza informed the Commission that the City and property owners adjacent to the property would be notified of any proposed project and the City would be active in responding to the project.

Chair Shultz stated that the property is owned privately and that the current market has deterred the development of an equestrian center. Chair Shultz expressed the need for more housing and feels that it would be beneficial to allow more housing in the community.

Paul Onufer, JPMB applicant, thanked the Commission for their input on the proposed project. Mr. Onufer informed the Commission that the proposed project property owner is different from property owner who controls the remaining area within the Rio Vista Specific Plan.

Commissioner Pruitt asked the applicant if they will be developing 3-story units.

Paul Onufer, applicant informed the Commission that they will not be proposing 3-story units.

Commissioner Pruitt inquired if the applicant would consider an alternative circulation plan that would connect or loop streets and sidewalks.

Paul Onufer, applicant, informed the Commission that the grading separation would make the alternative circulation more difficult but would look into it further.

Commissioner Villagomez asked the applicant why not build an equestrian center.

Paul Onufer, applicant, informed the Commission that there is not a market for privately owned equestrian centers.

Commissioner Villagomez expressed that an equestrian center would be an amazing facility for the community.

Chair Shultz asked staff for a status on the proposed Rio Vista Specific Plan.

Joe Perez, Community Development Director informed the Commission that staff is in the final phase of reviewing the draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR). Once the draft EIR is released for public review the next steps would be a public workshop, and public hearings for Planning Commission and the City Council.

PUBLIC COMMENTS OPENED

Pobedy Montes, resident, spoke against the proposed project and urged the Commission to keep the equestrian center and equestrian lifestyle.

Deana Conner, resident, spoke against the proposed project. Mrs. Conner would like to see more open space and equestrian facilities.

Gary Conner, resident, spoke against the proposed project, and asked the Commission to deny the project and keep the equestrian center.

Jessica Sweet, resident, expressed her appreciation for the equestrian lifestyle and spoke against the proposed project.

Robert Ramirez, resident, spoke against the project. Mr. Ramirez expressed that the project is not good for the community and suggested that new homes be built on ½ acre lots.

Jose Covarrubias, resident, spoke against the proposed project and asked the Commission to keep the equestrian center and rural community.

Rafael Cabrol, resident, spoke against the proposed project and expressed his appreciation of the equestrian and horse community.

Erika Soriano, Administrative Services Coordinator read into the record the following emails:

Mason Stinson expressed his support for the project as it will bring much needed housing and road improvements to the community.

Maribel Lopez, resident, expressed her appreciation for the equestrian lifestyle and spoke against the project.

Masaki Mendoza, resident, spoke in favor of the project and suggested a higher density zone for the proposed project.

COMMISSION DISCUSSION

Chair Shultz asked when the current Rio Vista Specific Plan was approved.

Senior Planner Raza informed the Commission that the current Rio Vista Specific Plan was approved by the Riverside County in 1982.

Commissioner Jackson asked the applicant if any of the proposed housing units will be affordable.

Paul Onufer, applicant, informed the Commission that the proposed development is planned for market rate housing and Affordable units in compliance with the City's Inclusionary Housing Ordinance.

Commissioner Villagomez expressed she would like to see more of the 1982 Rio Vista Specific Plan incorporated into the proposed project and would like to see more equestrian centers, trails and open space. Rob Gonzalez, Senior Planner, provided a Power-Point Presentation on the proposed Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211. The applicant is requesting to modify the conditions regarding the maintenance of landscaping, water quality management facilities, and the undergrounding of electric lines. The proposed modifications to Conditions of Approval are as following;

No. 1.12 – Change maintenance responsibility of off-site landscaping from City to Homeowner Association (HOA)

No. 2.15 – Change operation and maintenance responsibilities for Water Quality Management Features from City to HOA

No. 3.15 Remove requirement for underground of electric lines along Pacific Ave. that traverse SR-60

Commissioner Pruitt asked about the benefits of an HOA vs. City maintenance.

Senior Planner Gonzalez informed the Commission that the HOA is privately funded and City maintenance would have a more stable source of funding as it would be funded by taxpayers. Also, the City would have direct control over the maintenance standards vs. HOA oversight.

PUBLIC HEARING OPENED

Paul Onufer, JPMB applicant, informed the Commission that he is in agreement with the staff recommendation. Mr. Onufer informed the Commission that the undergrounding of electrical lines on Pacific Avenue would increase the cost of the project and would delay the

project since they would need to coordinate with Southern California Edison, Caltrans and the California Highway Patrol for the removal of the poles and for complete shutdown of SR-60.

Pobedy Montes, resident, spoke against the modifications to the project.

PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED

COMMISSION DISCUSSION

Commissioner Jackson said the high winds in the area and fire potential pose dangers and can cause damage. Therefore, the undergrounding of electric lines will be beneficial in the long run.

Commissioners Villagomez also expressed that the community would benefit from the undergrounding of electric lines.

Commissioner Pruitt also addressed concerns regarding the high winds and fire dangers and the undergrounding of the electric lines would be beneficial.

Chair Shultz asked the applicant to provide an estimated timeline to get an approval of the shutdown of SR-60.

Paul Onufer, applicant, informed the Commission that it would take roughly 1-2 years to coordinate with Southern California Edison, Caltrans and the California Highway Patrol for the removal of the poles and for complete shutdown of SR-60.

Chair Shultz asked staff how many extensions the applicant would be allowed.

Senior Planner Gonzalez informed the Commission that the applicant is allowed 6 one-year Extensions of Time for their approved project.

Commissioner Pruitt asked the applicant why condition 3.15 was not addressed when the project was originally approved.

Paul Onufer, applicant, informed the Commission that they were not aware of the scope of the undergrounding at the time and did not realize that SR-60 would need to be shutdown.

Commissioner Jackson strongly encourages the undergrounding of electric lines.

Commissioner Pruitt moved and Commissioner Jackson seconded to deny Planning Commission Resolution No. 2023-03 and direct staff to bring back a Resolution denying Minor Change No. 1 to Tentative Tract Map No. 37211.

Tamara Campbell, Principal Planner, provided a Power-Point Presentation on the proposed General Plan Amendment (GPA) and Change of Zone (CZ). The GPA and CZ are recommended for three parcels of approximately 3.86 acres located near the northeast corner

of Van Buren Boulevard and Jurupa Road west of Felspar Street. The intent of the GPA and CZ is to permit commercial uses in the shopping center. With the existing land use designation and zoning, it would permit industrial uses with entitlements. Change of Zone No. 22004 would change the zoning map from Manufacturing Service-Commercial to Scenic Highway Commercial. General Plan Amendment No. 22008 would change the Land Use Map from Business Park to Commercial Retail.

Commissioner Villagomez inquired if the proposed change will affect the surrounding tenants.

Principal Planner Campbell informed the Commission that the change would not affect the surrounding tenants.

Commissioner Villagomez asked what type of establishments would be permitted in the proposed Change of Zone.

Principal Planner Campbell informed the Commission that the proposed zone would allow for several retail establishments.

Community Development Director Perez informed the Commission that the City inherited Riverside County General Plan, zoning code and regulations. Over the years, the City has discovered inconsistencies between these documents in comparison with actual development. The proposed GPA and CZ amendment will correct the inconsistency with the existing land uses of the shopping center.

City Attorney Maricela Marroquin informed the Commission that Item No. 8 would be heard in two sections to allow Commissioner Villagomez an opportunity to give input for Change of Zone Nos. 22003 and 22005. Commissioner Villagomez would recuse herself from Change of Zone No. 23003 because of the close proximity of her residence to the project.

Tamara Campbell, Principal Planner, provided Power-Point Presentation on the proposed Change of Zone No. 22005.

Change of Zone No. 22005 consists of 1 parcel of approximately 3.6 acres in size and is located near the northwest intersection of La Rue Street and Canal Street, north of the Union Pacific Railroad tracks. The parcel is currently vacant. The proposed Change of Zone No.

22005 would change the zone from One Family Dwellings (R-1) to General Residential (R-3).

Commissioner Pruitt inquired if the City has a deadline to process the Change of Zones.

Principal Planner Tamara informed the Commission that there is no established timeframe for the change of zone.

Commissioner Villagomez inquired if the Change of Zone could be designated to a higher density such as R-4.

Principal Planner Tamara informed the Commission that the R-4 zone doesn't allow for higher density but allows for Planned Unit Developments.

Chair Shultz inquired on the zoning of surrounding properties.

Principal Planner Tamara informed the Commission that the surrounding properties are residential.

PUBLIC HEARING OPENED

Howard An, property owner of 6464 33rd Street, came forward to speak against Change of Zone No. 22003. Mr. An informed the Commission that his business was able to secure a small business loan under the current zoning of Manufacturing-Service.

Paul Brown, General Manager for Rexco Steal, spoke against the proposed Change of Zone No. 22003. Mr. Brown informed the Commission that Rexco has a facility in the City of Ontario for 28 years and has an environment friendly facility. Rexco intends to operate at the proposed site.

Eddie Michino, NAJ Capitol, industrial broker for the property owner Howard An, requested that the Commission reconsider the Change of Zone.

Kevin Kohan, Elevated Entitlements, representing the owner, requested that the Commission continue the item to allow the owner to meet with staff on the proposed Change of Zone No. 22005.

Erika Soriano, Administrative Services Coordinator read into the record a letter received from Kevin Kohan, Principal Planner representing the property owner of 6464 33rd Street, requesting a continuance for proposed Change of Zone No. 22005 to allow further discussion with staff.

PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED

Commissioner Pruitt requested clarification on the property owner's request.

Community Development Director Joe Perez informed the Commission that the owner is requesting a continuance to discuss the Change of Zone to either allowing the current zone Manufacturing-Service Commercial to remain in place or changing the zone to HDDR which would allow higher density housing.

Commissioner Villagomez agreed to move the item to a later date to allow for discussion between the property owner and staff.

Commissioner Jackson moved and Commissioner Pruitt seconded to continue Change of Zone No. 22005 to a future Planning Commission meeting to allow the property owner of 6464 33rd Street and staff to discuss the Change of Zone.

The motion was approved by (4-0) with Chair Pro Tem Newman absent.

Chair Shultz called a recess to allow Commissioner Villagomez to recuse herself from the discussion of Change of Zone No. 23003.

Chair Shultz reconvened the meeting.

CHANGE OF ZONE NO. 23003 CONSISTING OF 3.86 ACRES LOCATED NEAR THE NORTHWEST INTERSECTION OF BELLEGRAVE AVENUE AND VAN BUREN BOULEVARD AND WEST OF THE BAIN FLOOD CONTROL CHANNEL FRON INDUSTRIAL PARK TO BUSINESS PARK

Commissioner Villagomez recused herself from Change of Zone No. 23003 because of the close proximity of her residence to the project and stepped out of the City Council Chambers.

Tamara Campbell, Principal Planner provided Power-Point Presentation on the proposed Change of Zone 23003. The proposed change of zone consist of 10 parcels on 3.86 acres located near the northwest intersection of Bellegrave Avenue and Van Buren Boulevard and west of the Bain Flood Control Channel. Surrounding land uses include vacant land to the north, auto storage to the west, scattered single-family homes to the south and light industrial uses and manufacturing-service commercial uses to the east. Changing the zone of these parcels from Industrial Park to Business Park is proposed to provide consistency between the General Plan Map and the City's Zoning Map.

PUBLIC HEARING OPENED

No comments received.

PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED

Commissioner Pruitt moved and Commissioner Jackson seconded to approve the revised Planning Commission Resolution No. 2023-06 recommending that the City Council approve Change of Zone No. 23003 consisting of 3.86 acres located near the northwest intersection of Bellegrave Avenue and Van Buren Boulevard and west of the Bain Flood Control Channel from Industrial Park to Business Park and determine that for the Change of Zone No. 23003 no further Environmental Review is required pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15162.

The motion was approved by (3-0) with Chair Pro Tem Newman absent and Commissioner Villagomez recused herself from this item.

Commissioner Pruitt provided an update on the Sizzler advertised on the billboard off of Van Buren Boulevard. The advertisement was for the newly remodeled Sizzler in the City of Corona. Commissioner Pruitt praised Cal Fire for their speedy work in putting out a fire in the Santa Ana River bottom. Commissioner Pruitt also suggested to the residents when providing comments to an issue they should also provide a suggested solution.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Community Development Director Perez summarized the actions taken at the February 16, 2023 City Council meeting. Mr. Perez provided an overview of the newly created Residential Development Committee.

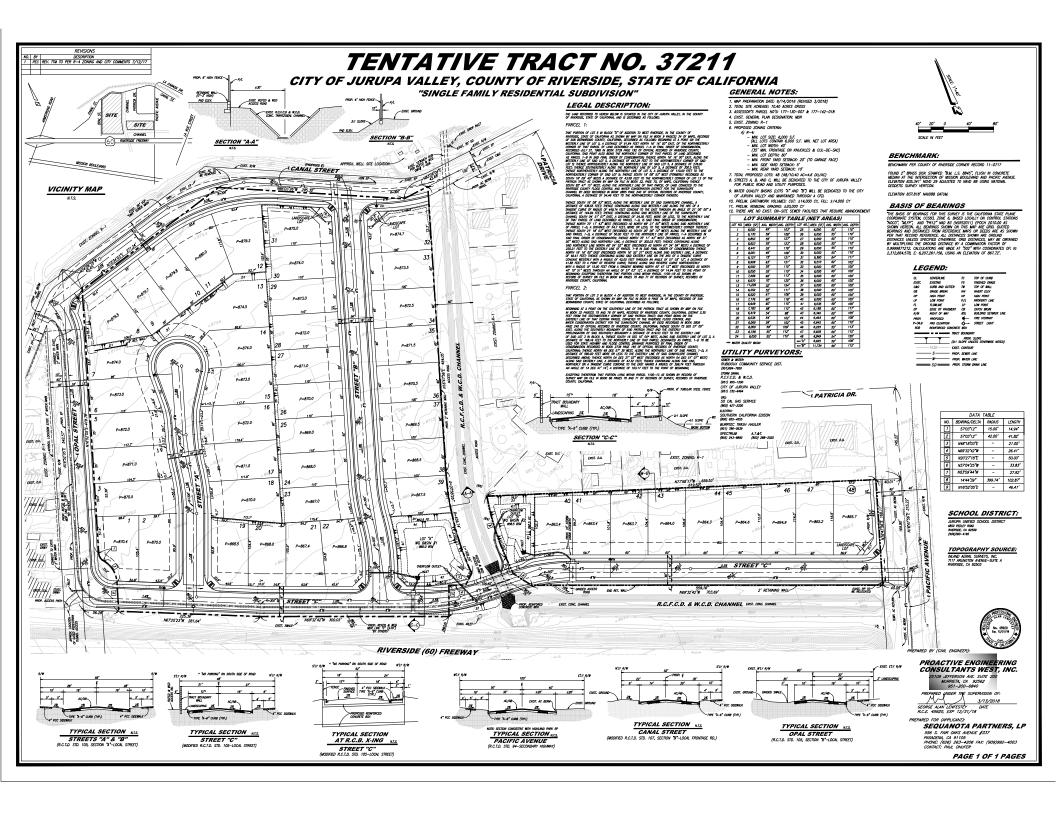

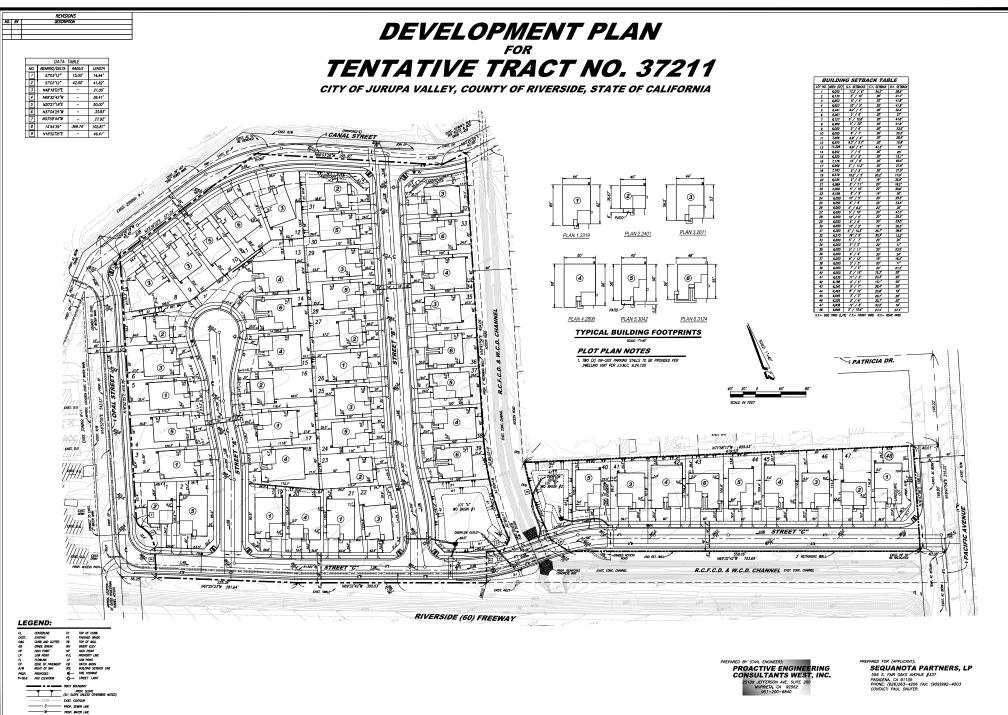

BACKGROUND

The City Council held a public workshop on May 18, 2023 to discuss the proposed FY 2023-24 Operating Budget for the City. At this workshop staff presented the budget and both Council and the public had opportunity to comment. At the Budget Workshop City Council gave direction to staff on changes to the proposed budget. These changes are incorporated in the attached Budget document, including additional changes as directed by City Council.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Adopting the proposed Operating Budget will result in appropriating \$55,866,055, which includes \$800,000 from DIF Transfer-in, for the General Fund and \$17,200,550 from restricted funds to provide for the City's FY 2023-24 Expenditure Plan.

FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023 YEAR-END BUDGET AMENDMENTS

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the City Council approve Fiscal Year 2022-23 Year-End Budget Amendments to the City's Budget as presented in the attached exhibit.

ANALYSIS

The FY 2022-2023 Budget was adopted on June 17, 2022. Expenditures are budgeted based upon the anticipated level of activity. However, it is often the case that as the fiscal year progresses some activities need to be increased or decreased to reflect changing circumstances. Consequently, most cities evaluate financial activities at or shortly after the midpoint and end of the budget year to determine if changes in resource allocation are necessary to meet these changing circumstances.

In order to properly end the Fiscal Year 2022-23 activity, staff believes some budgets should be adjusted at this time. The attached exhibit identifies the proposed amendments.

In some cases, appropriations for certain expenditures are no longer necessary at previously approved levels. In other instances, additional appropriations are requested to offset anticipated expenditures for the year.

OTHER INFORMATION

None.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Current Revenue General Fund Budget is \$55,456,370 and the Estimated Year-End General Fund Budget is \$62,011,143. Approval of the requested budget amendment would result in a revenue increase of \$6,554,773. The largest increase was from Developer Contributions in the amount of \$5,701,163.

Current General Fund Budget for Expenditures is \$55,800,204 and the Estimated Year-End General Fund Budget is \$55,319,351. A decrease of expenditures in the amount of (\$480,853) is projected.

Year-end budget amendments for Gas Tax are in the amount of \$87,223; Measure A in the amount of 3,859; ARPA in the amount of \$2,275; Cal Recycle in the amount of \$31,508; LLMD's in the amount of \$59,970; and CFD's in the amount of \$57,751.

LIVING ADJUSTMENT

RECOMMENDATION

- 1) That the City Council approve the Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) of 3%, effective the first pay period in July 2023, requiring that eligible employees are required to be active on payroll at the time the COLA takes effect; and
- 2) That the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2023-46, entitled:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JURUPA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING A CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION SALARY SCHEDULE INCLUDING THE 3% COLA FOR THE FISCAL YEAR JULY 1, 2023 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2024

BACKGROUND

In FY 2020-21 a 9/80 work schedule was approved and there was no recommendation for COLA increase; in 2021-22, employees received a 4% COLA increase; in 2022-23 employees received a 2% COLA and an increase in their monthly cafeteria allowance from \$1,400 to \$1,650.

In efforts to attract and retain quality employees, at the Council's budget workshop on May 18, 2023, staff recommended that the City Council approve a 3% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA). This recommendation falls under the current Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Riverside County area reported as 4.9% in April 2023.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The financial impact for these changes will be determined and incorporated into the FY 2023-24 Preliminary and Final Budget Proposals during the budget process. The GF expenditure would be approximately \$236,129.

1. Reject or amend the proposed Classification and Compensation Salary Schedule for Fiscal Year 2023-24.
